What comes to your mind when you think of the word dependent? Immediately children come to mind. I recently took care of my nieces and nephew for close to a week and was quickly reminded of how dependent the children were on me day and night and I can tell you I have a new respect for a mother's role. Whew!

Matthew 18:1-4 reminds us of how God desires us to relate to Him in a childlike way; "Truly I tell you, unless you change and become like little children, you will never enter the kingdom of heaven. Therefore, whoever takes the lowly position of this child is the greatest in the kingdom of heaven."

John 15:5 is another good example of daily, moment by moment dependence; " *I am the vine; you are the branches. Whoever abides in me and I in him, he it is that bears much fruit,* **for apart from me you can do nothing.**"

COMPLEXITIES

I have served on Parish Ed now for almost 4 complete years. I

have helped edit Bible studies and Sunday School curriculum. I have helped with annual budgets. I have offered my opinion here and there, and I was able to bring to fruition one silly project—the alternative dust jacket for Luther for the Busy Man. I am convinced that I am no better than most people at any of those tasks, and the dust cover is of no eternal significance. But last year, I finally figured out what I believe to be the biggest reason He put me on Parish Ed, and that is to get the book my mother-on-law has created into print. This project has become my baby and I am so excited to see the pieces coming together.

Marian has often spoken of the complexities of getting a book printed and I always acted like I knew what she meant. But I didn't. Let me give vou a taste. Josh is professionally digitizing the paintings, Rachel is doing the graphic design, and Gerry is going to get them printed. Josh needs information from Rachel on how to export the images, but first Rachel needs parameters from the printer who first needs information on the size of the book, number of pages (has to be a multiple of 4), type of paper, sheen, and other things. On top of that we need to make sure we have proper permission to use verses from multiple translations of the Bible. The biggest headache has been making sure that we cross our t's and dot our i's when it comes to licensing the images that the paintings were derived from. And I don't even know what other hurdles await. But I am SO EXCITED for the final product. 26 pages, 26 paintings, and 26 verses about who Jesus is. I am praying it will adorn a thousand coffee tables.

This experience of being privy to what goes on behind the scenes has caused me to contemplate the ways in which the Lord is at work in the world. God has a grand design. He is always working out details in wavs we will never know. He is preparing hearts both to proclaim the Word and receive it. He is preparing encounters. He is working through circumstances. He is orchestrating things through His angels behind the scenes, in ways that we will never see. Just like I have never appreciated what goes into making a book, I don't think we appreciate that God's hand is always at work in us-whether 115 and around we acknowledge it or not. According to Colossians 1:17, "In Him all things hold together". "And we know that for those who love God all things work together for good, for those who are called according to his purpose." (Romans 8:28) Not only is God holding everything together all the time, but He is also working them out for our good. He is constantly manipulating the universe for our good and for His glory. What a blessed thought!

I trust that the Lord's hand is all over Parish Ed as well. He provides the staff, the volunteers, the ideas, the facilities, the funding, and even the board members. And He has met so many of our needs through the generous women of the WMF! Of course, we have much more going on than just this Jesus A-Z book, but I ask you to continue to pray for this work—that we can get it done so that many will be comforted by a richer knowledge of who Jesus is!

Goals for FLBCS

The following goals were shared at conference this past year.

Our plan consists of these five strategic goals, all of which "come due" in June 2026:

- 1. FLBCS will be successfully standing against the increased pressures of conformity and compromise.
- 2. FLBCS will be operating with a balanced budget and have established a \$10M endowment and a 9-month operating reserve.
- 3. FLBCS will have increased enrollment in the Bible College to 160 while maintaining its theological integrity and campus culture.
- 4. FLBCS will be offering an AA and BA in Bible and Ministry and will graduate its first BA cohort.
- 5. FLBCS will be implementing at least three new outreach emphases and practices that are employing the values and skills of its students and graduates to impact the AFLC.

BE A PART OF SPREADING THE GOSPEL

When Jeremy and I were married in 2007 we both knew that we had a heart for missions and that we wanted to serve the Lord somewhere. Both of us had been to Alaska at different times to different places, but both were mission trips. When we got married only Jeremy

had been to Naknek. In 2008, Jeremy and Lavon Bohling flew a plane up to Naknek and Lavon's wife, Fern, and I followed commercially for a week. That whole week I saw the sun for about 10 minutes. Even then, we knew that this is a place we desired to live and serve if it was God's will. Graciously, wouldn't you know it, when we were here for six months in 2009 as part of Jeremy's seminary internship God, gave us one of the nicest summers here. (Don't worry, we still got to experience some winter too.) In 2010, we moved up here.

Fast forward thirteen years. God is moving us on. Here's a bit that Jeremy has written:

"After seeking counsel from godly men the Lord has placed in our life, and after much prayer, both Lacey and I agree that the Lord is calling us to resign from Home Missions and to take a ministry position at Mission Aviation Training Academy (MATA) in Arlington, WA. MATA has had a close relationship and continues to have a close relationship with the AFLC and FLAPS... I have a strong desire to pass on what the Lord has taught me over the years and to help be a part of raising up the next generation for missionary service and in particular the role of aviation as a tool for ministry."

