Repentance is the consistent refrain of the prophets from Isaiah to Malachi. Repentance is a keynote in the New Testament as well. It is John the Baptist's dominant message: "Repent ye: for the kingdom of heaven is at hand" (Matthew 3:2).

And according to Mark 1:15, "The time is fulfilled, and the kingdom of God is at hand: repent ye, and believe the Gospel" were among Jesus' first public words. And Jesus' last words to His disciples and to us before His ascension to heaven included the directive that "repentance and remission of sins should be preached in His name among all nations, beginning at Jerusalem" (Luke 24:47). The words repent or repentance appear more than 50 times in the New Testament.

Repentance is an indispensable part of the conversion process that takes place under the convicting power of the Holy Spirit. But repentance is also a continuing daily state of mind, expressed by a sinner saved by grace through faith in Christ.

What does it mean when you say, "I believe in Jesus Christ?", Martin Luther asks in his explanation of The Second Article. And the answer is clear: "Trusting in Jesus Christ with all my heart, I surrender myself to Him as my only Savior from sin, and death, and the power of Satan." And Jesus Christ is "the Son of God and the son of Mary, true God and true man."

"In none other is there salvation: for neither is there any other name under heaven, that is given among men, wherein we must be saved" (Acts 4:12, Am. St.). Only the blood of Christ can forgive and cleanse away sins and purge our conscience from dead works to serve the living God (Compare Ephesians 1:7, Hebrews 6:1 and I John 1:7).

True believers in Christ our Redeemer and Lord prove their repentance by their deeds, their everyday lives. Purity of life, as well as forgiveness of sins, is the sincere desire of a truly repentant sinner.

Without a continuing daily repentant attitude—that is, a persistent desire to turn away from our old nature and seek God's nature, Christian growth is impossible. Growing in Christlikeness is impossible without daily repentance from the heart. A truly repentant person realizes that the name of Christ is blasphemed when Christians live carelessly.

Now we turn to Psalm 51, one of the great Penitential Psalms. King David had made dreadful mistakes. He had committed dreadful sins. The account of these sins is written in Chapters 11 and 12 of II Samuel, where we read of David's sin of adultery with Bathsheba, Uriah's wife, and of David's purposely causing Uriah to be killed in battle. David was guilty of sinning against God's fifth and sixth Commandments.

Nearly a year had slowly passed and David had continued to harden his convicted heart against repentance of sin. But he had no rest of conscience, nor peace of mind. Then one day God reminded the prophet Nathan to go and visit the greatly troubled king. Please read the whole story in II Samuel 11 and 12 and then prayerfully read Psalm 51.

Next time we shall continue to meditate on Psalm 51.

Let us also ask God, with the Psalmist, in Psalm 139:23 and 24, to "Search me, O God, and know my heart: try me, and know my thoughts: and see if there be any wicked way in me, and lead me in the way everlasting.'

When I was very young my great grandmother used to tell my brother and me stories from the Bible. We used to love to listen. I think that is why all my life I never doubted there was a God. About ten years ago I joined a church because I felt it was the right thing to do and "my children needed it."

I began to do a few things at church and we were going quite regularly. Not every Sunday, but I felt we were doing pretty good about the whole thing. We had religion. Not a personal relationship with Jesus, mind you.

Meanwhile, my family problems were getting worse and I worried about everything so much that it was affecting my health. I also developed quite a temper and that only made matters worse.

I found myself looking forward to the sermons on Sunday. I really wanted to know more. I knew I was missing something in my life. I was beginning to see myself for what I was. It was pretty hard to take. I began to little by little see all my sins and feel ashamed and guilty. I thought, here I am going to church and feeling worse than ever. I felt lost, and I was.

About this time Pastor gave a sermon on the Holy Spirit and how he picks away at us and makes us see our sins. God is so merciful. This

gave me new hope just when I needed it. I felt if the Holy Spirit were picking at me, God had not turned His back. Now I was sorry for my sins and I needed forgiveness. I had to invite Jesus in and expect His forgiveness by faith. How I knew this is easy for some people, but for me, as stubborn as I was, I felt I had to straighten my life out and earn it first. Here was Jesus saying, "I love you; I paid the price; you can't earn it; ask Me in." And here was "I" going around in circles. Trying to solve my own problems. Carrying the weight of my guilt and feeling sick inside.

Well, I thank God for the day I quit struggling and gave up. The Lord had finally gotten through. I did ask Him in and He changed my whole life. He filled my needs and I'm never alone. He took my guilt and replaced it with love. What a beautiful time when we can truly say, "You are the potter, I am the clay." I hear so many people say that seeing is believing, but with God I think believing is seeing. When you believe by faith, He will show you the way through His Word and prayer.

