WOMEN'S MINISTRY LOOKS DIFFERENT IN EACH CHURCH

On January 15th the Advisory Board, consisting of eight women from districts across the country, held a video conference with the WMF board. President, Lavonne West, opened our meeting using Psalm 23 encouraging us to find our rest, guidance and relationship with Jesus

first and then with each other.

As women from different districts shared, we saw that women's ministry looks different in each church. Many churches have a small core of women faithfully reading and sharing God's word while they serve and lead. Some churches meet monthly while some meet several times a year and some more frequently. Ministries shared include serving, cleaning, quilting along with activities to support world and local missions. Some churches have a ministry to street people, fund-raise for local medical needs, and provide after school programs.

Flexibility and change are key in this busy, Covid world! Churches may have a Women's Coordinator rather than traditional officers and may have one or more Bible studies at various times. We discussed that as mostly older generation ladies we need to meet younger women where they are. Building relationships may look like; "Party of Five" where 5 ladies meet for lunch 3 times a year and share devotions or having a small group cross generational Bible study of several older and several younger women. Many younger women will lead and be involved as they are able. We need to affirm their important role as Mothers in this season of their lives.

Our challenge in this busy world is to pass the baton to the next generation of women. We want to keep our eyes on Jesus and his word as we present the work of our AFLC. May we see it as the privilege it is and embrace it with joy.



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THE LORD'S UNFAILING LOVE

PASTOR ROBERT LEE WRITING A HISTORY OF THE AFLC

Who was that again? Where did that event take place? What happened? If you need help remembering names and

places and events in the AFLC, you might ask Pastor Robert Lee, who has a longstanding reputation of mentally cataloging such details and recalling them with ease. If you visited him in his office during the past few years, he may have shared recent discoveries with you while sifting through piles of boxes and files of archival documents and paraphernalia. You see, Pastor Lee is working on a book to be published by Ambassador Publications on the history of the AFLC-Volume VI in the AFLC Heritage Series. The working title of this volume is From Freedom to Life: A History of the Association of Free Lutheran Congregations.


In the opening chapter, Lee provides background on what preceded the beginnings of the AFLC in 1962. He also makes personal connections to his home congregation in Escanaba, Michigan, and tells of

his experience as district Luther League president when he was asked to participate in a debate about the impending church merger and assigned to present the opposing side of the argument. In the continuing chapters, Lee unfolds the story of the AFLC through narrative, personal commentary, and related photographs, documents, and diagrams.

Pastor Lee has written drafts of ten chapters so far and is in the process of refining the earlier chapters. There is much yet to be accomplished on this project, but we hope to begin taking pre-orders for the book in the summer of 2022 with a publication goal of 2023. Please pray for us and join us in praying for wisdom and clarity for Pastor Lee, who has diligently devoted himself to this task. We know this book will be a great blessing to us and to generations to come!

"You're so lucky your kids live in Hawaii!" "Well, at least you have a great destination to visit!" But in the back of my mind, I'm thinking, "But they live 4,004 miles away from us!"

Like any mom, I'd love to have all of our chicks close to the nest, living in the same town as us. Seeing each other at church on Sunday. Having them over for meals on a regular basis. Being able to

help them more hands on with repairs and parenting.

But alas, that is not the way it is. Our son Brady Arneson is the pastor of the Waikiki Beach Gathering in Honolulu, Hawaii. Our son Kyle and his wife Marli also live there, and they have played key roles in the leadership and development of this innovative church on the beach.

I remember when Brady left for Hawaii in the fall of 2016, all by himself, feeling a strong call from God to start this church. I was conflicted. Part of me wanted to say "Just stay here. We can serve God all together, here, just like we did during your growing up years."

But I knew that's where God wanted him. And there was no way I was going to be 'that mom.' I don't want my kids saying "I'm pretty sure God wants me to go there, but my mom....."

