

Bearing fruit

"You did not choose Me, but I chose you, and appointed you, that you should go and bear fruit, and that your fruit should remain; that whatever you ask of the Father in My name, He may give to you" (Jn. 15:16).

God works to glorify His Name. He demonstrates His characteristics of omnipotence, holiness and graciousness by bringing forth fruits from people who without His intervention are barren and useless. When a person is called from a life of waste and sin to Christ, is joined to Him, and thus becomes fruitful, God's reputation is enhanced.

It is for the purpose of fruit bearing that Christ chooses and appoints us. He came to separate unto Himself a people equipped for good works. He calls us

from sin and works to produce in us that which would bring praise to God. Only as we abide in Him and have Him abiding in us can we bear fruit for God. To abide in Him is to rest only in His merits for salvation. To have Him abiding in us is to know His presence and power through the Word of God.

Fruitlessness is a symptom of a most severe disorder. The one who bears no fruit, by that fruitlessness shows that he is severed from Christ, for it is impossible to be a partaker of Christ's blessed graces and remain fruitless. The person in the right relationship with Christ will bear fruit. "He who began a good work in you will perfect it. . . ." (Phil. 1:6). God hates fruitlessness.

As I look closely at these verses I note that Jesus never mentioned little fruit. He speaks of "more fruit" and "much fruit" but never "little fruit." Is it possible that there is no such thing as a small degree of fruitfulness? It appears so. Jesus said that those who abide in Him with Him abiding in them bear *much* fruit. He leaves no middle ground. We are either in the right relationship with Christ resulting in much fruit or are not right with Him resulting in no fruit.

The much fruit in the life of the believer is accomplished by his union with Christ. The fruits of Christ's holy life and all His merits become the possession of the one who trusts in Him. That is much fruit.

The believer's union with Christ also results in a changed life—a life of good

works which bring glory to God (Matt. 5:16). The power of Christ in the life of the believer is no mean power. The vine, Christ, is not limited in its supply of fruit-producing juices. So much grace comes to the believer as a result of His union with Christ that the result is always much fruit. God is glorified with much fruit, He desires much fruit, He is able to bring forth much fruit. He is "able to do exceeding abundantly beyond all that we ask or think" (Eph. 3:20).

While much fruit does exist in the believer's life, God desires more and to that end faithfully works. So that His faithful ones might bear more fruit He prunes or purges or cleanses them. He knows how much fruit they are capable of bearing. He knows when they need pruning. He knows how much and what kind of pruning they need. The faithful branches resign themselves to the will of the Vinedresser. They submit to His reproofs and respond to His corrections. They realize their knowledge is limited and their desires often selfish and shortsighted so they joyfully give consent to the wishes and methods of the Father. They rejoice in all that God does to produce more fruit. They even rejoice in tribulations and trials (Rom. 5:3-5, Jas. 1:2-4). They mean it when they pray, "Thy will be done."

Father, glorify Thy name through us. For the sake of Thy name purge us, and grant us Thy grace. Amen.

Welcome from our host congregation

Dear Members and Friends of the AFLC:

It is our privilege and pleasure to host the 20th Annual Conference of the AFLC. We welcome you to Dickinson and trust that your stay with us will be comfortable and enjoyable as well as interesting.

Dickinson is a growing city of about 18,000 people. Much of this growth is due to our location in the Williston Basin which has a vast reserve of oil, gas and coal. We see new businesses and new families moving into our city every day.

I believe that you will find Dickinson a friendly city with a wide range of services and shopping. Dickinson has three pools and 29 parks. There is a golf course open to the public and a large lake for your enjoyment. Dickinson is the home of Dickinson State College, a four-year college with an enrollment of

over 1,000 students. We are only 45 miles south of the Killdeer Mountains and about a half-hour drive from the Badlands and Theodore Roosevelt National Memorial Park. Suggestions for things to do and see will be in your packets when you come.

