Intentional Discipleship Training

Intentional Discipleship Training is a Bible-based training process to equip the local congregation to rediscover the New Testament principles of disciplemaking so it can fulfill the Great Commission.

This fall the Commission on Evangelism plans on having a workshop

- available for individual congregations and/or districts to go through Intentional Discipleship Training. The training, which will last about seven hours, will have two different parts.
- A one- to two-hour training workshop that equips qualified individuals to lead a one-hour intentional discipleship Bible study.
- A training workshop called The Small Group Leadership Seminar. Lasting about four hours, this section trains participants in all aspects of the intentional discipleship process, including how to start new studies, how to overcome group problems, and how to identify and train a new leader.

The Intentional Discipleship Training is evangelistic in nature and is focused on growing the local congregation both in biblical knowledge and with new behaviors.

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DISCIPLE-MAKING CHURCHES

Home Missions is intent on growing disciples for the Lord Jesus Christ as we plant free and living Lutheran congregations within the United States.

→ Emmanuel Lutheran Church

Discipleship is the mandate the Christian Church described in Matthew 28:19-20. It's as big as the world and as multi-faceted as His people.

One congregation with a history of being a prayer house for AFLC World and Home Missions is Immanuel Lutheran Church of Springfield, Mo. Emmanuel is located about an hour north of Branson, Mo., and is often considered the Gateway to the South. We are excited about the new start this congregation is experiencing after many years without a pastor.

Home Mission Pastor Rich Ramsbacher reports, "We've been working on discipleship and [building] relationships with our neighborhood." As a result, he reports, "God is now placing many unchurched [belong to a denomination but not attending] people in our path, and we hope to reach them." Their beautiful new church sign reflects the congregation's commitment to stay under the authority of the Word of God.

→ Come Join Us

Church planting can't happen apart from the involvement of local congregations. Come Join Us presentations are one way Home Missions is getting the word out. Loren Tungseth, Home Missions director of resource management, is passionate about raising awareness of what God is doing through AFLC church planting, summer teams and Parish Builder ministries, and especially the Naknek, Alaska Mission.

"I have been privileged to make three trips to Naknek since 2008, when God called the AFLC to the ministry there," said Tungseth. "I have gone twice as a Home Missions Committee member and once with a work team from my home church, Calvary Free Lutheran in Fergus Falls, Minn. God has given me a heart for the work there ... and I'm impressed with the great tools for ministry that God has given us to use in sending His gospel to that remote part of the United States."

So far more than 70 AFLC congregations have participated in Come Join Us presentations, which includes Loren and his wife Sharon's personal testimony, a high quality PowerPoint to help you "see" what God is doing in Home Missions, and an explanation on specific opportunities for every age to get involved in church planting.

Presentations are available for Sunday school hours, Sunday evening or midweek services, WMF rallies or mission festivals.

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BEHIND THE SCENES

We've all seen airplanes at airports or flying in the air, but we don't usually see what is done behind the scenes to keep them flying. What exactly takes place to keep the FLAPS airplanes flying safely? Good maintenance is as important for preventing mechanical problems as is making repairs after a problem takes place.

For all the years of its existence, FLAPS has been blessed with Christian mechanics who maintain its airplanes. Their time is often donated or discounted, which helps us minimize maintenance costs. For the two FLAPS aircraft in Alaska, it is a blessing that AFLC Pastor Jeremy Crowell is an experienced pilot and mechanic with inspector

authorization. Our Alaska missionaries say this past winter was one of the coldest in recent memory. Thank God we have a heated hangar in Naknek where maintenance can be done.

During the coldest winter months, flying activity is slowed, which makes it a good time to do a comprehensive annual inspection on each FLAPS plane. Crowell starts the inspection with an engine compression and timing check. Then he changes the air and oil filters and services the spark plugs. He inspects the engine and looks for anything that might be an issue and takes care of it. He also removes numerous inspection panels on the airframe and inspects the aircraft structure, flight control and fuel systems, etc. This involves removing the interior of the cabin, including seats and most of the upholstery panels, opening the interior inspection panels, etc.

