

DECIDE **FOR '85**

If in these last few days of 1984 you were given the assignment to summarize the way you lived 1984, what word would you use to describe your lifestyle? Now be honest! How about the word "more!" It seems that the longer I live and the more I am honest with myself, I recognize within me the desire for more. After almost one and a half years in the ministry, my flesh is still battling for control every day. It wants what it sees. I believe the word "more" summarizes what the flesh really wants, no matter what area of our life we are dealing with.

The first example I have seen of how the flesh wants more is in little children. Our son is soon going to be two years old. He has been a joy to have in our family, but also he has taught me much about the flesh, that old nature that we are all born with. When we sit down at the table and his little eyes begin gazing over the meal, many times the first word that will come out of his mouth is. "More." I try to tell him that he hasn't had some first, so how can he have more, but he doesn't quite get the picture yet. We tend to laugh at our children and their ways sometimes, but how about when we look at your life this past year. What is the "more" you have wanted? How many times have you wanted more? Someone has said that boys and men. never lose their desire for toys; the

toys just get bigger. Has this been a year where you have been content with the vehicle that meets your needs best, or has it been a year when the new model caught your eye and you found all sorts of reasons why you should have a new one? Of course, by now you have forgotten about the \$2000 dollars you wasted by having to buy it on the spot. You thought you couldn't live without it. Maybe it would be more honest to say your flesh could not live without

Now, I doubt whether it is only the males of the human race who have these desires for more toys. Women, has this been a year when you had to have your husband make more room in the closet for all your new garments? You just couldn't live unless you had that dress or blouse? Maybe the flesh couldn't live without it. Are we being too picky in our Christian walk when we start dealing with new clothes or new gadgets that we really don't need? I would say yes if we were the ones who owned our own lives. Maybe somehow in the busyness of everything we have forgotten that when we have Jesus Christ as our Savior, it means He is to be in control of all our life, including the way we spend the pay check.

Do we in the AFLC really take seriously what the Word of God says about how we are to live this Chris-

tian life? The Apostle Paul beseeches us by the mercies of God (Rom. 12:1) to present our bodies as a living sacrifice, holy, acceptable unto God, which is your reasonable service. Have we forgotten that Jesus Christ gave His life that we might live? God has given the most precious gift, which we are celebrating this time of year, to be our Savior from eternal destruction in hell. Oh, we don't have any rights to our own lives. As Christians we are God's property; we are to offer ourselves back to God as a living sacrifice. Someone has said that the problem with Christians being living sacrifices is that they keep crawling off the altar. That is the flesh; that's my flesh. When it costs something to stay on the altar for God to use me, it wants off the altar. Would you dare admit that you have that problem? You want more?

There was a man in the Old Testament who had the problem of wanting more. In this case it had to do with seeing more signs to really believe God had called him for the task. The man is our hero from Sunday School, Gideon. Gideon was used of God, but his desire for more led Israel away from God after his death.

The record begins in Judges 6. Israel was under the oppression of the Midianites. In verses 3 and 4, the

Midianites and Amalekites came and destroyed Israel's crop. In verse 7, the children of Israel cried unto the Lord because of the oppression of the Midianites. In verse 11, there came an angel of the Lord unto a man named Gideon. In verse 16, "The Lord said unto him, 'Surely I will be with thee, and thou shalt smite the Midianites as one man." Verse 17 says, "And he said unto him, If now I have found grace in Thy sight, then shew me a sign that Thou talkest with me." Gideon doubted, so he asked for a sign. In verse 21, the sign was given. The angel touched the present of Gideon and fire came out of the rock and consumed it. Now you would think one sign from God would be enough, but not so. Gideon, in the end of chapter 6 of Judges, asks for two more signs: One for the fleece to be wet and the other for the ground to be wet. What was the end of this mighty leader for God who had to have the three signs? After the battles were over, Gideon was asked to rule over the people. He resisted that and said, "The Lord shall rule over you" (Judges 8:23), but then he did ask for one thing from the people: their golden earrings from the Ishmaelites. Do you know what Gideon did with this gold? He used it to make an ephod (a garment of the high priest) and he "put it in his city, even in Ophrah: and all Israel went thither a whoring after it: which thing became a snare unto Gideon, and to his house" (Judges 8:27). Gideon made himself to be a

