AN ENCOURAGING WORD

Jesus, the true vine

I am the vine, you are the branches; he who abides in Me, and I in Him, he bears much fruit; for apart from Me you can do nothing. John 15:5

he above teaching of Jesus evidently took place after Jesus and His disciples had gone out from the upper room and were walking toward the Garden of Gethsemane (cf. John 14:31b and 18:1). Perhaps they passed by a fruitful vine which Jesus used as an "object lesson" to convey this vital truth to His followers. It is certainly a vital truth for every generation of Christ's followers in that it speaks of the necessary and unceasing union that must be maintained between the believer and His Savior.

It seems that it is a common struggle among Christians to maintain this "abiding union" or "communion" with the Savior. We may have days where our abiding in Christ seems so constant and uninterrupted and the fruit seems to flow from our lives. But then there are the apparently "dry seasons" when we may wonder what has happened and why there is such an evident fruitlessness in our lives. It is then that we begin to agonize and ask, "What must I do to get back on track?"

Perhaps we need to realize that the matter of abiding in the vine (as in the case of the physical vine and branch) is not a labor we are to perform as much as it is simply a living out of the natural relationship we have with Jesus. Jesus says "I am the vine - you are the branch." A branch is nothing more than the outgrowth of the vine. The branch finds all that it needs in the vine and is not able to contribute anything to its position or its existence. The fact that a branch dries up when it is separated from the vine reminds us what we are in and of ourselves and that all our labors to be a good branch are futile!

Speaking of Jesus' words in John 15:5, Andrew Murray says: "study this holy mystery until you see Christ as the true Vine, bearing, strengthening, supplying, and inspiring all His branches. He will be and do in each branch all that it needs. and the abiding will come of itself ... He to whom God reveals the glory of the true Vine - he who sees what Jesus is and waits to do every moment — can do nothing but abide. The vision of Christ is an irresistible attraction. It draws and holds us like a magnet. Listen continually to the living Christ still speaking to you, and waiting to show you the meaning and power of His Word: I am the vine."

Perhaps the reason we so often struggle in this area is that we are too occupied with abiding and not occupied enough with Jesus Himself.

Father, help us to see these words of Jesus -- not as words telling us what we must do or become — but as words guiding us into the very realization of who we are in Christ, Amen.

Why keep on?

The question has been asked, "Why keep on sharing the good news of salvation when so many hearts only seem to grow colder?" We look at the question and maybe have to stop and reflect on what the question is trying to bring out in our individual lives. We could answer it in many different ways, but we want to find the answer from our Lord and Savior, Jesus.

We have to realize the importance of what has been done to bring us the gift of salvation. This is brought out so clearly in Romans 5:8, "But God commended His love toward us, in that, while we were yet sinners, Christ died for us." Seeing that love of God bestowed on us even when we did not deserve it should make each of us stop and consider why God would do such a thing.

John 3:16 reinforces Romans 5:8: "For God so loved the world that he gave His only begotten Son; that whosever believes in Him should not parish, but have everlasting life." If God is willing to do this for me, can I do anything less for Him? I must accept His free gift of salvation and go

forward, living my life to show His love for mankind so the people I come in contact with will see Jesus in me and glorify our Father in heaven.

When we look at Jesus' disciples, we see that because of their faith in Jesus they were willing to suffer in many different ways to be counted worthy for Jesus. There are many examples we can turn to in Scripture and see the sufferings they went through for their faith. Moses was threatened and he called for help from God as he led the Israelites to the Promise Land. David sought God's leading when the odds seemed against him. Daniel was put into the den of lions but his faith in God didn't waiver. Shadrach, Meshach and Abednego confirmed their faith in God before being thrown into the fiery furnace. Jeremiah proclaimed God's Word for 40 years, even though no one was listening. Many more are mentioned in Hebrews chapter eleven. These encourage us and we know that even if we are to suffer for Jesus' sake we are not to be ashamed. but to give God the glory. God will

keep the souls of those committed to Him as stated in I Peter 4:14-19.

In looking at John 1:4-5,10-11, we read: "In Him was life; and the life was the light of men. And the light shines in darkness; and the darkness comprehended it not. ... He was in the world, and the world was made by Him, and the world knew Him not. He came unto His own, and His own received him not."