The inspection is done in accordance with the manufacturer's recommendations and the Federal Air Regulations. Once the inspection is complete, the plane is serviced and reassembled and the engine is test run. All the necessary log book entries are made, paperwork filed, and the aircraft is returned to service for another year. Twelve months later, the process is repeated.

Although inspections are time consuming, it is assuring to know the airplane is in top working order, especially when flights are made over rugged, uninhabited terrain in Alaska in a variety of weather conditions. The people we carry in the mission planes don't normally see all this

inspection and maintenance being done. Yet good maintenance of the FLAPS airplanes is on-going and very important.

We often see the Lord's provision in this area, too. Equipment of various types, including parts and radios, have been donated to FLAPS just at the time they're needed. In addition, MARC (Mission Aviation Repair Center), based in Soldotna, Alaska, sells aviation fuel and parts at their cost to aviation mission organizations like FLAPS. We thank God for all these networking details that contribute to the aviation ministry in Alaska.

The FLAPS ministry was also blessed with a grant of \$15,000 from the Lutheran Mission Society for the purchase of fuel for our mission planes in Alaska. Aviation fuel in Naknek costs about \$7/gal., so this is a big help for the ministry.

God's hand is evident in the provision of needed resources for the FLAPS ministry. "To God be the glory, great things He has done!"

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WHEN WE REACH THE END OF OUR RESOURCES

"... I will build my church, and the gates of hell will not prevail against it" (Matthew 16:18).

God is working around the world to build His church. Neither trying situations nor even the gates of hell can hinder His power to fulfill His promises. If any church has experienced trying situations, it would be our church in León, Mexico. A dwindling congregation in a violent country, the congregation at one point had a pastor in his 90s, a building that had stood unfinished for decades, and a reduction in AFLC financial support. None of these attributes stopped God from fulfilling His promise to bless those who honor Him.

Missionary Todd Schierkolk and World Missions Director Del Palmer visited the congregation this spring and found it alive and healthy. The dwindling congregation was growing. A number of new families had moved to León from Mazatlán. The pastor's son was now leading the service and teaching Bible studies. New people were coming from the community because the church was reaching out.

The church had grown so much that the chapel they were meeting in was no longer big enough. Even though there was a reduction in support from the AFLC, they needed to get the church finished. They trusted in God and set out to finish the structure. During their visit, Schierkolk and Palmer found the roof work complete. The congregation had the funds to put in the windows and an electrician from the congregation offered to finish the electrical work.

God is building His Church around the world. He has invited us to be a part of it. God was at work in His church in León, and the congregation was depending on Him. When we are weak we are more likely to depend on Him. That's what God explained to Paul when He said, "My grace is sufficient for you, for my power is made perfect in weakness" (II Corinthians 12:9).

LONGING FOR & LEARNING FROM GOD'S WORD









"We want to thank you for bringing the Ambassador Institute to us because we know that now we are receiving the true Word of God." That quote, read at a conference in Uganda this past January, represents a passion that stands out in many countries where we minister. There is a hunger for learning the Word of God.

When Musasizi Wilson was asked, "Why do you give your time and energy to train others?" he answered, "When you have tasted something that is sweet like honey, you want to share it with others."

The Ambassador Institute Oral Bible Study Curriculum contains 84 narratives from the Bible, equaling 2,200 verses that the students memorize. Each lesson also emphasizes three pillars of education.

→ The first pillar is knowledge or doctrine.

Paul admonishes believers in I Timothy 4:16, "Watch your life and doctrine closely. Persevere in them, because if you do, you will save both yourself and your hearers." The doctrines of Scripture define us as Lutherans; they help us understand God's Word and they direct how we are to live. The nature of man and the means of grace are topics that transcend culture and apply to everyone who studies God's Word. The law, the gospel, and Christ are themes that flow through all of Scripture. Head knowledge is necessary so that we know what and why we believe, but that knowledge must also affect the heart of a person.

→ The second pillar is character.

Believers must grow into maturity. Head knowledge must accompany a heart transformation in the life of a believer. The fruit of the Spirit reveals the work that God is doing on the inside. It might be easy to see the character flaws in others, but God's Word reveals what every follower of Christ must look like. I Timothy 3 and Titus 1 both describe in detail the qualifications for being a leader in a church. Those qualities lay out the topics for discipleship, which is lived out in ministry.