kind of high priest by this ephod and it led Israel to spiritual adultery: devoting themselves to two gods rather than the one true God through God's high priest. Gideon started out asking for more signs from God and God gave them to him. Gideon had victories for God and was used by God, but in the end he led Israel away from God.

We often sing: "How blessed is the little flock, Whom Jesus calls His own!" And this is not only a beautiful fancy, that these are blessed. The Bible reiterates this truth: "Blessed is the nation whose God is the Lord; and the people whom He hath chosen for His own inheritance" (Ps. 33:12). But it is always a source of sadness and regret that this flock is so little. Why not a great host? God is love, and He will have all men to be saved, and come unto the knowledge of the truth. Why do so many reject God's wonderful grace?

In the midst of sadness over this fact that the flock is so little we are reminded of the "great multitude."

Where will your desire for more things lead you? Where is your desire for more things leading your children? America is in debt up to its ears because we aren't satisfied with what God has given us. Our problem is usually not that we don't have enough money, but that we spend it for more clothes or gadgets that only too often take time away from God. Maybe you have had wonderful victories for God in the past, when your heart burned with a desire to serve Christ, but now there are quite a few things you would like to have, so the missionaries who are waiting to go out to the field will have to wait until you try to satisfy your flesh one more year. Do we not have enough money available for the work God

has called us to do in the AFLC? No, the money is available, God has blessed us. The problem is our fingers have become sticky and instead of passing on God's financial blessings to the areas of work, we are filling our garages and our closets with toys. Where is it leading us? The desire for more is leading us to spiritual adultery just like the desire for more in Gideon's life led Israel to spiritual adultery. Did you try and serve two masters in '84? Don't try it again.

Was it more, more, more in '84? That is gone, but '85 lies ahead. Decide for '85. Will you allow God to use you in building His kingdom or are you going to keep adding to your own kingdom here on earth?

Our sadness is turned to deepest joy as we in hope lift our souls to gaze through faith beyond this life into the great beyond, where we see that the "little flock" has grown into a "great multitude." It is a countless host made up of "all nations, and kindreds, and peoples, and tongues." These are they who have left this world of conflict and strife, and have reached the perfect home of love and light. They are all saved, all blessed, all perfectly blissful – all one glorious, harmonious whole.

No, Christ did not die in vain for sinners. He has a glorious reward for His suffering and bitter death, for the sight of this bridal host will through all eternity requite His soul. How has this great host reached home? Only by washing their robes white in the blood of the Lamb. They came to God with their burdens of sin, and He removed their guilt. That, and that only, explains why they are now permitted to encircle His throne of Glory.

Are you going to be in that great white host?

Have you washed your robes in the blood of the Lamb? If your heart is grieved because of your sin, if you are longing for Jesus because you cannot live without Him, if it is your heart-felt wish to be numbered with that "great multitude," then rest assured that you shall be there, even though you feel that you are most unworthy of all.

When we give to God

Just having been elected to our AFLC Home Missions Committee in June, the needs of our Home Missions have become very clear to me. Attending the All-Boards' meeting at the Association Retreat Center in September, I was reminded of the man, recorded in John 5, who had been an invalid for 38 years. He was by the Pool of Bethesda, waiting for the stirring of the waters. Jesus asked him, "Wilt thou be made whole?" He answered Jesus, saying, "Sir, I have no man, when the water is troubled, to put me into the pool: but while I am coming another steppeth down before me.'

December has been designated by our AFLC as Home Mission Month. When budgets aren't met, the Home Mission Committee is confronted with the same sad fact as this man told Jesus. He had no one to put him in the pool. When people ask for help to start a new congregation, as the budget isn't met, that answer must be, that we cannot help you at this time.

