He commanded the fathers

"For He established a testimony in Jacob, and appointed a law in Israel, which He commanded our fathers, that they should teach them to their children, that the generation to come might know, even the children yet to be born, that they may arise and tell them to their children, that they should put their confidence in God, and not forget the works of God, but keep His commandments" (Psalm 78:5-7 NASB).

What an incredible and convicting testimony on fatherhood we have in these verses. The comment has been made that what is conviction to one generation can become tradition with the next and die out in the third. How many of us live in communities that two generations ago had strong moral standards and where the church was the main source of influence in the community. What is the church's place

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today in these same communities? Sadly enough, spiritual apathy tends to run high even in conservative areas of the country. What has happened?

I believe the psalmist gives us not only a clue to what has happened but what must be done to restore spiritual vitality to communities across the nation. The admonition to Israel was that fathers should teach the "established testimony" to their children, in other words, what God had commanded Israel, God commanded fathers to teach their youngsters. When Martin Luther wrote the Catechism, he did so not to have it used as a confirmation textbook, but as a resource for fathers to use in teaching their children the established testimony of God as found in Scripture. I embrace the Catechism because the Catechism embraces the authority of Scripture as the means of grace.

When we bring our children to the Lord in Baptism, we promise that we will teach them the Ten Commandments, the Creed and the Lord's Prayer and that we will instruct the children in the Word of God and nurture them in the chastening and admonition of the Lord. How many young people, though, come to their first confirmation class with little knowledge of Scripture and an inability to even recite the Creed or the Lord's Prayer? Fathers, it's time to become teachers to our children!

In most homes in America today it could be generally stated that if there is spiritual instruction, it is initiated and carried on by the mother. I even know of Christian homes where it is the mother who suggests that there be a time of family devotions and prayer. Have Christian men in America also become intimidated by a system that says "religion is for women and children?" I hope not!

Several weeks ago, I heard a young pastor share a message in which he stated that the reason Judah was in such deep spiritual trouble when Josiah came to the throne was because the people had lost "the Book." When the temple was being repaired, the Book of the Law was found by Hilkiah the high priest. When King Josiah heard the words of the Book, it says that he tore his clothes in agony to think how far the people had wandered. The sins of the people were contemporary with our day. Children were being sacrificed, lawlessness was everywhere, and there were even temples of homosexual prostitution next to the house of God (see Jeremiah chapters 7-8).

Have we lost "the Book" again today? How far must our society slide before fathers will once again realize their responsibility as teachers to their children?

A young mother once took her fiveyear-old son to the doctor for a preschool checkup. She asked the pediatrician, "When do you think we should start teaching our little boy about values and spiritual things?" The pediatrician responded emphatically, "Woman, hurry home, you and your husband are already five years late."

Children do not embrace the Christian faith by osmosis, they need to be instructed in the things of the Lord. God has commanded that fathers teach their children so that the generations to come will not forget the works of the Lord, but rather through faith, by grace, keep His commandments.

Blessings Rand Responsibilities of FATHERS

The experience of being a father has been presented by several men in our congregation the past few weeks. Our adult Sunday school teacher conceived this fine idea. Sharing by a number of our men on this subject has certainly proved extremely interesting and profitable for all of us.

I would like to now share some thoughts for Father's Day concerning the blessings and responsibilities of being a father. Having a specially designated day for honoring fathers gives us an excellent opportunity to focus our attention on fathers. My wife and I once asked a young Japanese lady if they had a Father's Day in Japan. She laughingly replied, "In Japan every day is Father's Day," meaning that Japanese men are always doted upon by their wives and children. Since in America we have a day actually set aside in honor of fathers, it is therefore fitting to give special attention at this time to the topic of fatherhood.

Having been blessed by God with six sons, I feel that I can express myself not only objectively, but also subjectively, on this matter. For me, being a father is a great blessing.