We see that even though God's own chosen people rejected Jesus as He walked among us in human form, He continued to proclaim the need of accepting God's gift for the forgiveness of sins.

Towards the end of my two years of confirmation classes, our pastor called us into his office one at a time and asked if we had any questions or wanted to talk about salvation. I told him I didn't know how you could believe and have peace. He talked to me and showed me several Bible verses, especially Ephesians 2:8-10, Romans 10:10-13, John 3:14-18 and John 14:6. Even though my walk in life didn't always include Jesus; through the prayers of loved ones I came back to the narrow road that leads to eternal life.

I can see how important Bible reading is along with much prayer. It is the only way we can have the peace that Jesus gives us, even through adversity. It is our responsibility as Christians to do the will of God — that is to bring the lost into a saving faith through Jesus Christ our Lord.

Yes, God has been merciful to us sinners and has provided a way to heaven through His Son Jesus. "For there is one God, and one Mediator between God and man, the man Christ Jesus" (I Timothy 2:5).

That is why we should keep on.

The heritage we possess

The church is to be concerned about those who are lost. It is to be evangelistic, preaching the Word of God so that it brings people into a personal relationship with Jesus Christ. This is done through the proper preaching of the Word of God and rightly administering the sacraments.

When Georg Sverdrup came to the United States, he wanted to begin such a church body. He wanted the congregation to become "free and living." That is, for individuals and congregations to be free under the blood of Christ. Lay people were also to become involved in the life of the church.

In 1897 the "Fundamental Principles" of the Lutheran Free Church were written. These principles were practiced in the new church Sverdrup and others organized in the United States.

When the Association of Free Lutheran Congregations began in 1963, these "Fundamental Principles" became the guiding principles of the church body and its member congregations. The AFLC is not a corporation nor is it a synod.

How we work

In a synod, delegates attend the national conventions. They represent the congregations and they alone can vote. What is decided by these delegates becomes binding on the local congregation. A synod is a corporation under the laws of the state in which it resides.

In the AFLC, there are no delegates to the national conference. Any individual who is a member of an AFLC congregation may attend and vote. In fact, others who are regular supporters of the AFLC may also vote at the conferences. Under this system, it is possible for all the members of our congregations to attend and vote.

The church body does not hold property itself. The property is held by four corporations. These are 1) the Coordinating Committee which keeps track of the clergy roster and other matters of business; 2) the

Schools Corporation which administers the Bible school and seminary; 3) the Missions Corporations which administers both home and world mission outreach; and 4) the ARC Corporation which operates the Association Retreat Center in Osceola, Wisconsin. An AFLC Foundation is being established and its members are representatives from each of the four corporations.

The officers of the AFLC and the annual conference have really no power at all over the congregations and the various corporations and boards. This decentralized form of government keeps people from gaining power in the organization. Also, it should keep the members dependent upon the Spirit of God for direction. Rather than people turning to other powerful people, they turn to the Holy Sprit for their direction.

The four corporations operate separately from each other. No one corporation has power over the others. The annual conference can decide something but can only recommend such to the corporation. The annual conference can only do the same for the congregations. If the conference does so, it is acting like it should. It is acting like an association and not like a synod!

Usually, however, a corporation will take the suggestions of the annual conference. An association of free congregations is just that; an association. It is loosely knit together. What unites it is the Holy Spirit of God as it works through the preached Word and the sacraments.

The annual conference cannot manage all the details the corporations handle through their boards. Such detail is left to the boards! Sverdrup states, "The church body, is not a new authority above the congregation but a voluntary union of congregations for mutual help. ... A power strong enough to benefit the congregation can also harm it. If the church body is to be a blessing, God's Word and Spirit must guide and rule."

Congregations belong to the AFLC in order to accomplish goals which they may not be able to accomplish on their own —

training pastors, missions, the Bible school, Christian education, the Women's Missionary Federation and youth work. These things are the major reasons why congregations belong. In reality, we are all independent congregations, owning our own property, and are to be directed by the Word and Spirit of God.

The motto verse for the AFLC is found in I Corinthians 3:17, "Where the Spirit of the Lord is, there is freedom." As long as the congregations, the annual conference and the corporations rely on the Holy Spirit's leading, a free church operates at its best. If it does not, then a free church will operate at less than best.