In the area of giving, many of us pastors are guilty of not preaching on stewardship in the way we should. Many of us in our AFLC don't even like to hear a message on giving. Do you realize how much our Lord Jesus speaks about this matter of giving? In the New Testament, there are over 1,500 times giving is mentioned. That means one verse out of six in the New Testament talks about the Christian and his money. Nearly half the parables that Jesus told are about our relationships to possessions.

In I Corinthians 15, the Apostle Paul tells about the resurrection of our Lord Jesus Christ and the great hope, the victory, we have in Him. He tells us, because of this, ". . . be ye steadfast, unmoveable, always abounding in the work of the Lord, forasmuch as ye know that your labour is not in vain in the Lord." Then he goes right into the 16th chapter without hesitation and says, "Now concerning the collection . . ." Paul had a concern for souls.

Look what happens when we give to God. It isn't just paying the bills or meeting the budget. Nor is it a matter of keeping our credit rating good. The offerings you bring to Jesus make possible the salvation of souls here at home. They make possible the sharing of the Gospel with the unsaved. They make possible the starting of new congregations here at home. They also make possible the training of another generation of pastors and teachers. The money you give to God makes possible the sending of missionaries to other countries. ". . . Ye know that your labor is not in vain in the Lord."

When we look at our Lord Jesus Christ and what He has done for us, we marvel at the victory that is ours now. Then, thinking of the joy that shall be ours in our home in heaven, and remembering that He has redeemed us, "not with gold or silver, but with His holy, precious blood and with His innocent suffering and death," we are moved to go on with new strength and joy to serve Him with all that we are and with all that we have.

Canton is a city of nearly 3,800 people located 20 miles southeast of Sioux Falls, South Dakota, on the South Dakota-Iowa border. It is a farming community with a strong Norwegian Lutheran heritage. Sprinkled generously amid the rolling hills of corn and soybean fields are dairy, hog and beef operations.

The people of Redeemer Lutheran Church are greatly encouraged by the interest shown by the people of Canton and the surrounding community in a new Lutheran church with a conservative emphasis. The Sunday morning attendance averaged about 90 persons during the month of October. New faces appear every Sunday. We seek to be a vehicle through which people can come to know Jesus as their personal Savior. It is the prayer of this congregation that God would bless us only as long as we remain true to the Gospel of Jesus Christ.

Redeemer Lutheran is a mission project of the entire AFLC. It is the gifts, contributions, loans and prayers of you, our AFLC people, that make such an outreach in southeastern South Dakota possible. God is blessing this work! We are excited and we praise Him! And we thank you, friends in the AFLC, for your part in this encouraging work!

New Home Mission church dedicated in South Dakota

Dedication services were held at one of the AFLC's newest Home Mission projects on Sunday, October 21, at Redeemer Lutheran Church of Canton. The beautiful new worship facilities were dedicated to the glory of God and to the work of the kingdom during the afternoon service. Rev. Elden Nelson, AFLC Home Missions Director, delivered the dedication message and officiated at the dedication ceremonies. A crowd of almost 200 people attended the service.

Redeemer Lutheran Congregation was begun in January, 1983, after several families in the Canton area contacted the Home Mission Board of the AFLC. An informational meeting had been held on December 7, 1982, to determine interest in establishing an AFLC congregation in the Canton area. There were 50 people in attendance at this meeting.

On Sunday, January 9, 1983, the first service of Redeemer Lutheran Congregation was held in a vacant business building in Canton. Rev. Nelson and Rev. Robert Lee, professor at the AFLC seminary, conducted the service. Thereafter regular Sunday services were held at the same location.

On Sunday, January 30, a business meeting was held at which time the congregation was officially named and organized and a steering committee of eight men was elected, with Ron Larson appointed as chairman. Rev. Lee and Rev. Kenneth Moland, Dean of AFLBS, ministered to the congregation on alternate weekends for the next 18 months.