So yes, they live far away. They don't live in the same town as us, but our family is doing

SHORT-TERM MISSIONS





My first short-term mission experience is unforgettable! In 1978 I was 22 years old and ready to embark on my first adventure outside of the USA. God had already placed on my heart the certainty that He wanted me to serve Him in global missions. With a heart full of expectations, I boarded the plane for Brazil and entered a new world that would one day become my home and mission field for life. I wanted to learn everything I could in those six weeks overseas. Although my limited knowledge of Portuguese left me curious about many things happening around me, I felt very welcomed and en-

joyed all the experiences with missionaries and nationals. Immersed in a new culture and surrounded by people speaking a different language, I needed to depend on the Lord for daily guidance and grace.

Turn the clock forward forty plus years. That first short-term missionary experience resulted in a lifetime of missionary service. During these years we have received many short-term mission groups. Our motto for these volunteers has been "Work Hard, Pray Hard, Play Hard." We encourage participants to give of themselves whole-heartedly, to trust God amid new (and sometimes scary) experiences, and to make sure they have a great time!

Short-term mission trips can serve as a great tool for overseas ministry, benefitting both the ones

going as well as the ones receiving. Journey Missions teams introduce participants to global missions and the life of a missionary. They build relationships with people in another culture while learning the joys of serving. They connect stateside congregations to mission opportunities abroad.

Although concrete results are often hard to measure, those of us on the receiving end have sensed that the encouragement and impetus of short-term groups have been beneficial. Our family has been richly blessed by volunteers who came to help with homeschooling when our kids were young. Other groups and individuals have helped us with construction projects. One time we had the privilege of receiving the girls' choir from Arlington, WA. They came prepared to minister through song and testimony. Many of the young people who came on short-term experiences had a big impact on our children, serving as role models and helping them want to live their lives in service for the Lord.

Perhaps the greatest long-term benefits of the Journey Missions program are seen in the transformation of those who offer their time and talents to serve for a short time on the field. In stretching beyond comfort zones as they humbly trust God and serve in practical ways, "short-termers" grow and are challenged in new ways of faith and service.

We welcome young and old alike to visit the mission field in order to get a personal experience with the global church. We hope that those who have participated in short-term mission experiences will continue to fulfill the Great Commission as they pray for missions, financially support missions, promote missions, and consider God's call to be a missionary.



RUNNING FOR JOY

Personal disclosure: My wife can run faster than me. I take comfort in that fact by reminding myself of two key points. First, my best race during my running days was the 800 meters, i.e., a short distance. And just to clarify, I can still run 800 meters faster than her, which leads to the second important point. I can run faster than my wife all the way up to sixteen miles. After sixteen miles, she has cleaned my clock three out of four times. No, I didn't let her win. Only one time was I able to cross the finish line in a marathon with her. The first time we ran that far in a race, she was literally running in circles around me to make sure I was OK. I still had miles (plural!) to go in the other two races when she had already finished.

Why do I do this to myself? I do this because it brings me joy. But my joy isn't in what I experience because it always ends painfully for me. My joy comes in seeing my dear wife run and seeing her smile at the finish line.

Trying to find joy in life can be difficult sometimes. We pass through weeks and months, even years of what may be constant difficulties leaving us feeling like we're running in shoes made of cement. But Jesus is an anchor for joy no matter how our lives are going. What we have in Him doesn't change because He doesn't change, and His promises don't change.

The prophet Habakkuk asserted that point emphatically when he said, "Though the fig tree should not blossom, nor fruit be on the vines, the produce of the olive fail and the fields yield no food, the flock be cut off from the fold and there be no herd in the stalls, yet I will rejoice in the Lord; I will take joy in the God of my salvation." (Hab. 3:17) Nothing may be going right for you, you may see no fruit from your labor, and life may feel like you're doing what marathoners call "the death shuffle." But you belong to Jesus, and your salvation is secure in Him, and at the end of your race, you will see your Savior's smile, so "I will rejoice in the Lord."
