

#### Plant for a good harvest

"Do not be deceived, God is not mocked; for whatever a man sows, this he will also reap. For the one who sows to his own flesh shall from the flesh reap corruption, but the one who sows to the Spirit shall from the Spirit reap eternal life" (Galatians 6:7, 8). The Scriptures here use a law of nature to demonstrate an important law in the spiritual realm.

What confusion would result if plants were not consistent in their production of fruit! Few farmers would remain in the business if they could not be assured of what would grow from the seed they planted. It is a God-ordained law of nature that plants produce seeds after their own kind. Without it, chaos would prevail. The idea of a farmer planting

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wheat and getting cabbages or pineapples is ridiculous. Yet, there are people who live as if this law were not operational

The first clause of our text is important. "Do not be deceived." Man in his self-sufficiency, arrogance and pride has the notion that he can somehow beat the odds. He can make it his own way. He can get along without God. He can outwit God. He can shove God aside, govern his own affairs, and if some day he should discover that God is needed. then, but not until then, he will give God a chance. Satan is the great deceiver. And man deceives himself. He does it to himself more effectively than anyone else. "All the ways of a man are right in his own eyes" (Proverbs 16:2). Man thinks, "I'm too smart to get caught. If I should some day be proven wrong, at least I was sincere and that should count for something." Does it? If I either purposely or mistakenly plant wild oats, will my sincerity or wishful anticipation make it come up wheat or even oats? Of course not. "Do not be deceived."

"The heart is more deceitful than all else and is desperately sick; who can understand it?" (Jeremiah 17:9). Until God convinces us of the fact, we fail to know that the only way to the Father is by way of Jesus. We do not come to Jesus on our own either. Jesus said, "No one can come to Me, unless the Father who sent Me draws him" (John 6:44).

"God is not mocked." He will not be fooled. He will not be surprised or

caught off guard by the schemes of men. He will not be proven wrong. What He said will occur, will.


Everyone will reap a harvest. There will be no crop failure. Even though a person may wish that his sowing would be without effect, he will not be without a harvest. We cannot escape the fact that what we plant will produce a crop.

The person who lives for self, seeking to satisfy the lusts and passions of the natural man, will reap a harvest of corruption. Living with one's eyes on this world and what one can get from it will result in bankruptcy and death. "Whoever wishes to save his life shall lose it; but whoever loses his life for My sake shall find it" (Matthew 16:25).

If we would see a good harvest, our lives must be lost to God's control. To submit to Him—confessing sin, receiving His salvation, seeking His righteousness—this is sowing the seed that God will raise up unto eternal life. To surrender to the working of the Holy Spirit in our lives will result in a harvest of great abundance. God promises it.

The curses or the blessings of the harvest affect more than the person who did the sowing. God visits the iniquity of the fathers upon the children and often spills the mercies and graces that lead people to faith into the lives of the children of those who have planted unto life

As God guides our seedtime so He will bless our harvest.

At a time when President Reagan, the commander-in-chief of our armed forces, and the one man most responsible for the safety of our nation from invading forces, is advocating a strengthening of our armed forces, there is a strong reaction to such strengthening and the advocating of total nuclear disarmament by all nations in the interest of peace. Billy Graham, whose voice has been heard around the world as a Christian leader, has publicly proclaimed his support in favor of such disarmament.

Certainly disarmament would make for a much better and safer world if it could be graciously agreed to and carried out by all nations. However, the very suggesting of such a proposal raises some serious questions, such as: "To what danger are we exposing ourselves as a nation by entering into such an agreement with Communistic nations, especially Russia?" The Communists, especially Russia, do not have a good reputation for living up to their word, They seem to be anxious to talk peace when it is to their advantage, but think nothing of invading some country almost at the same time.

Suppose we came to a satisfactory agreement with these Communistic countries in disarming ourselves of all nuclear armament; and then suppose that we as a nation faithfully lived up to our agreement, but then discovered later to our great dismay that they had not kept their end of the bargain, but in secret had built up rather than diminished their nuclear weapons. Wouldn't

that put us at a most tragic disadvantage? They would then be in a position where they could conquer and enslave us in a short while. It is horrifying to think of what could happen.