Our conference will be held at Dickinson State College. All the sessions will be there as well as meals served and housing. We have reserved Woods Hall for housing and you can stay there for \$5.00 a night. There will be a \$1.00 charge for bedding. This includes sheets, pillow slip, towels, wash cloth, but *does not include* blankets. This you will have to bring. I believe that you will find Woods Hall very comfortable and there will be no need for reservations. If you plan to stay in a motel, I would strongly suggest making reservations a number of weeks in advance.

The college will also serve three meals a day and will provide special meeting places and meals for the corporation meetings and pastors' banquet. There is a good variety of eating places in Dickinson, but I think that you will find the college meals good and more reasonable.

The sessions will be held in May Hall, which has a large comfortable auditorium that seats well over 600 on the main floor.

WORLD MISSION NEWS

One whole year

"How time flies," even here in slow, "siempre mañana" (always tomorrow) Paraguay, and we have been here for a whole year now. We have been through the hot/humid and cold/rainy seasons. Our first three months here, when we were without contact with fellow missionaries in Brazil and the Mission Board in the States, seemed very long. Yet, the Lord saw to it that we had plenty to do with setting up housekeeping in Ciudad Presidente Stroessner and beginning inquiries into what was necessary for the document process.

Before we left the States, we met with the Vice-Consul of the Paraguayan Consulate in Chicago. He stamped our documents free of charge and wished us well in Paraguay. With that we praised the Lord and said, "Now we shouldn't have any problems getting our documents in Paraguay." But we had a feeling as we said those words that it wouldn't be that simple. In those first three months we found out that the documents we brought with us were only a few of the papers needed for the work of registering our mission with the Paraguayan government.

The following six months, May to November, we waited for documents concerning the AFLC to arrive. Then we had to have them translated. But the Lord gave us plenty to do while we "waited." Every three months, until we get our permanent visas, we must leave the country for at least 24 hours. So we have made four trips to Brazil, were we visited the AFLC missionaries and shared in their work while there. Those trips have been times of spiritual, emotional and physical revitalization, as well as times to encourage the missionaries and churches.

At the end of June we left Rebekah in Ciudad Presidente Stroessner with some Free Brethren Missionaries from New Zealand, while we went to Asuncion to await the birth of our second child. On June 27, 1981, after only three hours of

labor, God blessed us with Rachel Louise. She has been such a good, happy, healthy baby, for which we truly thank the Lord.

In September, while in Campo Mourao on a visa renewal trip to Brazil, we had the privilege of preparing the "little red house" for occupancy and meeting Charles' parents, Rev. George and Helen Knapp, in Maringa, as they returned from a furlough in the States. This was a very joyous reunion. Grandpa and Grandma seemed very happy to meet their new little granddaughter.

On November 4, arrangements were finalized for us to move to Hernandarias, a city 16 kilometers north of Stroessner. This city already has one hydroelectric dam. But when the Itaipu dam construction is complete, this city will truly be the "hydroelectric captial of the continent." With three days' notice, we packed up and moved on November 7. This house is much larger and is closer to the Brazilian people, with whom we feel the Lord has called us to work, for now. It is our prayer that the Lord will open the way, providing the necessary financing in order to purchase this place unto the glory of His Name and the work of His Kingdom.

From the middle of December through January, Joyce and the girls were in Campo Mourao, while Charles made several trips back and forth to Asuncion for document work. Finally, the last week in January our documents were ready to present to the various government offices. Now the process has truly begun! It is only a matter of time before we will be called in for an interview. Much depends upon their impression of us at that interview. But we know that God has this under control, too.

As we look back over this year, we see that many things are just beginning for us. We are only beginning to make friends in our new neighborhood. We are still waiting for the money, which

"But when the Comforter is come, whom I will send unto you from the Father, even the Spirit of Truth, which proceedeth from the Father, He shall testify of me" (John 15:26).

Who among us doesn't need or like someone to bring comfort our way? Life can present some very trying and emotional situations. During these times of loneliness, emptiness, depression, anxiety, misunderstanding, accusation, sorrow and a host of other emotions often felt, we need to remember that Jesus has sent a Comforter to us. The Holy Spirit comes to us to minister as only the Spirit of Truth can minister.

