

### The house that Jack built

Pastor Wallace Jackson

Matthew 7:24-27

"It takes a heap of livin' to make a house a home" someone reminds us. Jack probably made the discovery early on that making mortgage payments, insurance premiums and tending to general upkeep on his newlybuilt \$90,000 split-level "palace" did not fulfill his obligation to make his house a "home." Pastor Jack also made the discovery early on that living in a church-provided "parsonage" does not in itself constitute a "home" either. Many another "Jack" has concluded in observing his family growing in numbers and years that, contrary to public opinion, home is not just where the hearth is, but where the heart is. The mythical "Jack" of the fairy tale is found to quickly transform into any able-bodied, biologically sound, mentally keen father of the decade of the "Eighties." He wears big shoes and

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fills them well. He is said to have good "understanding."

The fact that Jack, as a father, has a day set aside especially for him is rather sobering. It makes him think! It all began way back in 1910, when on June 17th Father's Day came into being. Someone wised up! Showing devotion and respect for fathers is not a modern concept. It is not unlikely that those first sons, Cain and Abel, showed these admirable qualities with respect to Adam, whose wisdom produced names for the myriad of creatures found in field and forest. And that without a child psychologist to point the way!

Sadly, Father's Days are not always sunny. He will be startled if his eight-year-old bursts in on him with the jolting query: "Dad, I'd like to follow in your footsteps, when are you going to start making some?" How suddenly the sun sets on your day off!

THE CHRISTIAN HOME. One must search far to find a word more suggestive, heartwarming and meaningful than the word "home." It is more than a word, it is an experience. Home may be ostentatious or simple. It may have "a bath or a path." It is home! If Christ dwells there it is a Christian home. Here the Lover of souls carries on a work of changing lives, improving relationships and satisfying hearts. Here discipline is exercised, patience exhibited and understanding demonstrated. The adhesive that holds it all together is the love that "covereth a multitude of sins." It is a place of peace, shelter and security. The walls which "keep in" the flock are designed to keep out the anti-Christian influences. This sanctuary needs to be a bastion against materialistic "overdrive"; where mammon is closeted until needed. God's Word must be the acknowledged heritage of all concerned.

It will be Dad who, for the most part, determines whether his will be a "Sunday go-a-fishin' " or a "Sunday go-to-meetin' " family. He will likely determine if his will be a work-on-Sunday, seat-in-the bleachers, or seat-in-the-pew family. There is little doubt that Dad determines the personality of the clan. He sets the pace and may well hear behind him a tiny voice saying, "Daddy, don't you walk so fast!" He sets the standard by which his family is reared. He is responsible for body and soul alike. A TV "dinner" causes little harm to a little body, but a TV "Special" may cause soul contamination. Even for a Minnesotan, being a Steeler fan is not all bad. It may indeed help mold character and help prevent his "future man" from becoming a stealer. But, it is not enough! Counterproductive advertising of a macho fullback holding his favorite brew does little good for the inner man of the little man. He watches Dad while Dad watches them

And so, from Pastor Jack to you "Jack," whoever you are, do your thing as a devoted dad. Shoulder the load and make straight paths for your feet. Then that eight-year-old won't have to ask you when you are going to make some tracks for him to follow. With Christ in your heart and by your side this "Carpenter of Nazareth" will assist you to not only build a house, but a home, indeed, a home that will be a foretaste of heaven.

# Association awaits Annual Conference

For the seventh time the Association of Free Lutheran Congregations will meet at the church headquarters in suburban Minneapolis, Minn., for her annual conference.

The annual conference, the 22nd, will be held June 21-24 in the church building on the shores of Medicine

A large turnout is expected for several reasons. There will be an election for president of the AFLC. The three-year term of Rev. R. Snipstead expires. He has served since 1978. He is eligible for re-election. Second, a number of new congregations and missions have joined the fellowship and they are expected to be represented at conference. Third, conferences held in Minneapolis tend to draw well. The alltime high registration for a conference was six years ago in Minneapolis when 496 delegates were present. Three years ago the total was almost 100 less, but still good in comparison to other conference to-

There will be elections for vicepresident and secretary of the Association for one-year terms as well as for board and committee members. Some of the elections will be in corporation annual meetings during the conference.