→ The third pillar is ministry life.

The student must put to work the head knowledge and the heart transformation through hands that care for others. Romans 12 refers to the different gifts of the Spirit and how each part of the body is needed to make up the whole. Ministry life covers caring for those in the church and becoming family for those without a church home. It means reaching others through evangelism and missions. It includes teaching, preaching, worship, and prayer. As the whole body works together, the Lord is glorified and the Church is built up.

We want to thank you for your partnership in this ministry which builds strong pastors and leaders as our international friends continue to testify to us.

The theme of this celebration is taken from I Samuel 7:12: "Thus far has the Lord helped us." We pray that God would enable us to continue on and be faithful to the inerrant Word of God in all we do.

The AFLC Youth Ministries Department exists to partner with local congregations to win teenagers to Jesus Christ, to build them in God's Word and God's love, and to equip them to communicate their faith with others as well as live their faith by God's grace. When this mission is demonstrated, we see the multiplying of maturing teen disciples of Jesus, who also make disciples and understand their position in the Body of Christ.

OPPORTUNITIES

- FLY Beyond—Our biennial equipping event will be held July 16-20, 2012, at the Association Retreat Center, Osceola, Wis. With the theme rooted in Galatians 2:20, we will train teenagers to define their world through the lens of the cross and Jesus Himself.
- Leader Training—We are grateful for the partnerships with our schools (AFLBS, the Ministry Training Institute, and the seminary) and with our districts to offer quality biblical equipping for adults in youth ministry. We are currently envisioning new ways to maximize our opportunities to be most effective and available to our AFLC family.
- Youth Workers Retreat—Part of our plan for training includes our annual Youth Workers Retreat, which is designed for both volunteer and vocational leaders. We enjoyed the blessing of the largest retreat in the event's history this last January. We are eager to build off this yearly highlight at the beginning of next year.

OUTLOOK

- FLY Convention—Our national youth gathering will be held July 1-6, 2013, at the YMCA of the Rockies in Estes Park, Colo. With the theme "Broken" from Isaiah 53, FLY will bring teenagers together to celebrate that Jesus was broken for us and to dwell on the life that we have through faith in Him.
- Student Missions—After a year off from trips this summer, we turn our gaze to the summer of 2013. We are pursuing new coordinators for this global exposure program and are strengthening our procedures to ensure the best experience possible for those who attend.
- Congregational Process—The first half of this year has been active for many AFLC churches evaluating their process to share Jesus with this generation of young people. We are impressed by the thoughtful, intentional efforts. We are sharpening our tools to assist local congregations that are developing a vocational youth ministry position, while keeping a priority on assisting the vast majority of churches that are effectively led by volunteer youth leaders.

SCHOLARSHIP 400

AFLBS desires to continue its mission of training disciples of Jesus Christ with the Scholarship 400 initiative. 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Becoming MISSION MINDED

The Ministry Training Institute (MTI) has three main tracks of study: youth ministry, crosscultural missions, and mission aviation ministry. Through one year of intensive study and internship, students learn to share the gospel directly and indirectly in their roles as youth workers, short- and fullterm missionaries, children's ministers, mission aviators, or parish builders. We invite students of all age groups, including those who already have a vocation.

Ministry training is disciple making. This is what Jesus Christ did the last three years of His life before He laid His life down on the cross to save us from our sins. In essence, this is what the MTI is all about. We teach and train our students to put their two years of Bible school into practice by various means: one-on-one discipleship and ministering to families, small groups, and large groups—all of these areas build up the work of the Church which is the

the work of the Church, which is the kingdom of God on earth.

The three tracks of ministry—Cross-Cultural Missions, Youth Ministry, Mission Aviation—are taught in the classroom during the fall semester on the AFLBS campus. During the spring semester, students spend three months on an internship assignment. Those students in the mission track are sent to a foreign country to focus on cross-cultural missions. While there, they are mentored by veteran missionaries in that country. Students in the youth ministry track are placed under an AFLC youth director or pastor who is serving a church that is involved in youth ministry in their community. The student is then mentored in that ministry. Students who enroll in the mission aviation track are sent to work with the AFLC's aviation ministry in Alaska, where they are mentored by a seasoned AFLC pilot in church work.