During the summer of 1983 a five-acre plot of land on the west side of Canton was purchased with funds made available by a loan from the AFLC Church Extension program. On October 9, ground-breaking ceremonies were held, with church construction beginning that fall. On June 5, 1984, although construction was not entirely completed, the first service was held in the new structure.

On August 1, Pastor Rodger Olson and family began their ministry in Canton as the first full-time pastor of the congregation. Pastor Olson was officially installed at Redeemer Lutheran during the morning worship service on October 21. Rev. Elden Nelson, as a representative of the AFLC, officiated at the installation.

Building purchased for India orphanage

"Without vision, the people perish" (Proverbs 29:18).

A few years ago the people of the AFLC resolved at an Annual Conference to establish an orphanage ministry in India. Their sincere desire was to establish a ministry of mercy in this needy country and to combine this with a Gospel outreach. Also, to the government of India an orphanage ministry has "redeeming value" and gives credibility to our church's ministry with its country.

However, the goal was not an easy one to reach. First, valuable contacts needed to be made in India. This takes time. During the past five years Pastors Richard Snipstead (President of the AFLC), Eugene Enderlein (World Missions Director), and B. Rao Dasari (On-the-Field-Director), traveled to India to train workers, install pastors and evangelists, conduct services, and encourage the new members and friends of the Bible Faith Lutheran Church of India.

Secondly, the money needed to be raised to purchase a site for the BFLC Headquarters and Orphanage. Our people of the AFLC responded grandly during the Twentieth Anniversary year with generous offerings toward this worthy endeavor.

More time passed. Undergirding all of these preparations was the most vital ingredient of all: prayer. Our people prayed for God's timing in this endeavor, for enough funds to complete a purchase, and for God's perfect will in leading us to His choice of a land site.

During the recent summer of 1984 God led Pastor Dasari to a fine plot of land on which is constructed a rather new nine-room building. By God's grace our BFLC has been able to complete the details for the purchase of this site. We are happy to

announce that we have taken possession of this land and building and will be using it for our India Orphanage. Thanks be to God!

This building was originally built by another Christian organization for an orphanage ministry; however, this organization had to pull back its outreach and concentrate in another area. It seems that God saved it for us.

The building is made of reinforced concrete, and the roof was reinforced to sustain two additional floors if needed. Six rooms have mosaic-tiled floors and three have slate floors. Lavatories are outside. City water runs adjacent to the property. However, a well is on the property.


Our new site in India is located in the large city of Guntur, just two and (Continued on p. 11)

At an age when many men leave active ministry, Lay Pastor Nordvall seems to go rather by the adage that it is better to wear out for the Lord than to rust out. He does have an idyllic spot from which to launch out in serving his two congregations, Oiland and Badger Creek. We speak of his lifetime home on the southern slopes of Minnesota Hill, half a mile from Canada, and northwest of Roseau, Minn.

Our new writer is another man who is not content to rest on his laurels even though he has surpassed the age of 65 also. And those of us who know him much at all associate the devotional life with him. For that reason, too, we are glad that he has consented to be our writer in the series "At the Master's Feet" for the next six months, beginning next time. The Lord bless you as you share with us, Pastor Dyrud.

SO MUCH TO DO

With three months to go in the fiscal year of the Association, 51 per cent of the budget goal for benevolences had been reached with three-fourths of the time gone. That left the church with so much to do in a short time. When you read this there will be just over a month before the fiscal year ends.

We like how income this year has quite consistently run ahead of last year's in percentage of goal reached. That's good, but the needs are so great. There is so much to do.

There is a growing sentiment in the AFLC that a careful look must be taken at our work together and the goals we set. Goals seem to be outstripping performance by more than they should. It is good to have ambitious goals, but how realistic have ours been lately? That seems to be the question in people's minds.