Sometimes there are well-meaning friends who attempt to open themselves to us and share insights or answers to our problems or needs. Many times God uses them to bring help and healing to an aching heart. But the Holy Spirit is at a distinct advantage in that he really knows us. He really knows the truth about us. The truth is His specialty.

The Comforter calls us. The Holy Spirit comes to awaken us to our need of Christ Jesus. The Catechism teaches us that even our coming is inspired by the Spirit of Truth. "I believe that I cannot by my own reason or strength believe in Jesus Christ my Lord or come to Him: but the Holy Spirit has called me through the Gospel "Yes, it is the Holy Spirit who has convicted you of your sins. Truth reveals that you are indeed a sinner. And the Holy Spirit has convinced you that you are saved by the good news of salvation through the death of Christ. Some resist the call of the Holy Spirit to come to Jesus because they do not want to own up to their sins.

The sins of omission and commission are more easily remembered when they belong to others. But when the Spirit of Truth comes to us personally we really know that is is for my sins that Jesus died. "It's me, O Lord, standing in the need of prayer." That Spirit of Truth needs to continue His work in our lives. The Father of Lies will attempt to convince us that our sins are too great or grievous for God to forgive and cleanse. What joy comes to us when we truly

believe that Jesus came to be our very own personal Savior. This is the comfort that no one else can give. Troubled souls can find rest in Jesus. "The love of God is shed abroad in our hearts by the Holy Ghost which is given unto us" (Romans 5:5).

The Comforter comes to gather us. How good it is to have family gatherings. The holidays mean so much more when we have the privilege of spending time with our loved one. We are so thankful that in our years of ministry, usually many miles from our parental homes, that there have been those in the congregations we have served that have opened their hearts and homes to us. We have felt like we really belonged to them. Sometimes families can have disagreements, tensions, differing priorities or other problems, but yet the Lord has placed each in that family. And so it is with the family of God. The Psalmist tells us that it is good and pleasant for us to dwell in unity. Think of that first church. What a mixture of people were gathered by our Lord to learn of Him. Yet they loved one another. Today the Holy Spirit is needed to bring comfort to many a hurting believer within the particular family where God has placed him. It seems that to many the Golden Rule has become the forgotten rule.

A message for Pentecost

May the Holy Spirit remind us of the great truth as we pray the prayer that Jesus taught His disciples: "And forgive us our trespasses as we forgive those who trespass against us." Remembering this should bring Christians together, not drive them apart. There are many believers who are resisting the Holy Spirit's desire to gather the believers. They forsake the assembling of themselves as Hebrews 10:25 exhorts us. They do not care to bear one another's burdens; they must think that Christ isn't able to help them with that heavy load. It seems easier to allow wrongdoing in the church or believers' lives than to come before them with openness and honesty, so that healing may occur according to Biblical principles.

The Comforter enlightens us. What a joy to see people responding to the truth of God that they really do have potential. They see the gift that God has given them and begin to use it for His glory and honor. How sad it is to see believers who have not been enlightened to the fact that God has bestowed upon them gifts to be used in and for His kingdom. Jesus came that we might have life abundantly. God has good intentions for you. He wants you to be productive and happy in the ministry of the kingdom of God. Don't belittle the gift God has given you or someone else. Every gift and every person is important. A parent is so happy when he discovers that his offspring has finally come to peace about his vocation. Now the serious study and preparation can begin for a productive life. Could it be that God is anxiously awaiting some of His children to be enlightened to finally realize that they can do something and they can influence someone whom no one else can?

MILLION DOLLAR BUDGET?

No major decisions seem likely at our forthcoming Annual Conference in Dickinson, N.Dak., next month. No new ground may be broken. On the other hand, if action is taken to move toward the eventual publication of an Association hymnal, that would be a significant development indeed. We hope that happens.

But apart from that an historic event may occur in the Dickinson assembly and that is, the Association may vote her first million dollar budget, for the year 1983-84. We speak of the amount to be raised by the congregations and interested friends. It will happen if the trend of the past two years is anything to go by. There was a jump of over \$200,000 from 1980-81 to 1981-82. The increase was almost \$105,000 from 1981-82 to this current fiscal year. To go to \$1,000,000 in the fiscal year after this one would require an increase of not quite \$86,000. So the possibility is there, all right.

