Twelve days of Christmas have long past. The forty

days of Lent are upon us. We are near sixty days into the 365 days of 2023. Is this what Moses is referring to when he says, "teach us to number our days?" Moses had wandered in the wilderness with the people of God for 40 years. A generation had died while wandering, their lifespan "seventy, or even by reason of strength eighty" (Psalm 90:10). Witnessing the passing of some of his family of God, Moses was taught to number his days. Our one life on earth is quite short in the realm of eternity. How will we spend the time we have? 
Our Western North Dakota/ Eastern Montana District WMF Fall Rally was held at Emmanuel Free Lutheran Church in Williston on October 15th. Our theme verse was "hold fast to the word of Life" taken from Philippians 2:14-16. Our speakers were Steve & Glenda

Kvale, AFLC Missionaries on loan to Wycliffe. The Kvales work from their home in SW Minnesota as IT support/Admin Support/Bible Translators for Wycliffe. Wycliffe is currently involved in over 2400 translation projects. There are 1680 languages and 247 sign languages that don't have any translation projects started yet. Steve and Glenda feel a call to assist in sign language translation. They showed us a 3D animated avatar system for sign language. They translate bible texts into various sign languages and make the digital world accessible to the deaf. Steve showed us a video of a white man with a beard using sign language to "read/ sign" a bible passage. But on the screen you would see an Avatar, who looks like the native people group who the bible was being translated for, doing the sign language. Amazing stuff as dedicated people try to bring God's word to all people in their "heart language"! Another activity demonstrated all of the support people that are needed to help bring the Bible to people who do not have any scripture in their language. The WMF has opportunities to pray, encourage, and financially support our AFLC missionaries on loan to various Bible Translation Agencies. We had a wonderful day of fellowship, and I

would encourage all ladies to attend their District Rallies and be blessed!

Remember, Remember!

Did your parents ever say to you, "Remember to clean your plate! "Remember to pick up your room!" "Remember to be home by midnight!" As a child or a teenager, the call to remember can be quite annoying! "Yeah, yeah, I know," we might say. "You do NOT need to keep reminding me!"

I grew up on a farm, and one of my jobs was to wash the eggs. "Remember to wash the eggs," my mom would say. I often put it off until 10 p.m. or later, and sometimes when my mom came home at 11:30 from her nursing shift, I was still washing eggs. But sometimes I got distracted doing other things and simply forgot.

The call to remember was much worse coming from my older, bossy brothers: "Remember to milk the cows if we're not home by 5:30!" I'm quite sure they intentionally waited until 6 p.m. or later to come home from the field in hopes that I would be almost done milking the cows, so they didn't have to. That seemed to happen regularly. But sometimes I got distracted by other things, like washing their filthy farm clothes, or maybe even playing piano (which I enjoyed much more). And sometimes I just didn't want to milk the cows and intentionally didn't.

God wants us to remember some very important things in the Bible, but sometimes we get distracted and forget to remember. And sometimes we just don't want to do the *work* of remembering. We become lazy and apathetic.

In the book of Deuteronomy and beyond, God says again and again through His prophets, "Remember . . . that you were

slaves in Egypt, and how the LORD your God delivered you!" But sometimes God's people got distracted and did not remember, or chose not to remember.

When we are teaching in our congregations, it's easy to get distracted by an overwhelming proliferation of resources available. We may even be distracted by *good* things. And sometimes we get bored of hearing the same thing over and over. We think: *Yeah, yeah, we know. You do NOT need to keep telling us.* But we DO need continual reminding of essential Bible truths, especially those that show our sinfulness and need of a Savior and those that teach God's deliverance through Jesus our Redeemer. These are truths that are foundational to all our publications, and we intend to keep telling them!

We are excited for four new publications coming in 2023, Lord-willing. Please pray for the many facets of these projects:

new Ten Commandments curriculum for children. We iust received the final illustrations from our artist and expect the student leaflets to go to press soon.

Our theme at the Free Lutheran Bible School this year comes from Matthew 7:24-25, the end of the Sermon on the Mount where Jesus tells His audience that if their lives are not built on the firm foundation of the Truth of Scripture, they will crumble when trials and tribulations come. I believe this has always been an underlying theme of the College, to be grounded in the Word of God, to recognize the firm foundation of Christ and build your life upon Him. It is an important and meaningful mission that we have and I believe as the younger generations are being bombarded with lies and ones that sometimes even sound very loving and inclusive, it is more important than ever that we are intentionally investing in speaking Truth to these generations. We cannot passively sit back and assume they will learn it somewhere, it has to come from home, from church, from places like FLBC, from you.



I have been so encouraged to see students coming in, recognizing their need for truth and discernment and seeking to grow in their rela-

tionship with the Lord. Encouraged to see churches investing in these students and desiring to come alongside of them and encourage them in their walk. Students at FLBC have had an increasing desire for their relationship with the Lord to deepen. We have seen this in students forming their own study groups and waking up early to study Scripture and pray before class. In addition, students have been asking the hard questions and honestly seeking objective truth from God's Word instead of subjective truth.

The ministry at FLBC has had to adapt to the cultural changes over the last couple of years. We still have fun, don't get me wrong, but we have recognized in a lot of ways we were more focused on community than we were on Christ. I have loved seeing the Student Council recognize that and implement activities on campus focused on Christ over community. For example, they have started student led monthly service projects in the

surrounding area, monthly vespers held on Campus where the Lord is worshipped and glorified, and student led, non-mandatory devos during community time on Fridays where students choose to dig into God's Word as a community

Spring. In many ways, this word carries greater significance for those who have endured the cold and snow of winter in all its fullness. The snow melts. Spring showers come. Tulips and daffodils emerge. Spring is a season of new life and growth. Though San Antonio already feels much more like summer, God has blessed our family, hearts, and vision with a spring of our own!

Our next steps include continuing to get the word out to supporters, furthering connections in Ankeny, finding housing, and gathering a launch team. It is a season of spring in our ministry as God grows the vision for a church plant!