If ever our boards and committees needed wisdom it is now, as they plan budgets for 1986-87. If ever the Budget Analysis Committee needed wisdom it is now, as it stands between the congregations and the next annual conference and makes recommendations.

But for the immediate future, these next few weeks, it is important that we as a church fellowship do the best that we can to give the monies our agencies are counting on getting because the conference, on faith, recommended certain goals. A shortfall will bring a message, to be sure, should that be what happens, and it will also hurt our AFLC work, how much depending on how large it is

It is evident, too, that the congregations must do everything they can in the future to send in offerings earlier in the fiscal year. Quite a few congregations give the tithe or more of their Sunday offerings to benevolences. These churches especially are in a position to send in their gifts to the benevolent causes monthly or quarterly.

Be as generous as you can be, individuals and congregations, in supporting our AFLC work in these weeks to the end of January. There is so much to do-but it can be done.

YOUTH WORKER

A letter came across our desk this past fall urging financial support from the Luther Leagues of the project of securing a part-time youth worker in the AFLC. This would mean the separation of the youth worker position from that of the evangelist.

Annual conferences have supported the concept of a youth worker numerous times. Now it is a matter of getting the support and finding the right man for the job.

We want to encourage this goal and this search. Local Luther Leagues, get behind this effort. Put the youth worker item on your schedule of responsibilities, both for contributions and prayer. If there are 100 Leagues, the average gift needed would be \$50 per year to meet the modest objective of \$5000. Perhaps there are more than 100 Leagues.

Don't put off your decision on this. Act on it now. It is time to get going on the matter of a youth worker.

THRILLING NEWS

It is thrilling news that Bibles are getting into Russia and other Eastern European countries in greater numbers than in many years, yes, since Winston Churchill's "iron curtain" descended after World War II.

And they are not being smuggled in ala Brother Andrew, but will come in to Russia, for instance, with the approval of the authorities. (See ABS news release on the subject elsewhere in this issue.)

But it turns out our girl steals. Relatives quit coming so often. They can't stand the brats in your home. You don't go so often any more either because one aunt claims she's stolen her antique watch. You give her money so she won't have to steal. Merchants call, "You're kid is on the street again." Nice neighbor growls on the telephone, "Sure don't like that trash you're bringing into the community." You hope she won't become pregnant too soon.

You try. You think you've made progress. But the damage is so great to the child that who knows what's really happening. One wonders should she have been born? You see we're so incensed by abortion that we forget the deprayed precedings and the ones responsible.

The child who finds himself homeless because of death and illness is fortunate compared to the ones who are "fruits" of violence and indifference.

On the spur of the moment I see a possible way our people could help more. What are Christians going into Christian schools for? Aren't they already the most blessed on earth? Are they going to create heaven? If you can afford private education, you can afford a needy child. Get out of that cozy sunlit haven and give it to someone who needs it. Christians

Oh, and don't be too hard on the social workers. Like police, they see your quiet community from quite a different peep-hole.

Sure. Quit thinking. Get involved with someone. Jesus did! It cost His life!


The Reformation in England followed the philosophy of Calvin rather than that of Luther. Like Luther, Calvin favored congregational singing; however, he sided with the more radical Zwingli, rather than Luther, as to the content of singing. He insisted that only the Scriptures, and primarily the Psalms, were suitable for Christian singing, and it should be in unison and unaccompanied.

The influence of John Calvin on the Church of England resulted in pale and impoverished hymnody in England until the time of Isaac Watts nearly 200 years later. Because Watts was able to break the paralyzing reign of Old Testament Christianity. he is regarded as "The Father of English Hymnody." Ironically, it was his paraphrasing of the Psalms that won for him the title. It was done with fidelity to the spirit and teaching of the Psalms, but in the language of the completed redemption, the resurrected Christ, with the color and expression of the New Testament. This was a great departure from the severe and long-standing rule that the Psalm must be literally and meticulously rendered when sung.