And if a treaty of nuclear disarmament were agreed upon, who would police it to see that all parts of the agreement were strictly adhered to? Would Russia or some other Communistic country allow us to spy into its every government affair and search every corner of its land (as if such were even possible) to see if there were any nuclear weapons?

And would we be willing to let Russia and other Communistic countries completely spy out our government and all its affairs as well as our land, and then report back their findings to their own government, whom we have long mistrusted, in order that they might use such information to their advantage against us.

Some advocate armament with nonnuclear weapons as an alternative, but that also would put us at a great disadvantage if an enemy is not living up to such an agreement.

You may say, "We should love all people, including the Communists." True, God commands the same, but God hasn't said we should foolishly trust all people when they don't prove trustworthy. To love and to trust are not the same.

Or you may say, "If we pursue peace, God will protect us and let no harm come to us." But God is known to protect those who make an earnest effort to

protect themselves and who are obedient to His will and refrain from sin.

Even David, as a boy, had his sling for protection as he approached Goliath in open warfare (I Samuel, chapter 17). This was at a time when Israel was protecting herself from a foreign enemy. The sling was the weapon David was most familiar with and most capable of using at that time. Later, when older and stronger, he carried a sword. True, it was not David who overcame his enemy. It was God. Nevertheless, it was God working with David. David had a small part and God blessed his efforts.

Gideon, who cut down his force to 300 men, did not practice total disarmament. The 300 were the very best of the total who came out for battle. Again it was God who gave Gideon and his men the victory. These Old Testament saints did their best to protect themselves, while at the same time relying on God, and God gave them victory.

But even more important than working with God for our protection, we need to take a stand against and refrain from sin. We might well wonder to what extent we can depend on God's protection in warfare when we have gross drunkenness, greed, murder (abortion) and every known sin being practiced with little restraint throughout our land.

During the time of the Judges (when Samuel as a boy was under the care of Eli) the nation was engaged in war and assumed that God would protect them if they took the Ark of the Covenant into battle with them, as God had often done in the past. But now the nation had drifted into sin. The final result was that the Ark inspired the enemy and caused a great defeat to the Israelites (I Samuel, chapter 4).

Throughout the history of God's people, as recorded in the Old Testament. we see where God was with His people and often gave them victory in warfare. However, total disarmament was never practiced.

The time when Jesus walked on this

earth happened to be a time of peace and we do not have New Testament examples of God's being with His people in time of war such as we have in the Old Testament. However, Jesus strongly advocated loyalty and obedience to the government power and did not make war an exception. He did not openly oppose war. He seems to take for granted that it is a tool of a ruling power. In the New Testament both Jesus and Paul refer to war as something needful at times (see Luke 14:31 and I Corinthians 14:8). The Christian walk is compared to a warfare.

Even if man were stripped of every weapon ever invented, this would not end all wars. If man had no weapons, yet because of the sin and hatred that is in his heart, he would still fight with his fists and kick with his feet. And even if his hands and feet were tied, sin and hatred would fester and grow in his heart, longing to express itself in some kind of violence or open warfare.

It is a new heart, cleansed of sin and hate, such as only Jesus can give, which is man's greatest need. And this is also the greatest need among the Communists. Christ must enter the hearts of all concerned before we can hope to

have any successful disarmament program. According to Scripture, this is not very likely to happen in a nation-wide or world-wide degree before Jesus comes again and sets up His kingdom on this earth.

In the meantime, peace of any kind on a national level is not to be obtained by laying down our arms in front of our enemy. That would only lead to enslavement.

True peace to the Christian in this sincursed, war-torn world is realized first of all in being in a right relationship with God, refraining from sin and, in obedience to God warring with Him against the forces of evil.

Christianity is a warfare. God is with those who are on the side of good according to God's standard. This is a much surer way to safety and peace than disarmament.

At the hearing in Cormorant Twp., there were over 60 people there in opposition to our having a wilderness

camp. They had a petition with 136 signatures against our having a Bible Camp. It looked hopeless. At the hearing with Becker County, which I tried to cancel, they planned to approve it at their next meeting and recommended the County do the same. It was approved, even though there were people speaking against it.

A little information to let you know what is being done. The sewer system has been installed. A well will be drilled soon. Mr. George Hartman will be building the road. Mr. Arlo Kneeland has offered a mobile home for a caretaker to live in at less than half the

value and will move it from Summit, S. Dak., for that price. Our greatest need now is someone to live in the mobile home. Pray for this need.