The Lutheran Free Church, which provided almost all the original congregations of the AFLC, never reached the million dollar mark in her 65-year history, although she would have made it in another year or two. The LFC had over five times the membership at the time of her merger with the American Lutheran Church than the Association has now after almost 20 years of existence.

What it goes to show is the size and force of inflation as an economic factor. The LFC operated a theological seminary, a four-year liberal arts college and a high school. She had four well-developed world mission fields, an active home mission program, put much more into world relief and praise program (Forward Phase) than we do and still could do all of that for less than we are spending now. So that's what inflation does.

Nevertheless, it still seems hard to believe that we have come this far this fast. The million dollar budget will be voted this year, or, at the latest, next year.

The one thing that would prevent it happening this year is the stagnant economy. Very likely there will be some evidences of the latter in the Dickinson community when we visit there in June. The oil activity, for instance, won't be as strong as it was a year ago. And there may be other signs of economic slowdown as well.

Some farmers are hurting and we are a strongly rural church. So our delegates will have to weigh the Gospel concerns with the economic realities. It will be interesting to see what the Budget Analysis Committee recommends after their careful study of the agency requests and their assessment of all factors involved.

It would be good if all delegates could think about this matter before coming to conference and also pray about such an important issue. The Lord will lead.

PLEASANT MEMORIES

Going out to Dickinson in June will bring some pleasant memories to me for I went out to southwestern North Dakota the summer between my junior and senior years of college to teach six weeks of Vacation Bible School in a parish served by a brother-in-law at Reeder, sixty miles south of Dickinson. I stayed on to teach two weeks at the neighboring town of Bowman, with a pastoral vacancy at the time.

So that was eight weeks in all, in four different locations. Six of the weeks were mornings only and two weeks were for mornings and afternoons. One school was held in a country school, which doubled as the church for the Whetstone congregation, the others were held in churches. In two places I was the only teacher, in the others I had some help. At Bowman I worked at a dry cleaning plant in the afternoons. But that is off the subject.

My most pleasant VBS teaching experience of my college and seminary days (23 weeks in all) occurred that summer in a small congregation south of Reeder. The place was Mamre Church, named after the district in Hebron where Abraham dwelt, after Lot was separated from him.

Anyway, there were nine children in the school, two or three each from four families. They were quiet and well-mannered. At noon we ate our lunches together and then spent the rest of the time playing softball, as we did at recess. I roomed and boarded for two or three nights at each home and so I got to know the families well. That was long ago but the memories are pleasant as they come back across the years.

You will enjoy the country of southwestern North Dakota. The wide sweep of the prairies and great vault of sky will intrigue you. The scoria-surfaced roads are more colorful than our common gravelled ones. More on Dickinson next time.

Plan to attend the annual conference if you can. And pray for this business session of our church.

THE CHRISTIAN LIFE

How may I succeed in the Christian life?

A great many young people are convinced that the Christian life is the best life. They have seen the peace and gladness that pervade the lives of some true Christians, and they say to themselves, "I wish I could be like that. Some day I am going to be a real Christian." But many a one hesitates about making a start in the Christian life because he is afraid that he will not be able to hold out. He may have tried it once and failed, or he may have seen others start out promisingly but later slip back into the old ways. He says to himself, "If I could be sure that I could make a success of it, I certainly would launch out upon the Christian life, but I am afraid." And so the questions come: "How is it that some people succeed so splendidly in the Christian life and others fail so miserably? What is the secret of success in the Christian life?"

The first condition of success to be mentioned is a recognition of the fact that we do not possess in ourselves the strength to succeed. To depend upon one's own power is a mistake that many make. That was no doubt Peter's main weakness when he gave such bold assurances of faithfulness to his Master. Just a short time later he shamefully denied Him. If we are to succeed, we must get our power from God. Listen to Paul: "I can do all things through Christ who strengtheneth me."

If we realize this, we shall be very glad and eager to make use of the helps God offers us. These are the means of grace, the Word and the Sacraments.