It began while Watts was an 18-year-old voicing his displeasure with the psalm-singing in his father's church. There were no hymnals and the old practice of "lining-out" the Psalms was used (a layman would read a line of a psalm and the congregation would sing it.).

(Historians have commented on the conditions of which Watts was critical. It seems the laymen clerks were not at all equipped or qualified for their responsibility, resulting in disinterest and humorous, embarrassing and irreverent behavior, including casual conversation or sleeping and snoring during the psalm-singing.)

The young upstart was challenged by his father to write something better so Isaac wrote a hymn which was



sung at the service the following Sunday night:

Behold the glories of the Lamb Amidst His Father's throne; Prepare new honors for His Name And songs before unknown.

The hymn prophetically introduced evangelical hymnody to Christian worshipers in England. It met with such favorable reception that within two years the youthful poet had written 200 hymns, nearly all based on or paraphrases of Psalms. How fortunate for the Church that his ability was directed toward the creation of Christian hymns.

The *Concordia* is accused of being too provincial (too Scandinavian, too German). Actually, about two-thirds of its hymns are of English or American authorship. Of these, 11 are Watts'.

"Give to Our God Immortal Praise" is based on Psalm 136.

The other Watts hymns are:

35 From All that Dwell Below the Skies

All that is known of John Hatton, composer of "Duke Street," is that he was born in Warrington, England, lived part of his life on Duke Street, Lancaster, and probably died in St. Helens where church documents record his funeral service.

"Duke Street" is used four times in the *Concordia*: 24, 164, 203 and 416.

Russian Christians to get Bibles

NEW YORK, NY (ABS) - The American Bible Society announces that 10,000 Bibles in Russian are expected to arrive in Moscow for distribution by the end of the year.

The cost both of production in Stuttgart, West Germany, and of taking them by road to the Russian capital, is being borne mainly by the United Bible Societies, the world partnership of Bible Societies to which ABS gives major support.

When the 10,000 Bibles are ready, a truck will transport them to Moscow, where the All-Union Council of Evangelical Christians-Baptists in the USSR, has been given official permission to import them.

Lutherans hear life concerns at convention

CHICAGO–More than 500 participants from 16 states and the District of Columbia gathered here at suburban LaGrange-Countryside November 2-4 to consider a range of life-related topics during the third annual convention of Lutherans For Life, the pro-life organization with membership open to all Lutherans.

During an opening session President Ronald Reagan greeted the convention participants via a videotaped message. Reminding that over one million abortions are performed each year (16 million since 1972), Reagan said, "It is groups like Lutherans For Life which have carried the burden of rectifying this situation. The caring nature of your witness is evident," the President said, "and your work deserves more than just thanks and support."

On another videotaped message, Dr. Ralph Bohlmann, president of The Lutheran Church-Missouri Synod (LC-MS), assured the group of ". . . my own personal support of your efforts and actions. You serve the cause of Christ at a crucial juncture of human history," he said, "and the pastors, teachers and congregations of the LC-MS are deeply indebted to you for the fine job of educating and sensitizing you do

about the sanctity of life. Thanks from the bottom of my heart."

Congressman Henry J. Hyde from Bensenville, Ill., completing his fifth term in the U.S. House of Representatives, addressed the convention Saturday. Hyde is noted for introducing annually since 1975 an amendment which prohibits federal funding for Medicaid-financed abortions.

"I take great strength and renewal from people who are as committed as you," Hyde told the convention. "We need people to be politically involved in the pro-life movement because any pro-life legislation or discussion in Congress is directly attributable to the movement at the grassroots."

Noting that the law gives more protection to a blade of grass than to an unborn baby, Hyde encouraged heightened efforts for a human life amendment to overturn the 1973 Supreme Court decision legalizing abortions.

At the infanticide forum, presenters dispelled the notion that abortion and recent "Baby Doe" cases (where newborn babies are denied medical treatment for life-threatening conditions) are not related life issues. They also stressed the importance of peer support and public and private help for parents with mentally-handicapped infants.