We are planning a wilderness camp the weekend of July 30-Aug. 1. The evening speaker, and he will also be bringing the Sunday morning message, is Rev. Richard Snipstead, President of the AFLC. Rev. John Strand will be leading the Bible study on Saturday and Sunday mornings. Come and see this land given by the Dahlgrens which offers much potential.

#### HOME MISSION NEWS

## CHURCH

When thinking of Church Extension, land, buildings, new construction, thousands of dollars, interest rates, and repayment schedules are often items of serious consideration. Currently 13 AFLC congregations receive Church Extension Funds and thus deal with some or all of these matters. However, Church Extension involves and means much more than the material and mechanical. The primary purpose of Church Extension is to assist in building the kingdom of God. Following are the testimonies of two Home Missions pastors whose congregations have borrowed from Church Extension for buildings and property. They express very well the need, the goal and the benefits of the Church Extension Fund.

#### "If There Were No Church Extension Fund"

What would happen if there were no Church Extension Fund from which Home Mission congregations could borrow money for church buildings? Had it not been for this important Fund our congregation in Bismarck might not have a church building yet. Being we commenced with only one couple we naturally grew very slowly. Certainly no bank would have granted a loan to a tiny group like ours. However, our Church Extension Fund provided us with a loan for the purchase of a building.

This loan gave us identity as a church. Shortly after we purchased our building, a young man remarked to me, "Now you will be identified as a church." Being identified as a church is indeed a great help in bringing in new people.

Another benefit of receiving a loan from Church Extension is that having a church building gives the aspect of permanence to that work. Recently, our new neighbor told my wife that I had visited them when they first moved into another location in Bismarck over three-years ago. She commented, "But you

didn't have a permanent meeting place then." The implication was that since we had no church building at that time, therefore they weren't interested in our work. Church buildings that are made possible through loans from our Extension Fund enable Home Mission work to get established and to grow.

Having had the experience of starting a Home Mission congregation I clearly see the great necessity of our Church Extension Fund. I thank God for it. My congregation and I are deeply grateful to all of you who have made contributions or loans to our Church Extension Fund.



## editorials

#### **BIBLE CAMPS**

This issue of *The Lutheran Ambassador* contains *some* information about *some* of the Bible camps which will be operated in the Association of Free Lutheran Congregations this summer. We wish the list could be complete, but it isn't. But there is enough information, we trust, so that your appetite is whetted for the coming camping season.

The name "Bible camp" brings forth many images to us, according to our experiences. As to natural settings: cabins nestled among the pines, or on the hillside by a prairie lake, or dormitories built near small oak trees, with much open space for the warming sun, or camp buildings near a mountain lake or river, the forested slopes reaching up toward God.

And the pictures of camp life come to mind: the morning bell awakening the camp family to a new day; the happy clatter of mealtimes; the banter when a friend is called for KP duty; the fun of playing softball or volleyball; the refreshment of a swim; the browsing the little bookstore which has been set up; the friendships of the evening before the call to return to the cabins or dorms.

And the real purpose of camp, seen in these reflections: boys and girls in morning devotions, heads bowed as the blessing of God is asked for the day; youth, Bibles opened, following along as a pastor guides them in a study of God's Word; a missionary telling of her experiences in some far-off land; discussion groups; voices raised in joyful sound during choir rehearsal; the evening service with a pastor calling the young people to follow Jesus Christ, to commit life to Him; the earnestness of the campfire as some campers tell what the Lord means to them; the devotions before lights out, when in the smaller group still others get the courage to share and pray aloud.

Again this year, many of the pastors of our church and many lay volunteers will fill the positions of leadership in the Bible camps: dean, manager, dean of boys, dean of girls, counsellor, choir director, recreation director, lifeguard, bookstore manager, cook, the list goes on. Pastors, missionaries, professors, laymen have been secured as Bible teachers and speakers. Even now they are praying and preparing for their assignments. They want to be at their best for their great responsibilities.