What we believe

When Lutheran congregations form a church body, "it is the Lutheran confession that binds them together." Georg Sverdrup further wrote one hundred years ago, "Lutheran churches add to this their agreement that in its testimony to the gospel the Lutheran church on earth always has to struggle against errors.

"When the Norwegian Synod goes beyond this and requires agreement also to thesis which go farther than the simple statements of the confession, and stray away from them, this is a serious error.

"They have no right to force upon the congregations, as a part of their confession, doctrines that a few pastors have agreed upon at annual meetings or pastoral conferences.

"What binds the congregations together is the old truth, well tested in the experience and spiritual possession of every Christian through his nurture in the faith.

"To bind anything else upon the congregations is to subject them to slavery and hypocrisy even though one paints on the links of the chain the assertion, 'This is pure doctrine.'

"The whole procedure is a total misunderstanding of the significance of the confession and of the nature of the congregation and the church body.

"Therefore, a Lutheran church body has no right to exclude any congregation which conscientiously maintains this confession even though the congregation be unwilling to acknowledge the authority of interpretations and teachings regarded as scriptural by an individual or a majority of the church body.

"... (The church body) must offer full freedom to every Christian to interpret the Word of God according to the measure of his faith and the gift of the Spirit.

"One man's view on a point of doctrine or that of a chance majority becomes a straight jacket when the church body makes it binding to all.

"There must be open access to exchange of views."

What we need in the AFLC is to accept people's interpretations of Scripture and agree to disagree; otherwise, we do mischief to the AFLC and to local congregations.

What we need to do

Evangelism is important. Not everyone is a believer in our congregations. Therefore, the Word of God, both law and gospel, must be preached! Our "Fundamental Principles" state, "Members of organized congregations are not, in every instance believers, and such members often derive false hope from their external connection with the congregation. It is therefore a sacred obligation of the congregation to purify itself by the quickening preaching of the Word of God, and by earnest admonition and exhortation, and by expelling the openly sinful and perverse."

I was always taught that when one is baptized, one is converted. Others seem to say something different. To me they use different terms which mean what I am saying. Unless my head is in the sand, I see no real basic doctrinal difference. I have always maintained that even those who are baptized must come to Jesus in conscious faith.

There may always be a struggle to keep the right emphasis. We wrestle not with flesh and blood but with the powers of darkness. Our weapons are the Word of God, the sacraments and prayer. May our church go forward to reach the unsaved, baptized or not. We must be evangelistic, working to win souls for Christ, baptized or not. We are called to do this! This we must do!

od continues His gracious work of rebuilding and restoring His Church in Latvia and Estonia. My wife and I again had the privilege of ministering in those countries this last January for three weeks. As we think back to our first trip to these countries in early 1993, we see much spiritual and numerical growth.

Our first stop this winter was at the Lutheran Deaconal Institute in Jurmala, near Riga, Latvia. We rejoiced with Guntis and Rebecca Dislers, the directors of this school, in the development since the fall of 1993 when the school opened with about 35 students in a large home. Today, the institute is housed in a large brick building given to them by the city with the condition that they would restore it. Without much money, but with trust that God will provide, the project continues. Payment for the laborers has been largely used clothing sent from America.

Now there are about 150 students enrolled. What a joy to look into the faces of eager, happy students, hungry to study God's Word! Recently, another large building was given to the institute and will be used as a library.

It was a great encouragement to be a part of a three-day seminar for lay-evangelists held at the headquarters of the Latvian Lutheran Church in downtown Riga. Janis Vanags, the young archbishop of the church, opened the seminar with a devotional message based on Revelation 3:20. He said the sessions would be filled with teachings on Bible truth. In order for the truths of the Bible to benefit, however, he said that each one must let Jesus come into their

hearts and lives if they had not previously done so. Most of the students have become believers in recent years and represent many walks of life - students, farmers, nurses, doctors, a university psychology professor and a retired sea captain, etc. Many of them had never had an opportunity to study the Bible in a classroom setting before. These seminars have been conducted monthly from January through May for the last two years. As I taught during the many hours of this weekend, I thought of the tremendous potential for spreading the gospel that these students represent.

After those days in Latvia, we boarded a train for Estonia where we spent the remainder of our time teaching at the theological academy in Tartu, an old university city. This school opened in February 1993 with 30 students. We were privileged to be along for those first classes. Now 90 students are enrolled and the program has expanded.

