

AN ENCOURAGING WORD

Jesus our Good Shepherd

I am the good shepherd; and I know My own, and My own know Me, even as the Father knows Me and I know the Father; and I lay down My life for the sheep.

- John 10:14,15

uring the Lenten Season our focus turns to Jesus' sacrifice for sin. His death was foreshadowed in the Old Testament by the sacrifice of animals on the altar. In the above verses, however, Jesus speaks of Himself, not as a sacrificial lamb but as a Shepherd — a Good Shepherd. As a Good Shepherd, He gave His life on behalf of the sheep!

I recall in driver's training being told to never place one's own life or the life of another in jeopardy for the sake of avoiding an animal that may cross the road in front of the car. Human life was to be viewed as possessing more worth than animal life. I would assume that most of the shepherds of Palestine in Jesus' day would have followed the same principle — but not the Good Shepherd! He laid down His life for the sheep that is for us! Our lives were so precious to Him that He was willing to give His own.

If there was a Palestinian shepherd who died defending his sheep we may be sure that it was accidental. Jesus' death was planned! If a shepherd would have lost his life on behalf of his sheep it would have been disastrous for the sheep. Jesus' death resulted in life for His sheep. Recognizing that we were under God's just sentence for sin, Jesus took our place and bore the full blunt of the fierce wrath of God that we might be saved and have life.

But Jesus' dealings with His sheep do not end there. In John 10:14-15, He speaks of an intimate relationship between "His own" and Himself as the Good Shepherd. He did not die for us so that we could receive eternal life and go on our merry way. He died for us so that we could enjoy the daily blessings of eternal life which include precious communion and fellowship with Him. This has important implications for our observance of the Lenten Season.

Lent ought to be a time each year when our focus on Jesus' death for us (the gospel) enlarges our understanding of the price paid for our salvation, our appreciation for and faith in the saving grace of Christ, and our knowledge of Him — "My own know Me." In Ephesians 3:19 Paul prays that the church might "know the love of Christ that surpasses knowledge, that (they) may be filled up to all the fullness of God." As we "feast" more intently on the good news of Jesus' salvation during Lent our experience will become one of growth in our understanding of the Good Shepherd's great love for us and our fellowship with Him will grow stronger and deeper.

May this Lenten Season find us focusing on our Good Shepherd and pressing on to know Him better so that we can confess along with the hymn writer:

The King of Love my Shepherd is, Whose goodness faileth never; I nothing lack if I am His And He is mine forever.

Can you imagine that?

Therefore remember that you ... were without Christ, being aliens from the commonwealth of Israel and strangers from the covenants of promise having no hope and without God in the world. But now in Christ Jesus you who once were far off have been made near by the blood of Christ.

— Ephesians 2:11,13

Without Christ! Can you imagine that? For those raised outside of Christ, it is a reality needing no imagination. In the margin of my Bible, next to these verses, I've written, "What a gift!"

It is a gentle reminder of my life at 32 B.C. (Before the Cross), when Jesus Christ was nothing more than a passing thought and an item of profanity. It all changed one July night in 1986. While being under an overwhelming cloud of hopelessness with the events going on in my life, God offered me His promise of forgiveness and redemption.

I accepted. I was an alien no more.

I've never been to Israel, but I've been to Calvary.

Sometime after my conversion, it was God's will that I come to fully appreciate the One whose name I had taken in vain. Through His Word and prayer, He led me to realize the events of Calvary from the foot of the cross: the beating, the painful procession and the sickening sound of metal being pounded into wood as the nails were driven through His feet and hands; the jolt of pain as they raised the cross; the shortness of breath as tired muscles could work no more; and the loss of His blood, yes, the precious

blood that brought me, who once was far off, to be made near once again. It was His blood shed unto death that would pay for my sins.

His pain was my gain.

As horrifying as the scene of Calvary might be, God had another reason to visit the cross: the mystery revealed (Mark 4:11,12). The pain, the suffering, the shed blood and death, they were more than legal fulfillment of sacrifice. They were proof of God's gracious love. In the witness of His suffering on the cross, I could see my worth to God. I could see and measure His love for me. For what other reason would the Divine die for the sinner? If God, who is God of purpose, had allowed Christ to suffer as He did, then would He not also offer His "covenants of promise" to me? The answer is yes, He does, because He is faithful. "If we confess our sins, He is faithful and just to forgive us our sins and to cleanse us from all unrighteousness" (I John 1:9).