Fatherhood is a blessing because children bring much happiness. The Book of books reminds us of this fact in Psalm 127:4-5, "As arrows are in the hand of a mighty man (warrior); so are the sons of one's youth. Happy is the man who has his quiver full of them. He shall not be put to shame when he speaks with his enemies at the gate." A warrior is very glad to have an ample supply of weapons which can fly where he cannot. He can accomplish feats with them that he could not do without them. Man invented the arrow because he discovered that he could kill game at a distance with a sharp-pointed slender shaft pulled back from a bent bow of wood by means of a cord. With many of these arrows in his quiver he had the potential to kill much game and to protect himself from his enemies. Arrows bring him happiness because they enable him to accomplish more things.

When Pastor George Knapp of Brazil was asked about the place of children on the mission field, he replied that they are a real asset because they help to open doors for the missionary. Per-

mit me to cite an example of this from my own experience. While serving as a missionary in Japan, I would distribute flyers at train stations and public schools for special services. I would take national Christians as well as our own little boys to assist me. On one occasion an unfriendly man shook his head and refused to accept the flyer from an adult of his own race. Thereupon I told one of my boys to run after him and offer him a flyer. This same man smiled, accepted the flyer, and thanked my boy. As a father I was indeed happy to see how my boy opened the door. I was happy to have some arrows in my quiver. Fatherhood is a blessing because children bring happiness.

My first experience of this special blessing was on the morning of November 5, 1953. In the wee hours of that morning I was awakened by my wife who said, "I think that you are going to become a father today." Though our baby wasn't due for another three weeks, I immediately arose, filled our car's radiator with water (since I had drained it the night before) and drove my wife to the hospital. After sitting in the waiting room for a half-hour and thinking of what it would be like to be a father, a nurse came out of the delivery room and announced to me, "Mr. Unseth, you have a fine baby boy." Instantly I felt in my heart that unique happiness that God gives to the parents of children.

One person stated, "Those who have many children are generally the happiest." A man said to a pastor with many children, "These are what make rich men poor." The pastor surprised him with this reply, "No, these are what make a poor man rich, for there is not one of these we would part with for all your wealth." Children bring an enormous amount of blessing to a father.

Fatherhood is such a great blessing because children are a gift from God. Psalm 127:3: "Lo, children are a heritage of the Lord; and the fruit of the womb is his reward." All of our children are a precious gift to us from God, since "It is He that has made us, and

not we ourselves." God gives children to us as a gracious favor. Of course, children are a blessing only if they follow the God who created them. The daughter of a dying man said to him as she knelt by his deathbed, "There is no greater blessing than for children to have godly parents." Her dying father replied, "And the next, for parents to have godly children." Indeed it is a wonderful blessing to be a father of children who make him happy by living for Jesus.

Being a father is also a responsibility. Since our children belong to God by virtue of creation, our biggest responsibility is to raise them for Him. For God claims what He has made. The creature is to reverence its Maker. We are to teach our children the high honor of being God's special creation.

In Deuteronomy 6:6-7, God tells us how we are to raise our children for Him, with these words, "And these words which I command you this day shall be upon your heart, and you shall teach them diligently to your children and shall talk of them when you sit in your house and when you walk by the way, and when you lie down, and when you rise." First of all, these words must be in the father's own heart by personal faith in the Lord and a deep love for God's Word. Words from other books reach the mind, but words from the Bible desire entrance into our hearts. Fathers must hide God's Word in their own hearts. Then we are to teach God's Word diligently to our children.

The most effective way to fulfill this crucial, God-given responsibility is through the conducting of daily family devotions. Christian parents will bring

their infants to the Lord in Baptism and then will faithfully pray for them and teach them God's Word in family devotions.

Through family devotions, fathers can fulfill their responsibility of influencing their children for Christ. Dr. Charles Sheldon recalled, "The first impression of a contented ideal in life and an idea that filled it to make it practical, that I can remember, centers about the habit of family worship, which was established by my father and mother on their wedding day. The regular reading of the Bible, the singing of a simple hymn, the kneeling down in the family circle while Father offered the morning prayer, praying for us often by name, the quiet moments of meditation that followed before we went out of that little log house on the Dakota prairie to begin the day's work on the ranch, produced lasting results in my thinking and profoundly influenced my conduct."