There is a need for a permanent facility for this school. They have continued to rent space in various buildings on the university campus. It was good to see Pastor Eenok Haamer, the rector of the academy, once again and to talk and pray with him.

We talked to many people in Latvia and Estonia who are quite sure there will be a change in the government of their neighbor, Russia, in the very near future. That is why they believe it is so important to train leaders who can continue in the rebuilding of the Church even when perhaps Christians from other countries will not be able to help them as they are now doing. There is a real sense of urgency in light of the possible political changes. Let us pray that God will continue to rebuild His Church in these lands according to His encouraging promise:

Home at last

reice (Grace) wanted to be adopted into a Christian home ever since she found Jesus at the Miriam Infant Home four years ago. She was six years old at that time.

Greice does not remember her biological father. Her mother was an alcoholic who was totally unaware of the fact that little Greice was being sexually abused and beaten during the night by street people. Her family slept on park benches and lived under overpasses. But the Lord who loves the little children heard her cry of despair. As she and her mother were passing through Campo Mourão, her mother

passed out after heavy drinking and Greice was brought by the police to the Miriam Infant Home.

When news came to Greice later that her mother had passed away, she quietly wept. She had been abandoned - now she was an orphan.

The local social workers found a good home for her in Campo Mourão: she would have her own bedroom, many dolls, good food, nice clothes, a good school, and she would be treated well. She had 30 days to live with the couple after which they could decide if the adoption would be made.

The first week passed and the social worker visited the home





and found Greice crying. She had everything she had ever wanted but lacked the most important ingredient that makes a house a home. They never went to church, never thanked Jesus for their

food and never had bedtime Bible stories and prayer with her. The social worker told Greice that after another week or two she would get used to that lifestyle and all would be okay. But she could not get used to a home without Jesus. After 30 days she happily returned to the Miriam Infant Home, but she never gave up hope that Jesus had a Christian home for her somewhere in this world.

In the meantime, there happened (with the Lord, things just don't happen) to be a home in California that had a son 13 years old who wanted a sister. But Mom could not have more children. They went to church, loved the Lord and prayed to Him about their situation. God already had a little tenyear-old girl in Campe Mourão, Brazil who had been praying about a Christian home for months.

There "happens" to be an international review pamphlet about adoptable children with photos and thumbnail sketches of these children's lives. How our Greice got into this pamphlet, I do not know, but it can only be the Lord's working.

You know what followed. This family in California saw Greice's

picture and immediately knew that the Lord had picked this girl for them. They went through the paper work and arrived in Campo Mourão on Thanksgiving Day, 1995; just in time to have Thanksgiving dinner with us on the Bible school campus.

Thirty days later the juvenile judge returned from Christmas vacation to finish the paper work. There was no doubt in anyone's mind that Greice would go to the home she had been praying about for such a long time.

On December 31, 1995, that little family of four left Brazil and arrived home in California on the first day of the new year. Greice was home at last!

It is because of your prayers and support for our AFLC missions that the Lord works in these marvelous ways. The Lord is still on the throne. He still performs miracles. He never changes.

And we know that in all things God works for the good of those who love him, who have been called according to his purpose.

WMF proposed constitutional changes

During last year's Women's Missionary Federation (WMF) convention at the ARC, several WMF constitutional changes were proposed by the National WMF Board. These were adjusted and then accepted by the convention and now are to be voted on at the 1996 Convention in Warm Beach, Washington. Following is a clarification of these changes and how they would affect WMF.

If these changes were to take place, would we still support the same projects?

We will support the same work of the AFLC with one exception: Capital Investment well no longer be included. That fund is being phased out by the AFLC as well.

What then is different?

The 10 projects we now support would be re-grouped under four "missions" — World Missions, Home Missions, Christian Education and the General Fund.

World Missions would include what has been known as My Missionary for a Day, Junior Missions, and support for short-term (continued on next page)

assistants and national workers.

Home Missions would include what is now Home Missions and Church Extension.

Christian Education would include Cradle Roll, Parish Education, Mission Scholarship and AFLC Schools.

General Fund would continue to cover administrative costs of printing and mailing the newsletter and WMF literature, supplies, postage, telephone, travel expenses for board members, and salaries of the National WMF treasurer and the executive secretary.

Would there be a special area of support each month as there is now?

Yes. Each WMF Mission would be supported for three months. Each month a particular aspect of that mission would be emphasized.