An ordination service will be held Sunday afternoon, June 24. Mr. Walter Beaman, McIntosh, Minn., who has served in the AFLC for many years and who had pastoral experience in another church body before that, and who was once a missionary in South America under an independent Lutheran mission, will be one of those ordained. Two or more graduates of the AFLC's theological seminary this year will also be ordained at conference. Ordination for the seminary seniors is contingent upon having completed all requirements for graduation and having accepted a call from a parish.

It is expected that the Facilities Committee will bring in a report on exact costs for a new building at AFLBS and for an apartment complex for seminary students and their families. The 1983 conference called for this report and more information on facility needs at the Schools.


Much of the remainder of the conference business is expected to be routine. Quite a good deal of attention will be directed to pensions again this year, however, as pensions (retirement) and health insurance were separated last year. Also, a new carrier for the pastors' and workers' health insurance had to be secured recently.

Rev. Kenneth Pentti, Ishpeming, Mich., evangelist of the church, will preach the opening sermon of the conference Wednesday night on the conference theme "Loyalty to Christ" (John 8:31, 32).

The women's auxiliary of the AFLC, the Women's Missionary Federation, will hold its annual convention on Wednesday morning and afternoon, preceding the annual conference. On Thursday night the WMF will present its mission festival service. Mrs. Grace Syverson, Tioga, N. Dak., is the president.

The youth auxiliary, the Luther League Federation, Rev. Curtis Emerson, Valley City, N. Dak., president, will be featured at the Saturday evening service.

### REPORT FROM MISSIONARY DAVID ABEL

(This communication was written in early April to the Executive Director of AFLC World Missions and the Missions Committee and is shared with *Ambassador* readers now.)

"Now thanks be unto God, which always causeth us to triumph in Christ, and maketh manifest the savour of His knowledge by us in every place" (II Cor. 2:14).

I'm sitting at a Bible camp in Quito, Ecuador, just praising the Lord for the victory which we have in Jesus. I've been here for a week of special training sponsored by Evangelism Explosion III for future clinic teachers in Latin America. It has been a time of real spiritual renewal as we studied and prayed together. What was most convicting was a series of studies on prayer. Oh, how we need a deeper prayer life! I find this so true in my life! Tomorrow as I return to Vitoria, I pray that God will help me to develop a more meaningful prayer relationship with Him and also lead the church in a new commitment to prayer.

We have much to pray for. God is working in a way that causes me to feel insignificant and so much in need of His direction. We are still in the process of officially organizing our church but the group has grown from around 70 to about 100. Our little "church" in the upstairs apartment is full! We are thinking of covering the terrace of the building and moving up there, where we will be able to seat around 200-250. Why the growth? First of all, a good base, eight to ten families, who are real prayer warriors, who are serious about their Christianity and who want to share their faith. Our mid-week prayer meetings have between 45-60 people and there are always at least five visitors at every meeting.

Secondly, we had a very good family camp at the end of February, with the whole church in attendance. Our theme was "How to be a Wit-

ness." Through the instruction of a special guest couple the youth and adults were motivated to go out into the streets on Wednesday and Thursday nights after camp and share their faith, using the "Four Spiritual Laws." God blessed and together with another evangelical church we prayed with 42 souls during those two nights. Several of these are now being followed up by the group. Though I do not think the "Four Spiritual Laws" is the best method, yet by giving my people something they can use right now, it has been exciting to hear the testimonies as they share about relatives and friends whom they have witnessed to.

We have also started training in Evangelism Explosion, which involves four people. We hope by September to have six teams going out every week to share the Gospel. Praise the Lord! These four people are excited as they prepare to learn how to share their faith so that they can teach others.

The third, or should I say fourth, reason for growth is the visitors that are being brought by the members to the meetings. One family brought a boy to church who once had always been throwing stones at their house. After a few weeks he accepted Christ. He then brought another friend, who brought another, who brought two more. The result so far is that in the last two months we have prayed with 12 boys age 12-17. Last Thursday, at our prayer meeting, the sister of one boy and the mother and sister of another stayed after for prayer. Praise the Lord! We have a special discipleship class just for these young men. Please pray that God would help these new converts to grow in the Word.