When my wife and I got married, we hadn't taken any course on parenting. However, God had laid it upon my heart to start having regular family devotions from day one. I'm thankful that God impressed me with this responsibility. I sincerely believe it is



this practice more than all else that has been used of God to bring all of our children to a personal commitment to Christ and to be living for Him today.

As we approach Father's Day, may all of us fathers thank God for the blessing of being fathers (of having children given to us by God) and let us commit ourselves to raising our precious children for Christ. For those of you who yet have your fathers living on this earth, be sure to express your thanks to them, and to God for them.

all details along with the newly formed BFLMI on behalf of this Church body.






The theme verse is Psalm 85:6 and the theme song is "Revive us again."

I accepted the call

The call to become the youth worker in the AFLC came to me about three months ago. Certainly, I reason, there are others who are more qualified for this opportunity. And, certainly there are pastors in the AFLC who are more qualified.

I accepted the call after much prayer and with the 100% approval of my church council. Also, I accepted the call on the basis that there are many qualified men who can also serve as resource people for youth work in the Association.

There are no "experts" in youth ministry and there are no "quick and easy methods" for working with young people. There are those times when not even the most interested and concerned pastor and when not even the most concerned of our Christian youth, can seem to have a Luther League which is active.

I have the belief that youth work begins in the cradle. There are strong feelings that the active Christian family is the real "youth worker" and without strong families Luther League work is always going to be quite a struggle. It has always seemed to me that where adults are interested and concerned about youth, there one will

find a strong youth program and a strong Luther League.

These people are the "significant others" or the "adult guarantors" who love youth and have a God-given concern for them. These people represent the future to youth and are willing to spend their time with them. They listen more than they talk. These are the people who have placed youth on their prayer list and who remember them often before God's throne of grace.

They are also the persons who do not approach kids with a judgmental attitude or a condemning spirit. They do not place kids in categories nor do they generalize and think all kids are the same. They approach each individual as an individual and they help him or her become what God wants that person to become.

As youth worker, then, I see myself as a resource person. I am making myself available to share ideas. This means, also, to share your ideas about youth work. Write to me or call me and share those ideas. We must work together as a team. I need to know what has worked well in your church and in your district.

CONFERENCE APPROACHES

Here are some scattered thoughts as the 25th Annual Conference of the Association of Free Lutheran Congregations is only two weeks away.

Much attention is focused on the Organizational Conference which formed the AFLC and was held in Thief River Falls, Minn., Oct. 25-28, 1962. The registration list for that Conference has been lost. It would be a real find if it should somehow turn up. We hope that the registration people at this year's Conference will have some plan to find out who of those who are present this year were also present Oct. 25-28, 1962, whether as official representatives of congregations or as just plain visitors.

It is very fitting that our Conference Committee this year has asked Rev. John P. Strand to preach the sermon at the opening service of this year's Conference. He spoke on Friday morning of that first Conference on the topic "The Church We Seek." There was little doubt after his talk but that he would be the first president of the Association and that was so determined the following day. We have no notes on the sermon, at least that we can put our hands on now, and unfortunately the message has been lost to posterity. Many of us have, however, heard Pastor Strand speak at later times on some of those themes he must have sounded in that talk at Our Saviour's Church on that long ago Oct. 26.

Pastor Strand also preached the sermon on that Friday night at a service in the Knox Elementary School Auditorium. His topic then was "Press on to Sanctification." (The overall Conference theme was "Press On to the Goal," Phil. 3:1-16.) As many of our readers know, Pastor Strand guided our church for over 15 years.