Last, but by no means least, hundreds of Association young people and some visiting friends will come to these camps. Some will come with a real spiritual longing to know more of Christ. They will be the easy ones with whom to work. They will drink in the Word. Some will come with no fixed goal in mind, but with the fealing they ought to be there. They usually work into the camp program more and more as the week wears on. Still others come only to accompany a friend or because a great deal of pressure was applied at home or because they want a "good time." The outcome of their week

can be mixed. But the Word of God is there and the Holy Spirit is there and so great things *can* happen. And if there are no immediate results for good in those lives, still the seed is sown and something may later on be recalled.

A group of people hasn't even been mentioned yet. We are thinking of all those folks who make our camps possible because they have built them or at least maintain them. What a host they are. How impossible to begin to name names, but they certainly deserve our thanks. Remember that when you go to a Bible camp. There's more than meets the eye.

We have centered our thinking on youth camps today. There are Family camps also, with their youth sections. Some of our people plan on attending a family camp each year as a part of their vacation. Perhaps you could do that also. A number of such camps are available to us including the two official ones, at Lake Bronson and Osceola. (Add also the wilderness camp at Lake Park.)

May the Lord bless the camping season of 1982. It could be the best ever.

#### SEVEN MILES

A fundamentalist college is reported to have advertised its location as being seven miles from any know form of sin.

We smile at that, wondering how anyone could be so naive. We know better from personal experience. Even though we may at times feel that we have put some geographical distance between ourselves and the sinful world, the devil and our own sinful flesh remain nearby to cause us all kinds of troubles.

And speaking of the world, television has made it more difficult to escape the world's influences. We feel sorry for parents who have so many unwanted influences right in their own homes for their children to see and hear. The right Christian home will exert some censorship, but it isn't easy. As adults, we feel that we can manage things better for ourselves. But do we do so well? Sometimes we have to say, thank God for the summertime when there is less time to be indoors and under the influence of the "tube."

Then there are the books. Recently we had occasion to stop in a small North Dakota town for a noon meal. Noticing a sign in the cafe about a book sale at the local school, we decided to check it out. The sale consisted mostly of paperbacks and we were surprised that some of the books had even been a part of the school library. At least they were being sold in a school. How times have changed!

Seven miles from any know form of sin, indeed! Our Bible School has certainly not been able to make that claim, ever. Some of our students are wise enough to realize that some of Satan's attacks get even more devious in such a setting.

And our churches. They may be protected by local law from being near liquor outlets. But sin intrudes anyway. A worldly spirit can be present. Individual sins bother the membership. The congregation may divide into factions; quar-

#### FATHER'S DAY



## How may we get spiritual power?

by Martin Hegland (Continued from last time)

On the other hand I interpret the Lord's statement "Not by might, nor by power, but by My Spirit," to mean that by the help of God we shall surely succeed in our life and work, as Christians. Let me remind you of Jesus' assuring words to the disciples. "Ye shall receive power when the Holy Spirit is come upon you." This promise I sincerely believe holds good today as it did in the days of the Apostles. I believe that God is faithful and that His arm is not shortened. I believe that whenever and wherever men permit the Spirit of God to take possession of them, they become spiritually powerful men.

The Spirit of God works wonders. He convicts us of sin and of our own utter impotence to save ourselves. He points us to Christ as our redeeming Lord and creates faith in Him as a personal Savior. As a fire He purges out the dross in our old nature and progressively recreates us into likeness with the character of the Son.

The Holy Spirit produces a profound sense of gratitude for salvation; He gives birth to a burning zeal for spreading the Gospel; He creates courage to bear witness in the most difficult situations; He develops a faith that can remove mountains; He creates a love to Christ and fellowmen that makes a man willing to sacrifice time, money, ease, comforts and all things for the sake of Christ's cause.

A writer calls attention to the experience of a ship in going up through a series of locks. When the gates are closed behind and the sluice ways opened in front, the water from above rushes down and bodily lifts the ship and allows it to glide along on the higher level.

Something like this happens when the Spirit of God comes down from above. He lifts men up onto a higher plane of living and doing.

By means of a slender wire a body of only very small weight may be lifted; but let that wire be used to conduct an electric current from a power station to a hoisting engine and that crane will lift a load of thousands of pounds. So by means of our own strength we are able to accomplish nothing of consequence for the kingdom of God. But if we permit ourselves to become channels through which dynamic strength from God's own power station flows, we shall be able to accomplish the unbelievable. The day of miracles is not past. A regenerated, consecrated, Spirit-filled soul is a moral and spiritual miracle, which can not be explained in terms of anything natural. He is one of God's perpetual wonders.