My problems have not vanished, but I have laid them at my Master's feet and it's so beautiful to see Him work in your life. My Lord, "How Great Thou Art!" Without God, we can do nothing. With God, everything is possible.






How to pray for missionaries

- 1. Pray for essentials. It is not so essential that you ask God to give us good health. The important thing is that He give us only the measure of health that will best glorify Him. Who knows but what it may be to His glory that we should be sick and thereby demonstrate to the host people that we have a God who can keep us in perfect peace and joy, even in sickness.
- 2. We do not want you to pray that God will give us an easy path on the mission field, but rather that *He might give us grace sufficient to be overcomers for Him*.
- 3. Do not pray so much that God will answer our prayers, He has promised that, as that God will keep us from being too busy to pray. Haven't you thought of the fact that it is just as easy for missionaries to be too busy to pray as it is for you in the homeland to be too busy to take time with God.

- 4. We're not so anxious that you pray that God will remove the obstacles as that *He might give us an unconquerable determination to go all the way with Him.*
- 5. It is not so important that you pray that God should bless our activities as that *God should censor our activities*, for how easy it is for a missionary's time and energy to be spent on second best things!
- 6. Please do not pray for us as though we are saints, living up on a high level, because we are missionaries. We who go as missionaries are subjected to temptations. Satan will determine in one way or another to hinder our testimony, to rob our lives of power, or make our witness futile. We need your prayer that *God will give us grace and strength to resist temptation*.
- 7. Won't you remember please that missionaries can become lonely; we can become discouraged; we can become irritable, sharp, impatient with other missionaries? Above all, we want to tell you we can do a great deal of missionary work without being on fire for Christ. Some of you know that you can teach Sunday School or be a church officer without being on fire for Him. So we covet, above all, your prayers for us that *Christ's person and glory might have* our 'first love.'



the goodness of God and our response

"Or despisest thou the riches of His goodness and forbearance and longsuffering; not knowing that the goodness of God leadeth thee to repentance?" (Rom. 2:4).

We hear quite a little talk about the need of repentance when trouble besets us or when we believe that we are being punished by God. Even then many people harden their hearts against God and ignore the reminders that He sends them. When everything goes well with us we are likely to be puffed up, either boasting of our own ability or thinking that the Lord owes us something. We of the church have certainly enjoyed many blessings from God. How have we responded to the goodness, forbearance and longsuffering of God? Have we realized that every blessing which we enjoy is a call to us from God-not to make us think that we are more deserving than others, but a call to repentance?

The goodness of God will reveal to us our unworthiness. If we sense something of the awe and majesty and holiness of God, we come to realize our own insignificance.

God's call to us today is that His goodness toward us is a call to repentance. That holds good when we

think about our blessings as a nation and when we think of our blessings as individuals.

The only adequate answer to the call of God through His goodness and forbearance is a deep repentance, a life of faith, a humble thanksgiving, a noble resolve to respond to God's attempt at making us better, self-sacrificing service. God resists the proud, but He gives grace to the humble. We are to walk humbly with our God. His goodness will help us to do that when we receive it in the right way.

The goodness of God calls us to repentance. True repentance will find its expression in loving service of our Lord through His church. With the Psalmist of old we will say:

"I will take the cup of salvation,

and call upon the name of the Lord. I will pay my vows unto the Lord now in the presence of all His people."

God's goodness towards us is continuous. Our response to Him must not be sporadic and niggardly; it must be frequent and generous.


There is so much of God's goodness in our midst; there ought to be a great deal of repentance, much of thanksgiving, a willing participation in the work of the church for the glorification of His name.

from a travel letter by Prof. O. Hallesby

(on his first trip to the U.S., 1923)

From Niagara (Falls) my itinerary took me to a young people's meeting in Milwaukee. Then further west by way of Chicago to Minneapolis, the Norwegian capital of America. When I had spoken there the first time and went down into the crowd to meet the people, I was at once surrounded by familiar faces, so that I could almost have believed that I was home in Norway. Yes, truthfully, ten or 12 friends from my home community stood there. Everyone of them I hadn't seen for 35 years, but I recognized them again. It was an unforgettable time for me in the center of a country new to me.

The next day I spoke at a Lutheran Bible school which holds classes in St. Paul in the winter, but conducts summer school in more open country by one of the many beautiful lakes in Minneapolis. The Bible school doesn't belong to any one church body, but is operated by two Swedes, (Samuel) Miller and (C. J.) Sodergren, and a Norwegian, (A. B.) Anderson. They are three younger men with a humble, warm and believing spirit, for which I am especially glad. From all that I have been able to learn of them, they are doing a quiet and deep work in young souls, without fuss or calling attention to themselves or by excesses in spirituality. And the attraction of the school is so great, both in summer and winter, that they cannot accommodate everyone. The summer school continues for six weeks, divided into three sessions, in which a person can take one, two or all three sessions. There are four hours in the morning, from 9 to 1. The whole afternoon is free, and then there is a service in the evening. Many young people arrange their two weeks' vacation to take such a course. At the same time they get an inexpensive and refreshing stay at a lovely and invigorating place.