It has been a privilege to serve Bristol Bay, and it has become home for us. The unique lifestyle, the hustle of the busy fishing season, our close-knit community, picking berries and putting salmon in the freezer, experiencing winter, and attending community events are things that I will miss when we move to a different area.

Looking back on some ways I was able to be of use here, it's wonderful to reminisce about. Most of the time here I have taught Sunday School at our church, Hilltop Christian Fellowship. Many of the kids who have come are foster kids. Because Naknek is one of the "larger" towns in the area there is a small handful of people who are foster parents. Several kids from other villages will get sent here. "Grandma Nola", a faithful church attendee, has had numerous foster children come through her home. I'm not even sure if she knows how many. Some of them come for just a couple months and some for a couple years. We have tried to share the gospel with them as much as we can. The seeds have been planted. Bibles have been given. We pray that they will be able to continue to hear the Word back at home or wherever they have ended up.

I have also led a ladies Bible Study, Thursdays at noon. I had never led a group of adults; but it has been a blessing, and our group has become quite close! In the past we have had a larger group, maybe about ten or so. More recently it has been about five or six. Since it's in the middle of the day a lot of people are working, but the ones who don't have full time jobs, or are retired are able to come and we are able to read the Word, pray, share heart-to heart, and even be fed a delicious lunch by our hostess.

There's been other tasks I've been involved in during the busy summer months, but for now these are ones I had on my heart to share. No matter what stage in life you're at you can always be a part of spreading the gospel! Thank you for your prayers for the Alaska Mission!

BE A PART OF MISSIONS

AFLC World Missions is grateful for your continuing support of our global ministries. I find great hope for the world's people from Psalm 86—specifically v. 5 and 9, "For you, O Lord, are good and forgiving, abounding in steadfast love to all who call upon you... All the nations you have made shall come and worship before you, O Lord, and shall glorify your name." These verses encourage me that our ministry to the nations is not in vain, for the Lord has promised to save all who come to him in repentance and faith!

Here are the latest news items and prayer concerns in AFLC World Missions:

Uganda: We are in a unique season of interest in church planting and helping the nationals organize as free and living Lutheran congregations. There is hope that groups of Ambassador Institute graduates will adopt our AFLC model of an association of congregations. It is challenging that this interest coincides with the absence of our missionaries. Jores are home on furlough, Michael is home for seminary classes, and the Raans will begin their furlough in December. Plans are underway to have Michael, Brent, and myself make some visits to Uganda during this next year. In addition, Raans are requesting help from another couple to join them in their church-planting ministry.

Brazil: The publishing arm of our Brazil seminary, DRELL, continues to translate our rich pietistic resources. The publications are being well-received, and there is genuine excitement about the uniqueness of the AFLC. In my recent visit with the AFLC Brazilian national leaders, I was reminded of the need for more workers- specifically church planters. They have dreams of beginning congregations in two new cities. They are praying for more missionaries!


India: As the Horeb Children's ministry and theological training of pastors and Bible women continue, Pastor Luther recognizes the need for more help in leadership. He is praying for a way for his son-in-law and daughter to receive theological training at FLBC. Their student visa was recently denied, so they are waiting on the Lord for the next step. The national government does not allow us to send missionaries, so please pray for wisdom. Pastor Craig Johnson and I will be teaching in India in January 2024.

Switzerland: Pastor Augusto is encouraged by the work in the congregation- but he admits they need more help. The congregation is asking for a US or Brazil missionary to help the ministry. Although French and Portuguese are helpful, an English-speaking pastor could have an effective ministry among the college-age people of the city. Please join us in prayer for a pastor willing to be called through AFLC World Missions to Switzerland.

Mexico: Todd and Barb are encouraged by less violent conditions in their city. They are thankful that the Kid's Club, worship, visitation, discipleship, and works of mercy ministries can be scheduled again. Please pray that God will continue to give them strength and wisdom- and that lives will continue to be changed through the ministry of the Word.

Paraguay: Matthew & Ednay look forward to seeing many of us during their upcoming Sept.-January furlough. Please pray for the ministry in Paraguay in their absence. They also request prayer for Matthew's health- his joint pain from the mosquito-borne virus has not improved. The ministry is encouraging, but they need another couple or individual to come and work alongside them. Please pray!

Perhaps you noticed a common thread in nearly all our fields: <u>we need more workers</u>! Would you please renew your efforts and join me in praying that the Lord of the Harvest would raise up more missionaries from our AFLC to join our global ministries? Remember, David prophesied in Psalm 86, "All the nations you have made shall come and worship before you, O Lord, and shall glorify your name." May those whom God is calling be faithful to go to the nations!