Why is General Fund one of the four missions?

This is the fund that covers administrative costs. The National Board proposed an increase in the percentage of the budget because the job of executive secretary has grown to a full-time position. As the number of WMFs has increased, so has the number and size of mailings and correspondence and other tasks.

Why make these alterations to the WMF Constitution?

First, the work of WMF is listed now in 10 projects. What WMF supports can be described by simply re-grouping the projects — under four missions. The purpose for WMF, as stated in the constitution will not change.

Secondly, it is sometimes confusing as to where moneys go. For example, as it is now, money given to Cradle Roll actually goes to Parish Education.

Thirdly, more personal involvement would be encouraged. WMF has been very involved in World Missions through offerings, sending cards and packing boxes. There are ways WMF could be involved in other mission areas, too, such as adopting a Home Mission church.

Why now?

The WMF Constitution is published in the WMF Handbook. This book is particularly helpful for incoming WMFs and newly elected officers. Our supply, printed five years ago, is depleted and a new book must be reprinted. Costs are significantly lower when a large number are printed at one time. If any alterations are to be made, this is a time when it makes "cents."

What about Honorary Membership/In Memoriam Project?

Memorials will always be encouraged. The money given goes to World Missions unless otherwise designated. Each WMF will continue to remember deceased members.

What about the Honorary Membership pin?

A lengthy discussion focused on this at the last convention. The possibility of selling pins to individual members was proposed because of recent requests. Some objected to this. The possibility of having two pins, one to honor members and another for regular members, was discussed. In the past, pins have been presented in a special way to honor long-time members and this was the original intent. There are several WMFs that have asked to buy pins for their members. The pin then symbolizes that they are members of WMF and that, too, honors our organization. How best to use the pins may still be decided upon by each WMF.

The Leader's Handbook says this about the pin: "Might the wearing of this pin be a reminder of our need to deny self and our desire to be a real witness for our loving Lord and Savior."

Protestant ethic changes Brazil's self-image — Brazilians are adopting a new self-image — changing from seeing themselves as lazy, pessimistic people to optimistic hard workers — and the spread of Protestant Christianity is largely responsible for the change, according to a national survey.

The research organization Vox Populi interviewed 2,000 people throughout Brazil to explore how Brazilians see themselves and their country. Findings were published in the magazine *Veja*.

Previous surveys found that most Brazilians were ashamed of their country and found that laziness was a widely accepted behavior. Researcher Ricardo Brinmaum said the change is due to Protestants and "self-help gurus," some of whom are very popular in Brazil.

"They (the Protestants and self-help gurus) talk about how work enriches people. Beyond this, they affirm that to be rich is good. It is not surprising that Protestant churches are full of faithful, while the Catholic priests who praise poverty have lost followers," noted Brinmaum.

The Veja magazine article said, "A key component in the new Brazilian spirit is the growth of Protestant churches. In these churches people receive sermons about organization, savings and the importance of personal efforts to improve life."

The study found that 58 percent of those surveyed believe Brazil is changing from a lazy country to a serious, hard-working nation, while 31 percent had not noticed a difference.

Reginaldo Prandi, a sociologist at the University of São Paulo, told Ecumenical News International that one of the reasons for the high number of people joining Protestant churches was the "clean image" of the churches. Protestant Christians were seen, he said, as "special people, well dressed. They have an image of being polite and well disciplined which helps them, and that also applies when they are looking for work."

Christian groups urge President Clinton to confront worldwide religious persecution — A coalition of Christian groups is urging President Clinton to take action against growing persecution of Christians throughout the world.

"Evangelical Protestants and Catholics have become special targets of reigns of terror initiated by authorities who feel threatened by Christian faith and worship," said a statement released by the National Association of Evangelicals (NAE), which represents 47 denominations and 10 million U.S. Christians.

The NAE statement listed many countries — such as China, Cuba, Laos and North Korea — where persecution of "powerless Christian scapegoats often serves to vent, foment and popularize hatred of the West and the United States."

Islamic nations are also

involved in persecuting Christians, said the statement. In nations such as Iran, Saudi Arabia and Sudan, "the demonization of Christians also serves to intimidate Muslims seeking freedom from repressive regimes," NAE reported.

For example, three leaders of Iran's 80,000-member Christian community were killed last year.