I felt myself so much at home at that Bible school that I found it very difficult to leave it, even though the students spoke only English. But some of the young people could understand my Norwegian. The Lord bless them all!

GOD IS A SPIRIT

"God is a Spirit: and they that worship Him must worship Him in spirit and in truth" (John 4:24).

Many people about us at some time or other would like to be on the "in" side with God. Their motivations may vary greatly and their need of His blessing may be seemingly long or short lived. For this reason the various churches of our Flathead Valley have established services of worship.

But it becomes quite obvious in our community as in others that worship of God is approached by the various churches in different ways. The order of worship matters very little in our worship. Some have much liturgy while others have very little or none at all. Our Scripture verse tells us that the important matter to remember is that we worship God in spirit and in truth.

God is not interested in becoming a spiritual insurance company where He can be relied upon for protection in this troubled world. Nor is He interested in the double standards that some would try to impress Him with. Then there are those who seemingly worship God by degrading the followers of another church and by so doing try to impress God with their own worthiness. And it even seems that there are those who attempt to worship a God whom they are not quite sure even exists. These folks only desire to have the portions of Scripture that are suitable to them deemed as the real Word of God. God is allowed to be God only in the areas of life and religion that are allowable by the other controlling "gods" of intellect, influence, pride, etc..

The Bible, we believe, is the holy Word of God and gives to those who read and obey it the answers to a life fellowship with God. We must, according to John 4:24, worship God in spirit and in truth. To worship in spirit means that one's attitude is consistently controlled in the effort to please God. Our flesh is forever changing but the spirit of our being

is a constant factor of life. We oftentimes witness that our worship in spirit is hindered by the influence of our fleshly thoughts, words, and deeds.

When one becomes honestly interested in the worship of God as a fulltime religion, he must reconcile himself to this broken relationship between himself and God. Some are unable to face such a God and therefore become antagonistic to all that God represents. Others use a comparative analysis of themselves with the rest of society or "church" people. They usually arrive at the verdict that the sins of others are more serious than their own. But God says that we must worship Him in spirit and in truth; sincerety is not enough.

The truth is that God already knows who and what we are. He is fully aware that in sin were we conceived and that there is none righteous, no not one! He, Himself, has stated that the soul that sins will surely die. If we are guilty of one offense, we are as doomed as though we were the most depraved of humans. Yes, God is fully aware of what a sorrowful condition we are in. And that is just the reason why He sent His only begotten Son into the world. He came to seek and to save the lost.

We worship God in spirit and in truth when we face the truth of His Word which tell us that even our righteousness is as filthy rags. This truth should make all who hear forsake their own salvation and accept His. A worship in love and childlike fear should develop. Such a love and fear would control us by our not desiring any harm or ill repute to come to our Father's name. When our spirits become tainted with the guilt of sin, the truth of God's Word in I John 1:9 becomes the bridge in our worship of God. "If we confess our sins, He is faithful and just to forgive us our sins and to cleanse us from all unrighteousness." Amen.

A FINAL REMINDER

May we, as kindly as possible, but as firmly as possible, remind our AFLC people that only days are left in the 1984-85 fiscal year in the Association. The books will close on the year when the gifts mailed in January have all arrived at the Medicine Lake office.

We do hope that every member is fully aware of the need for generous gifts by the end of the month. By the end of November 60% of the goal had been reached. Sixty percent in 83% of the time. There will be more talk about goals later, but the pressing need now is a great outpouring of love offerings

to God's work through our AFLC benevolences. Your interest and support were never needed more than now.

THE BIBLE CONFERENCES

Winter Bible conferences have been a part of Association life since the beginning. The first one was held in McVille, N. Dak., and there has been at least one every winter since then, two or three each winter in recent years.

We have found these conferences to be times of rich fellowship and spiritual enrichment. The pace is much less hurried than at a church business conference. At most of the winter conferences there are five Bible sessions. All of these studies have been well presented. An equal number of hours is given over to Biblical topics and/or church work themes. And each evening there is a preaching service, almost always with special music to enhance the preaching.

Many people come—there could always be more—and it is good to meet old friends and make new ones. It is always too bad that not all who come can stay for the whole time. How we wish they could, but there are reasons why this is impossible, some better than others.

The time may come when it is no longer necessary for the Association as such to sponsor the Bible conferences. Regions or even districts may plan their own, and that should reach even more people, but for now they are planned and promoted by the church at large. Let's be thankful for our Bible conferences, support them and pray for them. This year they are to be held in Grafton, N. Dak. (Feb. 6-9), Osceola, Wis. (Feb. 13-16) and Lake Stevens, Wash. (Mar. 8-10).