We continue to ask you to pray and support our students as they are being discipled in the Lord's service. "Again Jesus said, 'Peace be with you! As the Father has sent me, I am sending you'" (John 20:21).

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EXPANSION

Through the AFLC Seminary





The original plans for Vision included growth for the seminary and the Bible school. Since 1999, we have completed three married seminary housing units, with four living units in each building, for a total of 12 units. Praise God for the gifts we have received for these units. The project provides economical housing for our seminary students on campus and makes it convenient for families to be fully involved in campus life near Medicine Lake. In addition, housing fees, less actual expenses, provide significant scholarship funds for students, making seminary affordable.

As we desire to follow God's leading to expand our reach through the seminary, Dr. Francis Monseth (AFLTS dean) will lead the schools through accreditation. This process will require Dr. Monseth, who has been dean for 30 years, to adjust his schedule to focus on this very important undertaking. Members of the Board of Trustees plan to have preparations finalized to apply for accreditation in early 2013. This will take additional work and added expenses to go through the whole accreditation process over the next several years. We have dedicated significant funds from a legacy gift to take care of most of these expenses short-term.

Accreditation will simplify the process for seminary students to receive government aid they have earned through the GI Bill. But most importantly, as Dr. Monseth has said, it will help the seminary sharpen what it already does. We are confident we can apply for accreditation without compromising our core principles.

We are thankful for the congregations' support of the seminary. The schools will need your support of the seminary operating budget even more so as we step through this open door to expand our reach through accreditation. We ask you to pray for Dr. Monseth as he

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OUR BOARD & STAFF

The AFLC Board of Publications and Parish Education is a dedicated, five-member board elected by the Annual Conference to oversee the publishing and educational ministry of the AFLC. The board has two-day meetings on campus about every six weeks and also conducts numerous online meetings in between to edit Bible lessons and make decisions related to the ministry. During the past several months, the board has been regularly participating in online meetings through GoToMeeting.com two days a week for several hours at a time mainly to edit grade six Bible lessons.

As director, Marian oversees the writing and publishing of Sunday school curriculum and other books, manages the inventory and bookstore, and represents the department through book displays or workshops in congregations, at WMF rallies, and conventions. Much time is spent corresponding with a large number of volunteers and coordinating projects as well as responding to e-mail inquiries.

Brent and Diane both work part-time in the office Monday through Friday. Brent attends seminary classes in the morning and works in the office in the afternoon entering orders in the computer, running computer reports, and helping to manage inventory. Diane works in the office primarily in the morning and is also employed locally as a massage therapist. Diane assists with volunteer contacts, correspondence, and formatting books for publishing. Both Brent and Diane help customers in the store as well as by phone and e-mail. They also fill and ship orders and pack and unpack books for workshops and other events in addition to multiple other tasks.

Sarah Daas, who used to work in the office as secretary, now works a few hours a week from home and maintains our Web site, makes contacts for bulletin articles, and assists with certain projects.

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



Institutional chaplaincy is a unique ministry where God has called pastors to serve in hospitals, long-term care facilities, hospices and prisons—our newest area of ministry. Institutional chaplaincy is a ministry by which God has called us to walk with other individuals as they experience the challenges of life and continue on their journey home to be with the Lord. I find that as people are experiencing life's challenges, they are more willing to search for and lean upon the promises of God. There is an openness in people's lives at this time that allows chaplains to offer comfort and encouragement and share in their lives.

The AFLC's department of Institutional Chaplaincy continues to grow both personally and numerically. When I first became a chaplain for the AFLC, there were only two chaplains—Chaplain Howard Franzen and myself. Today, there are 22 chaplains within our department. Our board members meet quarterly, as well as yearly with the AFLC Coordinating Committee. We have been truly blessed as a part of the AFLC.