Worldwide incidents of persecution in recent years have included torture, execution, mob violence, and church burning.

The report acknowledged that the U.S. cannot "end all evil" throughout the world, but added, "it can nonetheless adopt policies that would limit religious persecution."

Rock Falls, WI — An Amish man from Wisconsin rejected an insurance company's \$212,000 settlement offer for a traffic accident that killed his wife, expressing concern that such wealth would tempt his family to abandon their values. "It is more harm than good," said Mahlon Lambright, a carpenter. His wife Mary, 38, was killed last year when a semitrailer struck their horse-drawn buggy.

EDITORIALS

Who is teaching whom?

A classroom functions best if it is established early on who is the teacher and who is the student. As we consider how the church conducts its affairs we need to be sure we are clear on who is to be teaching whom. Too often it appears God's people are learning methods and tactics from the world of politics. That is not to be our source for instruction on how to handle the business of the church. We learn from the Word of God and then go forth and teach how it can and should be done.

The world of politics teaches people to campaign for positions, enlist supporters and put out lists of who to vote for. It is a sad day when God's people copy that kind of behavior.

The One we are to learn from washed His disciples' feet and told us to do likewise (John 13:14). He calls us to humble ourselves and willingly take the lowest place (Luke 14:10,11). He said whoever wants to become great must first be a servant and a slave of all (Mark 10:43,44).

The world of politics says to seek positions. Jesus says to seek Him and His kingdom (Matthew 6:33). The title of child of God which is ours by grace through faith in Jesus Christ is the only title that really matters. What can any organization offer that can compare to that?

In politics lessons are learned in how to strategize, plan and prepare in order to be sure things go your way. God's people are not to operate like that. We are not to have strategy sessions but prayer meetings. We do not try to figure out how to get things to go our way. We pray for God to reveal His way and will to us. We trust that if we are seeking the Lord, His plan will prevail and His plan will be for the best.

We do not fear, for the work is God's work. Our trust is not in our plans or preparation but in God. So often things do not go according to our plans, and for that reason we rejoice. Our plans are faulty, developed with our limited wisdom. We do not desire our way, but God's way.

Frequently politicians attack their opponent in an effort to win the campaign. That example is not one the children of God are to follow. The Bible says, "Do not let any unwholesome talk come out of your mouths, but only what is helpful for building others up according to their needs, that it may benefit those who listen" (Ephesians 4:29, NIV).

It is sad that in a political year the words in the air and on pages are so often ones that do nothing more than attack and tear someone down. It is even more pitiful when similar type of behavior is engaged in by people who claim to follow the One who said, "As I have loved you, so you must love one another" (John 13:34).

As we seek to learn how we are to go about doing the work of the church, we do not look to the political campaigns or the legislative chambers and ask, "how do they do it?" We instead are to set an example for them.

We rejoice that a perfect example is found in our Lord Jesus Christ and forgiveness, strength and guidance is promised as well.

What we talk about

A chorus I remember from my days as a child in Sunday school said, "Most people talk about the weather whenever they can get together." It didn't make a whole lot of sense to me at the time because my friends and I didn't talk much about the weather. We talked about sports.

What do we talk about when we get together, particularly when we are with other members of the family of God? Unfortunately, often the topic of conversation may not be what it should be.

The misdeeds and misfortunes of others can be a prime item of discussion. The spiritual covering of "something to pray about" may be given, but the core may still be simple, and sinful, gossip. Let us not become the kind of people described in I Timothy 5:13 who become "gossips and busybodies, saying things they ought not to."

Instead of talking about what everyone else has done wrong, James 5:16 calls on us to "confess your sins to each other." That is not a topic of conversa-

tion we quickly and easily engage in, but it is one that leads to healing more than hurting.

The main part of that Sunday school chorus did make sense. It said, "Let's talk more about Jesus."


When Paul and Barnabas returned to Antioch after their missionary travels they could have spent much time talking about all the problems they encountered and the persecutions they faced. They could have gone on for days recounting how tough the struggle was and how wicked so many of the people were. Instead of all that, Acts 14:27 tells us that "On arriving there, they gathered the church together and reported all that God had done through them and how he had opened the door of faith to the Gentiles." What a great topic of conversation!

God is still at work, doing great things. We have much to talk about. Let us spend our time together focusing on what God has done, is doing and will do. That will be time well spent and a topic that will never be exhausted.