There is no question but what the thoughts of some of us will be flashing back almost 25 years now and then as we gather in Thief River Falls in a couple of weeks. Delegates must be sure to visit Our Saviour's Lutheran Church where the organizational Conference began. It has been added on to since then and remodelled. Then go east a block to Knox School where the Conference was moved when the church became too small to accommodate the people who came to plan a new church fellowship (actually, to continue the old) or just to see what was going on.

Our Conference this year is the 25th. It should be kept in mind that the first regular one was held at what is now St. Paul's Lutheran Church in Fargo, N. Dak., June 12-16, 1963. At that time the church, the former home of Messiah Lutheran, LCA, was simply called the Mission Head-quarters. That Conference was historic, too, in that it set up the permanent committees and adopted the first regular budget, which amounted to all of \$44,200, but we may have to be corrected on that total.

In looking at what may come up at this year's Conference, it is hard to say what major items there may be. Mission work in India seems a dead issue, according to the report found elsewhere in this paper. Conference action could dictate some action, but it is doubtful if there is support for doing more than the World Missions Committee has done.

Home Missions finds it difficult to keep up with its goal of establishing new congregations. There are hardly enough active pastors to meet the demand, for one thing. New congregations joining the AFLC may compete for available pastors. Some of our Home Missions works are thriving, others are a struggle.

We used to talk of a building project at our Schools, primarily for the Bible School. That issue has been quiet of late. There has been a need for the Association to catch up with her budget goals first. Whether the idea of venturing out on a building program will come up this year, we don't know. Any appreciable increase in seminary enrollment will dictate the need for more classroom space. A larger library for the Schools is a must somewhere down the road, but perhaps not yet.

In all, an Anniversary Conference is special. It is a time to think back, to reminisce. We can compute how far we have come, to a certain degree. Then it is natural to look forward and to wonder what goals we should set and where our major efforts should lie. Are there any new directions we ought to take? It will be interesting to see what visions our president and the various agencies share about the AFLC future under God.

Please pave the way for the 1987 Conference with much prayer. The Association began with prayer, has relied upon it through the years and must move forward in total reliance upon the Lord.



this year when the invitation from Thief River Falls was accepted due to the historic significance. The third years also coincided with the elections of the president. That tie-up has now been broken.

The question for delegates to debate week after next is whether or not to have Conferences two out of three years (last year in Washington state) so far away from the AFLC's center and whether or not to have five years, if the DeKalb invitation is accepted, intervene between Conferences at Medicine Lake. If DeKalb doesn't invite for 1988, no problem. If it does and/or some other church does also, then one or both of these points must be kept in mind.

COMEBACK

The Sixth Commandment has made a comeback of sorts in the recent Jim Bakker and Gary Hart stories. And that's good.

The Commandment has always been in effect since God gave it on Mt. Sinai. We don't mean that it hasn't. But it has come under some very rough going in these last 20 years of so-called enlightenment. Many people have literally "trashed" it and pay it no more heed than the most insignificant statute of American law.

Under this way of thinking every person is his own judge

of what is right or wrong about sexual activity. Some would teach that there *isn't* anything wrong about it in any circumstances. If one chooses to be sexually active before or apart from the marriage covenant, fine. There may be some social consequences of sex as one wishes, but if one can handle that, fine. God's law is considered as not applicable.

God says, "Thou shalt not commit adultery." What evidence is there that the great permissiveness of today is the better way? Do all the pregnancies of unwed women, infidelity in marriage, the AIDS epidemic, the acceptance of homosexuality as a life style as honorable as the heterosexual reveal that a better way has been found, that our world is a richer, more wholesome place than under God's order? We think not.

God's way is the best way in matters of morality and in all things of which the Commandments speak. The sooner our world comes back to its senses about this the better off it will be.

If Jim Bakker and Gary Hart have done wrong, and there is evidence to that effect, we can be glad that there has been reaction against it, that people hold those in public life to a high standard (apparently we haven't always done this). May we continue to hold a higher standard than before. It has been good to see that there is some recognition that there is a Sixth Commandment: "Thou shalt not commit adultery."
