

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Words of encouragement

iscouragement has always been a problem for many Christians. That is why God has raised up certain people with a gift of encouragement. Barnabas was such a man. In fact, his name means "Son of Consolation." He was with Paul on the first missionary journey as recorded in Acts 13. They followed the same pattern of work in Pisidain Antioch as they had in every other city. First, they went to the synagogue for a service. At this service the Scriptures were always read. Most of the passages contained promises concerning the coming of the Messiah. Then opportunity was given for comments on the Word that was read. At the point the leader of the synagogue said, "Brethren, if you have any word of exhortation (or consolation, or encouragement) for the people, say it" (Acts 13:15).

So Paul brought them a message from God. We are very fortunate to have it recorded in Acts 13:16-41. In this sermon Paul tells how the Word had prophesied that the Messiah would come and that Jesus fit the prophecies perfectly. Then he called on the people to believe in Jesus and accept Him as their Messiah.

The response was immediate. Some believed the message and received Christ as their Messiah. Others were filled with jealousy and hatred and "talked abusively" against the message.

And so they went on from place to place bringing the good news of salvation, encouraged by the change seen in the lives of those who believed. Paul would preach, Barnabas would encourage, and so the Gospel would go forward.

Discouragement was a lifelong battle for Martin Luther. We have all heard the account of how his wife Katie appeared one morning wearing mourning clothes. When Martin asked who had died, she replied, "The way you have been acting lately, it must be God." Another time when he was especially discouraged by the attack of Satan, he was said to have hurled an inkwell at him, leaving a blotch on the wall.

But, in spite of things that bring discouragement, there are always positive things to give hope. Let us look at some of them in today's world.

- 1.) First, there is the faithful sharing of the Gospel in many places. There are still many faithful pastors who believe the Word of God and proclaim it.
- 2.) There are many Christian men and women who live their lives from day to day, bringing glory to the name of Christ.
- 3.) We have many fine young people who are responsible, doing what is right. Many are deeply committed believers in Christ.
- 4.) We have heard of the faith of people of eastern Europe who proclaim their Christian faith in spite of every effort that is made to destroy it.
- 5.) Finally, there are more and more people who are willing to stand for what they believe. They are willing to pay the price for their convictions. I believe we are going to see a core of committed Christians acting as a leaven in a world of great need. It is my prayer that you will be found among the faithful group of believers.

Welcome to the 1990 Annual Conference

nce again it is a privilege to extend an invitation to the people of our AFLC to the Annual Conference of our Church. I trust that my invitation to you may be the encouragement that will help many of you decide to come to the Conference.

Our Conference is open to every member of every congregation of our AFLC. That is a privilege that is unique to the membership of the AFLC. I trust that we do not treat this opportunity lightly. There is no better place to get to know your church than to attend an Annual Conference.

Our Conference this year is very centrally located for our Church. It will be in Minneapolis, Minnesota. The dates are June 13-17.

We want to recognize the fine work that our host congregation, Emmaus Lutheran, is doing in preparation for the Conference. During the days of the Conference the words "Partnership in the Gospel" will be challenging us. It is a theme that is forward looking. I believe that every one of us should have our vision challenged as we come to this Conference. Certainly as a Church we need that. Though this will be our 28th Annual Conference, we cannot dwell on the past, but we pray that the "Go" of the Gospel may draw from each of us a deeper commitment to the task of preaching the Gospel to all men in the closing decade of this century. May each of us be a part of the partnership!

Stewardship in the 1990s

In early issues of the Ambassador this year we have been privileged to read what the various leaders of the AFLC envision for our church body as we enter into the new decade of the 1990s. It was encouraging to sense the enthusiasm and optimism that our leaders have for the work God has called us to do. In these articles the challenge was given to each of us to enter into the work of our Association with greater commitment and dedication than ever before. We were reminded again that the time is short and the fields "are white already to harvest" (John 4:35).

Without the enthusiastic support of every pastor and church leader in sharing the work of the Association with their congregations, the needs will not be known and the work will suffer. Informed congregations are enthused congregations and enthused congregations are giving congregations. It is our prayer on the Stewardship Board that both pastors and local leaders will rededicate themselves in this new decade to keeping the ministries of our Association before our people on a continual basis.

As I close, let me say that we must never lose sight of the fact that we have a God who is "able to do exceeding abundantly above all that we ask or think" (Eph. 3:20). The incredible blessings of the past three decades will not compare to what God is able to do for us and through us in the 1990s if we are faithful to Him. We on the Stewardship Board believe that God has great things in store for our AFLC if we will humbly seek His face and obediently take up our cross and follow Him. Let us agree at the start of this new decade to be united in our dedication and commitment to the Lord's work. Let us pray, give and serve as never before so that souls will be saved and the church of Jesus Christ will prosper.

"Bring all the tithes into the storehouse, that there may be food in My house, and prove Me now in this," says the Lord of hosts, "if I will not open for you the windows of heaven and pour out for you such blessing that there will not be room enough to receive it" (Mal. 3:10).