Make use of your Baptism. Remember that by that divine Sacrament you became a child of God. You have the privilege and right of an heir to the Kingdom of God. Realize these prerogatives. If you belong to God, you are beyond Satan's power. You are within the area of God's kingdom. Surely you may rejoice in this. And you will want to live as becomes a citizen of the Kingdom.

Make use of the Word of God. It is a splendid practice to read devoutly some portion of Scripture every day. Remember that your soul must have food as well as your body. The Word, of which Christ is the center, is the manna that God has given for the soul.

Be faithful in your attendance at church where the Word of God again meets you. Do not let a single exception in your Sunday church attendance take place, if you can possibly help it. One slip makes the next one easier, so guard yourself with all your might against the first one.

Go regularly to the Lord's Supper. It is given by the Lord for the very purpose of helping Christians to make a success of the Christian life. Are we not then acting ungratefully and unwisely if we neglect it?

Then there is your prayer life. That must be kept active and vigorous. Make use of prayers written by devout Christians, but use also your own words in prayer. Oh, I know very well how at times the spirit of prayer seems lacking. Then let the burden of your prayer be a crying to God for help in prayer. And while I do not want to lay down fixed rules for the how of prayer, I want to suggest that sometimes it will help you to get down on your knees and pray aloud. Try it. It will help your concentration.

Associate yourself with earnest, forward-looking Christians. You will find it very difficult to live your Chris-

tian life alone. You will be liable to become cold and discouraged. Therefore seek out helpful Christian associates who may share with you your problems; perhaps you may be helpful to them also.

And now we come to a matter that is extremely important: Show your colors; come right out into the open and let people know where you stand. This is Scriptural. Notice what Jesus says: "Everyone who shall confess Me before men, him will I also confess before My Father who is in heaven. But whosoever shall deny Me before men, him will I also deny before My Father who is in heaven" (Matthew 10:32-33).

St. Paul reinforces the same thought: "If thou shalt confess with thy mouth Jesus as Lord, and shalt believe in thy heart that God raised him from the dead, thou shalt be saved: for with the heart man believeth unto righteousness; and with the mouth confession is made unto salvation" (Romans 10:9-10).

It is practically impossible to be a Christian and keep the fact to oneself. Many a young Christian has smothered the life within him by trying to hide it from people round about him. Certainly it is true that a life can be only weak and sickly if it is not allowed the sunshine and fresh air of open confession.

And why should we not let it be known where we stand in relation to Christ? Are we ashamed of Him? Are we afraid of men? To be sure, people may call you Pharisee, "goody-goody," or like names; but what of it? You are not a coward, are you? If Christ gave His life for you, can't you bear a little reproach for His sake?

There are many ways in which you can confess Christ. You can do it by a public statement or by a public prayer; and it will oftentimes give the power of God a better chance to work out in you if you do make such a confession. Many a Christian dates the beginning of a new epoch of spiritual strength in his life from the time of his first public confession.

Until they are finalized, we may not begin to hold Bible studies or services in our home. We can only build friendships and pray that God will open doors and hearts so that we may proclaim Jesus to them.

We have not been able to accomplish some of the things we had hoped to by this time; however, we can see how God has been leading, guiding and blessing us through this one whole year here in Paraguay. We are so thankful that we can trust God through the coming years as well.

You can also confess Christ by the position you take among your fellows in regard to sinful or doubtful practices. If someone proposes doing something that your conscience condemns, you can confess Christ very effectively by a courageous and firm statement: "You'll have to count me out of that." And be assured of this that while openly people may laugh at you, deep down in their hearts they thoroughly respect you and wish sincerely that they had your courage.

Oh, for a body of consecrated Christian young people who in this day of loose morals and shifting standards have the courage of their convictions.

Finally, if you want to make a success of your Christian life, become active in Christian service. What many young Christians need in order to develop their Christian personalities and possibilities is to get something practical to do for Christ and their fellowmen. Wise indeed is that pastor, league and congregation that gives the young people some worth while thing to do as an expression of their Christian faith.