Who can measure the possibilities latent in a body of Christian men and women?

What if the large number of pastors and teachers in our church could be so filled with power by the Holy Spirit that in their congregations and schools they would proclaim the whole counsel of God without fear or favor? What if their souls were really gripped with a passion for souls and concern for the eternal welfare of their fellowmen?

What if the lay people in the congregations were filled with the Spirit of God to hold up the hands of their pastors, to besiege the throne of grace for profound spiritual stirrings among our people, and to live lives in sincere harmony with their Christian profession?

What if the Christian students in our schools and colleges were endued with power from God to stand up for Christ and to show forth His glory before their fellow students?

Oh, friends, a mighty transformation in our church would result, if we all were filled with the Holy Spirit.

We come now to the consideration of a searching question, "Do we really want the Holy Spirit?"

There is with God no lack of power; there is no lack of His willingness to give us spiritual reinforcement for overcoming great obstacles and for accomplishing vast tasks. The only uncertain factor is our own attitude toward the reception of spiritual power.

Are we really anxious for power to overcome the world and to live strong spiritual lives? Are we really deeply concerned about the unsaved people that are living all about us? Are our hearts really gripped by the suffering of humanity? Do we really love Christ? Do we really want to build His kingdom? Are we really willing that God should take complete possession of us? Are we really willing that God have the control of our money, our talents, our whole lives? Are we really willing to open up the sluice gates of our being and let the fulness of the Spirit flood our lives with power from on high?

Or must we confess that we rather love the world, that unsaved souls do not trouble us greatly, that we are more or less callous to human suffering, that we love ourselves pretty much, that we are not particularly enthusiastic about Christ's kingdom, that we hesitate to give God the control of our lives, that we love our luxurious homes, our elegant cars, our flesh-pleasing comforts, that we rather fear that the Spirit of God might lead us into sacrificial ways?

Oh, how many of us, who bear the Christian name, must confess, if we are sincere, that we are merely playing at the business of being Christians. We are so full of the world that we have no place for the Spirit. We are in very truth trying to serve God and Mammon.

No wonder we are weak; no wonder we are indifferent; no wonder we are lifeless; no wonder we are fearful; no wonder we are selfish; no wonder we are [Continued on page 14]

holding back; no wonder we have deficits in our budget; no wonder our churches are marking time, while precious blood-bought souls by the millions are passing into a hopeless eternity.

Oh, for preachers of repentance; oh, for the divine lightnings of God to strike us to earth and reveal to us our deadly sins of smug satisfaction, of selfishness, and of disobedience.

God cannot use us because our hearts are divided; Christ cannot compel us because we love the world; the Holy Spirit cannot fill us because the channels are clogged.

Oh, for influences to bring us upon our knees in confession of sins, with pleas for pardon, with a willingness to consecrate ourselves completely in the Lord's service, and with eagerness to be filled with God's power for spiritual achievement! IV.

Before that first great outpouring of the Holy Spirit the early Christians "all with one accord continued steadfastly in prayer." That tells the secret of the Spirit's coming.

God repeatedly connects the giving of His gifts with the practice of prayer; and of the giving of the Holy Spirit in particular, Christ says, "If ye then, being evil, know how to give good gifts unto your children, how much more shall your heavenly Father give the Holy Spirit to them that ask Him?" (Luke 11:13).

If we "have not" the Holy Spirit in abundance, it is because we "ask not."

But the prayer that brings results is not the isolated, thoughtless petition.

The effective prayer comes only out of a life attuned to God by constant and close fellowship. The effective prayer re-

quires a condition of absolute surrender; the effective prayer thrives only in an atmosphere of childlike trust and abiding faith; the effective prayer is found only where obedience to the will of God is growing more and more complete. Prayer out of such lives will release a flood-tide of power from God among men.

In the presence, then, of vast hostile forces and formidable obstacles on one hand, and the rich promises of God on the other, let our Christian men and women draw near to God in an attitude of so complete a consecration that our prayers will bring down upon our people pentecostal outpourings of the Holy Spirit, with great power for spiritual conquest.