Right and wrong about Law and Grace

Only a short time after the apostle Paul had founded the church in Galatia did false teachers appear on the scene. Just as many people today, the Galatians did not realize that by trying to earn grace through the covenant of the Law, they lost the covenant of grace. By depending on righteousness through our works we block the way for God's grace, and by trying to have a part in our own salvation we deny God His part in it. In this way Paul passionately spoke up against any corruptions of the Gospel. The only righteousness we will ever have is that which Jesus has earned for us. Faith does not know of any additions to the righteousness He won for us on the cross, and it

will not recognize any of our own contributions. Only faith in the Lamb of God who carried away the sins of the world is truly staying within the covenant of God.

After one year in Israel the time has come for us to say "Shalom." It has been a great experience for us to see with our own eyes the land we already knew through our Bible. We are especially thankful for the people we have met here, the many new friends we have got, and the wonderful hospitality we have been met with.



Annual meetings

Many congregations are on a treadmill. They spend time, invest money, and put forth much effort but get nowhere because they have failed to determine where they should go. With blind allegiance they follow the well-worn rut of past programs and organizational projects and hope they can at least maintain the status quo. To question the old programs and methods is forbidden. And so the congregation which has gotten nowhere keeps getting nowhere barely.

To be sure, such a congregation is not "getting nowhere." It is getting somewhere — backward. Consider yourself for a moment. You are never "in neutral" spiritually. If you are not growing spiritually and developing in obedient living, you are backsliding. So it is with the congregation.

Annual meetings give the congregation opportunity to take action or plan the action it will take in further establishing the Kingdom of God. If anything constructive is to be accomplished at the meeting it is imperative that some homework be done. Various boards and committees should meet ahead of time to evaluate the condition of their respective areas of concern. What are the financial needs? What is needed for the church building? What need is the Sunday School trying to reach? Is it meeting it? What are the needs among the youth? The elderly? After a careful and honest evaluation has been made of the needs, a plan should be constructed. If the present plan is effectively meeting the need then it needs to be reaffirmed. If not, some rebuilding is necessary. Every board should come to the meeting to either reaffirm the present plan (which they, are sure is meeting the need) or to

propose a new plan which they would like the congregation to prayerfully consider. The congregation does not have time at its meeting to plan how various needs should be met. But, when a plan which has been prayed over and mulled over is presented the congregation has something which it can accept, modify, or reject.

Poor attendance at the annual meeting is a sad commentary on the condition of the congregation. Some stay away because they have had their opinions ridiculed or lack of love shown them at previous meetings. Those offending need to go and seek their forgiveness. Some are indifferent and apathetic; they need to be loved and challenged. Every member of the church should be present to see how the Lord's money is being spent, how the congregation plans to meet their needs, and how they can be used by the Lord in ministering to the needs of others in and through the congregation. Pitch in! God has led you to your church. Go to bat for it!

Keep Sunday sacred

"Should I worship God in church in the good old summertime?"

God says in Galatians 5:17,18,21, "Walk by the Spirit and do not gratify the desires of the flesh. For the desires of the flesh are against the Spirit and the desires of the Spirit are against the flesh; for they are opposed to each other to prevent you from doing what you would . . . I warn you as I warned you before, that those who do such things shall not inherit the kingdom of God."


3. What would Jesus have me do?

A salute today to two people who played such an important role in the AFLC's early days at Medicine Lake. We refer to Mr. and Mrs. Robert Bursheim.

While the Association was holding its second annual conference, in June 1964, in Valley City, N. Dak., Bob and Meredith were moving into the apartment of the church building at 3110 E. Medicine Lake Blvd. This is the area where the church offices are now. The apartment was comfortable, the church cavernous, being used only for the storage of some Hauge Innermission Federation materials.

A seminary was to begin there that fall. Much had to be done and Bob, caretaker and jack-of-all-trades, was fully involved in all the physical aspects of that preparation. He also served as treasurer of the Association for a time, although he didn't do the day to day bookkeeping.

Meredith acted as hostess for the headquarters building and when the Bible School was started in 1966, she and Mrs. Reuben Wee, whose husband was a seminary student, did the cooking. Their apartment home now and then gave lodging to people who had come for special events. Meredith also worked with the taping of the radio program aired by radio station KRWB in Roseau, Minn. It was her weekly job to arrange music for it and put it together with the message.

Bob and Meredith Bursheim were charter members of the congregation started at headquarters, Medicine Lake Lutheran Church, and were involved in all aspects of that work, too.

After a few years they moved back to their home community at Winger, Minn., where they take part in many activities, not least in Dovre Lutheran Church, Roy B. Johnson, pastor.

The AFLC owes a debt of gratitude to this couple who played an important part in AFLC beginnings.