Each September we meet for a three-day seminar to help us grow in our ministries as well as to encourage each other. This year Chaplain Ron Mahnke will lead four sessions on self care. We will also offer a session on hobbies and another on clinical pastoral education (CPE).

We encourage the members of our department to take at least one unit of CPE. Those who have done this have been greatly blessed and their ministry enhanced. CPE can be taken as an extended unit, requiring a meeting with a supervisor and peers one day a week, and the rest of the requirements can be accomplished through a local parish.

- How will Foundation grants be used by the AFLC ministries? The grants will likely be used for special projects that are often unbudgeted.

CONFERENCE-APPROVED STATEMENTS

Sanctity of Life

Adopted by the 1986 Annual Conference

- WHEREAS, the 1977 Annual Conference of the Association of Free Lutheran Congregations resolved to oppose therapeutic abortions as a means of birth control and to encourage each congregation and individual to protest in writing to their respective legislative officials; and
- WHEREAS, the 1978 Annual Conference resolved to continue to oppose the sin of abortion; and
- WHEREAS, the 1980 Annual Conference reaffirmed the "conservative stand taken by the AFLC based on the Word of God and His Laws concerning the moral issues of our day;" and
- WHEREAS, the destruction of millions of lives by means of abortion which began with the 1973 Supreme Court decision still continues; therefore
- BE IT RESOLVED, that the Annual Conference of the Association of Free Lutheran Congregations affirms that
 - the unborn children are persons in the sight of God from the time of conception (Job 10:9-10; Psalm 51:5; 139:13-17; Jeremiah 1:5; Luke 1:41-44);
 - the unborn children stand under the protection of God's command against murder (Genesis 9:6; Exodus 20:13; Numbers 35:33; Acts 7:19; I John 3:15); and
- BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that we encourage a clear witness on behalf of the sanctity of unborn life, including the support of responsible pro-life groups in our communities, such as Lutherans for Life, and
- BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that we encourage prayerful support for the development of alternatives to abortion programs, providing compassionate help for those in need;
- BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that we boldly proclaim Law and Gospel, which alone can change the sinful hearts of men and women and turn them from sin to salvation.

Adopted by the 1995 Annual Conference

- RESOLVED, that the 1995 Annual Conference of the Association of Free Lutheran Congregations reaffirms our biblical convictions that unborn children are persons in the sight of God from the time of conception and stand under the protection of God's law against murder; and
- BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that the employment of every peaceful and legal avenue to enact laws restoring protection to unborn children be encouraged, while relying on the spiritual resources available to God's people for fighting the spiritual battle for the sanctity of human life; and
- BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that the conference also expresses its opposition to the violent actions of some abortion opponents, convinced that the violence of abortion will not be overcome by further violence, and that Christians must not take the law into their own hands in opposing evil.

Adopted by the 2000 Annual Conference

- BE IT RESOLVED, that we affirm the sanctity of human life from conception to natural death;
- BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that we denounce abortion, including partial birth abortion, infanticide, and euthanasia all as sin and that we pray that these practices would come to an end in our country by losing their personal support as well as any legal sanction;
- BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that we encourage our congregations to support pro-life organizations like Lutherans For Life and local crisis pregnancy centers with our prayers and giving; and
- BE IT FINALLY RESOLVED, that we extend a heart and voice of compassion and forgiveness in Christ to those who are experiencing crisis pregnancies or who have been involved in abortion.

Marriage and Family

Adopted by the 2000 Annual Conference

- WHEREAS, the attack against biblical Christianity is so intense in society today, including a direct assault against the Bible's teaching on marriage and the family,
- BE IT RESOLVED, that we as the Association of Free Lutheran Congregations reaffirm our uncompromising stand on God's Word that marriage is instituted by God to be between one man and one woman.
- WHEREAS, we live in a culture in which homosexuality is being
- more aggressively promoted and more broadly accepted, BE IT RESOLVED, that we the Association of Free Lutheran Congregations reaffirm our love in Christ for every person including those involved in the homosexual lifestyle while rejecting their lifestyle itself as sin,
- BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that we encourage our congregations to pray for and support with their gifts those individuals and organizations seeking to reach and rescue those in a homosexual lifestyle by biblical means and message.