IMPORTANT ELECTIONS

n the annual conferences of the AFLC, where not many crucial decisions are made, the election of officers and board members (some of these by corporations) become centers of attention. That is certainly the case this year when the three constitutional officers are to be elected and for the first time in history all three incumbents are under the three-fourths majority rule, having served three or more consecutive terms.

Also, while the new voting procedure, in which the ecclesiastical ballot is used, was in effect last year at Minot for the re-elections of the vice-president and secretary, this will be the first time it will be used in electing a president. And there is always an air of suspense whenever something is done for the first time.

Under the ecclesiastical or Roman ballot, the first ballot is a nomination ballot (the voter may write in the name of any AFLC member). One ballot for each office may be enough. Last year in Minot it was, in both cases. Or, numerous ballots may be needed.

A problem remains, perhaps more than one, in the new voting procedure. Out of many nominees on the first ballot, if no one received 75% of the vote, how many shall be dropped before the second and succeeding ballots are taken? At present, it seems that only the lowest vote-getter is to be dropped each time. In the voting for secretary in 1989, 31 persons were nominated. It wouldn't make sense to drop, say, one person per ballot from a list that long.

Some things are yet to be spelled out and before long it would be good to put our new voting procedure into our permanent documents so that no one will be mistaken as to how we govern ourselves.

Let us pray much for our Annual Conference, June 13-17, and not least for the decisions that will be made about leadership of our fellowship. In the nature of things, many judgments about our ongoing common work have to be made by our officers and board members. We must vote knowledgeably and then support those who are chosen to lead with our daily prayers and good will.

ARTICLE VIII

uch assistance consists partly in the mutual sharings of spiritual gifts among the congregations through conferences, exchange visits, lay activities, etc., whereby congregations are mutually edified, and partly in the voluntary and Spirit-prompted cooperation of congregations for the accomplishing of such tasks as exceed the ability of the individual congregation" (The Fundamental Principles).

In the Article before this one it is stated that a free congregation gladly accepts mutual assistance from other congregations or churches, all for the purpose of advancing God's kingdom or God's work.

Thus, while in a sense a congregation is self-contained and self-sufficient in that it has the Word, the Sacraments and the presence of the Holy Spirit, the congregation is open to the help that like-minded congregations can give it and longs for the fellowship of other congregations which share the same faith, goals and aspirations. By inference, Article VIII also is saying that the congregation of which we speak is anxious to help sister congregations, for mutual sharings and mutual edification imply not that one only receives from others but that there is giving and contributing, too.

While it is good and right that one's first loyalty is to his own congregation, there should still be some desire to get together with believers in other congregations. The annual conferences of the Association are such occasions. If anything is, that is the gathering of the whole family. How good it would be if everyone of the local units could be represented at such times.

District and area Bible conferences are another opportunity for fellowship, as are the various Bible camps, Luther League and Women's Missionary Federation conventions, church workshops and retreats, etc. In all of these, different talents and gifts are involved, not least of which is the gift of hospitality.

Furthermore, blessings await the meeting together of neighboring congregations through exchange visits, lay activities, etc. One way this is done is by exchange Family Night programs. Unfortunately, all too often when a visiting group comes with something to share, the host congregation is poorly represented. Those who are present are blessed, but there is some embarrassment on both sides. Article VIII encourages these visits of fellowship. There is a building up that can take place, but there must be a willingness to let it happen.

Finally, the Article pictures congregations working together to do what they cannot do alone. That will be discussed next time as we take up Article IX, but we should notice that this joint effort is to be voluntary and Spirit-prompted. The free congregation cannot be forced to do anything it doesn't want to do. Where the Holy Spirit shows the need for participation in larger service and reveals the possibilities for that, the congregation gladly and wholeheartedly enters in, to the glory of God the Father.

legalizing horse racing for betting purposes, games of chance (sometimes for charities) and lotteries. Minnesota joined the number of states with lotteries on Apr. 17, becoming the 32nd to do so, and her citizens and others plunked down over five million dollars the first day.

Few people in state and national legislatures dare to speak seriously of raising taxes for legitimate needs and yet not a few of their constituents think little of laying down \$20 for any one of the gambling opportunities around and that perhaps a number of times in a year. And those who do so aren't always those most financially able to do so.

It's a bewildering and mixed-up world we live in. Men

are paid one, two, three and four million dollars a year to play games while deep social problems go unaddressed. American women abort hundreds of thousands of unborn babies a year, not because their own lives are in danger, but because they don't want to be inconvenienced by a (another) child. More and more, Americans are turning to gambling as a way to raise funds for supplying governmental and social needs, thereby raising a whole bunch of new problems.

Churches are facing a rack of new dilemmas also in light of the gambling craze. How do they maintain Christian witness when their members become increasingly involved in an action which has traditionally and rightfully raised grave moral concerns?