But there are also difficulties. Because of the work of a renegade Baptist pastor among the group I have encountered a very confused bunch in regard to doctrine. During the last three months we have preached a series of sermons on what the Bible teaches on various subjects. Infant baptism has been the area with the

most questions. By decision of the church council, I am now visiting each family to get information for our membership file, to find out their personal spiritual condition and to ask and answer any doctrinal questions. The council hopes we will have at least nine families who will be willing to organize a church which is Lutheran in doctrine. So far we have found four families in favor, two still in doubt, one family that has joined a Baptist church and one family that has received assurance of

We will be dividing up the group into various smaller groups for Bible studies in the homes on Tuesday nights, led by laymen. This is a more informal place where the converts can first go to begin getting into the church. Pray for this ministry.

I will be teaching one Evangelism Explosion clinic this year in a city

about four hours from here. We are planning for between 25-30 pastors. Continue to pray for Brazil. For the first time Janet (my wife) and I were able to see how carnal and immoral Brazilian "carnaval" is, being in a large city. How this country needs Jesus! The devil is having a heyday! Thank you for your prayers and support. God grant us wisdom, strength and vision to keep proclaiming the Gospel till Jesus comes. Maranatha!

The property isn't as private as it once was. Many new homes have been built in the neighborhood, but we trust that irritants from a much larger community population have been minimal.

We think that all those who are returning in coming to the annual conference will truly enjoy to be back. We'll all see some changes even if it's only been a year. Those who haven't been at our Schools-Headquarters for three years will notice even more.

People make a conference, but place is important, too. This year our conference is at an old familiar location

### ROUTINE CONFERENCE?

From all indications the forthcoming annual conference will be a routine one. Routine in the sense that no prickly issues loom ahead. However, it can happen that just when that looks to be the case, something interesting develops.

Of course, the election of a president shouldn't be seen as routine in the sense that it's done at every conference. But neither do we see it as a difficult matter.

We are going to hear more about some things which were talked about last year: new buildings at the Schools, pastors' health care, the new Capital Investment Fund, plans to conclude the present debt at the Schools, seminary internship, how we're doing on the first million-dollar-goal in the AFLC. Whether any decision is to be made on a possible Schools' building project this year, we don't know.

And there will be other things discussed: missions abroad and at home, publications, parish education, evangelism, the whole area of stewardship of money, etc.. etc.

It would be good if potential delegates to the conference, at least, would refer back to our reports on last year's conference in the *Ambassador* as well as the 1983 Annual Report. Thus prospective delegates might get an idea of what to expect this year.

In no way do we suggest that if the conference is routine that it will be dull. It will be concerned with God's work. And that's the most exciting thing in the world. Not hockey- or basketball-exciting, but on a much deeper level.

This is an annual plea we make, but it needs emphasis each year. *Pray* for the Annual Conference of 1984. Pray down the Lord's blessing and benediction upon this 22nd conference. Expect great things from Him.

### WEEKLY DEADLINES

Every pastor conducting a regular ministry has at least one weekly deadline, perhaps several more. But the one we're thinking of now is the deadline of being prepared to preach a sermon on Sunday each week. That's quite a thing when you come to think about it.

Usually, if he is a follower of the pericope texts (a good idea), his text is chosen for him. It will either be the Gospel or Epistle (Scripture) text for the day. Then the task is his to make ready the "message" God would have him bring to his people on the appointed day.






### Tucson Church progressing

## WANTS OPEN RELIGIOUS POLICY

Regarding the topic of students in Christian organizations having the right to meet on school campuses, as commented upon in a recent *Ambassador* editorial, may I respectfully, but strongly differ. Our public schools are intended to be institutions of education. In a free society every point of view has a right to be presented. The right of high school students, for example, to meet before or after school hours as a Christian club or Bible study group is one that must be jealously guarded and defended.

In our nation two federal district courts have strongly upheld students' religious rights. At Williamsport, Pa., the court ruled that refusing them the right to meet for religious purposes, at the same time and in the same manner as students meet for other purposes, is a denial of their

freedom of speech and assembly. In another case, in Oklahoma, the judge upheld a policy permitting students to meet for religious expression on their campuses.

I strongly stand with the National Association of Evangelicals, which is urging Christian citizens to "express outrage that high school students are granted free speech on almost every subject but religion." To deny Christian students the right to meet just because we fear that cults may also seek this privilege is not valid reasoning. In a free educational forum we must let all viewpoints have a voice. The truth will stand firm when all else is shaken and shown to be emptiness and vanity. If we are free to speak of our Lord Jesus Christ who is the truth, then we can trust God's Holy Spirit to bless the truth and draw others to the abundant life in Christ.