Redeemer Lutheran, Canton, S. Dakota

Redeemer Lutheran Congregation of Canton, South Dakota, was begun after several families in the Canton area contacted the Home Mission Committee of the AFLC. The first service was held January 9, 1983, in a store building on West Fifth Street in Canton, with Home Mission director, Rev. Elden Nelson, and Rev. Robert Lee, then with the AFLC Seminary, conducting the service. Thereafter, for the next 18 months, regular services were held with Pastor Lee and Rev. Kenneth Moland, dean of the AFLC Bible School, ministering to the congregation on alternate weekends.

Groundbreaking ceremonies were held October 9 that year on a plot of land on the west edge of Canton and church construction was begun, with members doing much of the labor. On June 5, 1984, the first service was held in the new structure. In August of that year the congregation received a full-time pastor, Rev. Rodger Olson.



Now, seven years later, the congregation has an active WMF, Luther League, choir and weekly midweek Bible studies. Nine of the 12 charter families are still a part of the fellowship. Our average Sunday attendance is 50 to 60, with a membership of 26 families. Through the years members who at first were strangers now have been knit together in Christian love. We are served presently by Pastor Ronald D. Knutson. Rev. Erwin Brandt

filled in as interim pastor.

We are very grateful to the AFLC Home Missions Department for giving us the opportunity to establish a congregation with a firm Bible emphasis and we very much appreciate the free congregation concept. Please remember us in prayer that we may be witnesses in the Canton community and that we may gain new members, because our church has room for many more families.

BOOK REVIEW

Gerhard E. Frost, Seasons of a Lifetime, Augsburg Fortress, Minneapolis, Minn., 160 pages. \$.

The late Gerhard Frost, long time pastor and seminary professor, was a master at striking the unforgettable phrase. Two that have stayed with me lo these many years are "The church bell is the dinner bell of the soul" and "All of God's grown-up children are in heaven."

Equally easy of remembrance is one of the anecdotes he wrote of in *These Things I Remember*, of the time as a small boy when he struck the brand new grindstone on the farm and cracked it to the center. As long as that stone was used, the click at each rotation reminded him of his childish folly and his father's mercy. And he drew a spiritual moral from that.

Gerhard Frost wrote and published many poems. Posthumously, members of his family have gathered most of their favorites and more than 50 unpublished poems and put them in this book. They are grouped topically by the seasons of a year to represent the seasons of a lifetime.

If you must have poetry that rhymes, the book isn't for you. The versification is free. If the reader of these poems doesn't find his own thoughts put in words again and again in them, I am badly mistaken. Here are a few examples. The first two are excerpts, the last two, full poems.

Canadian AFLC holds 7th Conference

Lay pastor Gene Sundby of Outlook Saskatchewan, was returned as president of the Association of Free Lutheran Congregations in Canada at the seventh annual conference held in the city of Vernon in the beautiful Okanagan valley of interior British Columbia, April 6-8.

The conference was opened officially by Vice-President Alvin Pinno after a communion service led by Student Pastor Steve Olinger, with Pastor Leslie Johnson as speaker. The Women's Missionary Federation held their annual meeting the afternoon of the 6th, led by Mrs. Johnson, president.

Conference Bible study leader Dr. Francis Monseth incorporated the conference theme from John 15:16, "I have chosen you," into his studies on the Law and the Gospel in the ministry of the local congregation, and the gift of the Holy Spirit.

The business meeting followed the Bible study Saturday morning, along with a time of prayer and thanksgiving. A significant point in the meeting was the adopting of resolution 12 as the stand taken by the AFLC in Canada on the issue of homosexuality. The resolution contains a presentation of the clear teaching of God's Word on the subject, paragraph 10 reading as follows:

Be it resolved that the annual conference of the AFLC-Canada continue to uphold and affirm the Holy Scriptures, God's Word, on all matters of faith and practice, including the following Biblical teachings on the sanctity of the sexual relationship within the bonds of heterosexual marriage:

- a) God's design for marriage is a male and female relationship exclusively (Gen. 2);
- b) God's design for marriage as a permanent union between male and female (Matt. 19:4-6; Rom. 7:2; I Cor. 7:39); and
- c) God's design for marriage as the only relationship in which the sexual relationship between male and female is honorable and beautiful in the sight of God (Heb. 13:4).

Resolution 7 spoke of the continuance of the prayer and financial sup-

port through the bursary program of the work and ministry of the Bible School and Seminary in Minneapolis and for the three Canadians who have attended there during the past year.

Resolution 19 acknowledged and gave thanks to God for our sister AFLC (USA) and in particular acknowledged the counsel and assistance given by Pastor Richard Snipstead, president, and Pastor Elden Nelson, director of Home Missions.

Resolution 22 expressed thanks and gratitude to the Living Word Lutheran Church in Vernon for serving as hosts for the 1990 conference of the AFLC in Canada.

The Saturday evening service was led by Mr. Art Hanger of Calgary. Dr. Monseth spoke on the theme, "We are called to bear fruit," he said, "We need to cleanse and purify the church, making sure each one has a right relationship in Christ."