Because of His past work on the cross, I can (and you can too) live today with hope that comes through peace with God (Romans 5:1,2). The Apostle Paul wrote correctly when he said, "I have been crucified with Christ, it is no longer I who live, but Christ lives in me; and the life which I now live in the flesh, I live by faith in the Son of God, who loved me and gave Himself for me" (Galatians 2:20).

He gave Himself for me. Can you imagine that!

Living with the cross

Christ crucified ... the power of God and the wisdom of God. — I Corinthians 1:23-24

The guest speaker at special meetings I attended recently told us that he has put the members of his own congregation on notice. He believes that they should all be ready at any moment to share what Jesus has done for them. He is helping them keep a great tradition which has been a part of our history for many generations.

Remembering what God has done in our lives is important. The Psalmist David knew how to use the memories of God's mercy and lovingkindness to find strength for living. Without discounting the importance of remembering the past, I wonder what the effect of the cross is on life today? Is my personal testimony only a remembrance of how I was saved, or does it also witness to what God is continuing to do for and to me today? What is the effect of the cross in my life now?


The Cross: God's dynamite

The Holy Spirit, speaking through His servant Paul, says this about the cross: "For indeed Jews ask for signs, and Greeks search for wisdom; but we preach Christ crucified, to Jews and Greeks, Christ the power of God and the wisdom of God" (I Corinthians 1:22-24, NASB). The cross is God's "dynamite." It is the very force of life. It is the believer's motivation.

The cross is also our access into the very mind and will of God. It was the cross that God used to carry out His perfect will for lost and broken humanity. It is through the crucified Jesus that God calls us to Himself. So the cross then also becomes for us the passage into the mind and will of God.

The Cross: A Place of Surrender

A contemporary psychologist has suggested that those things we place into the





context of "the holy" take on a new priority in our lives. Each of us has those "things" we wish we could deal with but somehow find more convenient to put off for another day. Each of us has pain: the pain of sin, sickness and betrayal. Each of us has disappointments, things we wish were different. Each of us has fears, fears of losing or being rejected by that to which we so dearly cling. Each of us has areas in our lives that we have not surrendered to the "Holy."

As we make the cross a practical life application, it is our place of surrender. Like the burning bush to Moses, it is our holy ground. It is our place to bow, humbly releasing our hurt and pain and disappointments and fear. It is ultimately the place where we must daily give up the fight that wages against God for control. It is the place where we receive daily healing and joy and fulfillment and power.

The Cross: God's Message

Through the cross we see our need for the Savior. It is His death on the cross that paid the price for our redemption. His death is our punishment. His shed blood calls us to faith, repentance and to new life. Now the cross becomes our strength for life as we begin to glimpse and take hold of what it is God has for us to be and to do. The cross is not only something in the past. It is the symbol of Jesus today for "in Him we live and move and exist" (Acts 17:28a, NASB).

The cross is our message, actually God's message lived and spoken through us, to a dead and dying world. As we have received so we are commanded to give. As we have been forgiven so we are commanded to preach and witness to forgiveness. As we have been given victory and new life so we are commanded to point others to the power of God and the wisdom of God, the cross, Christ crucified.

he power of the cross is a continuous power from God. To those who are perishing it is foolishness. To each Christian, to each one who is being saved, it is the power of God. God is working in our life now, but He will continue to work in our life in the future. What an assured hope that is to the believer!

Read I Corinthians 1:18-25. We learn that the cross has been given to us so that we may acquire God's wisdom by accepting the power of the cross into our lives. When God looks at those who reject the cross and Christ and seek after the wisdom of the world, it is foolishness to Him (v. 20). The Christian can continue to live in the power of the cross while the world offers empty recycling programs that do not offer true peace.

As the world raises their questions, we continue on in the power of the cross. We preach Christ crucified. This does not make sense to those in spiritual darkness, however, to the saved people of all ethnic groups, it is the power of God.

We can rely on God. The foolishness of God is wiser than that of men. His weakness is stronger than all of man's strength. The cross brings all men to an equal plane. In the January 15, 1996, Our Daily Bread, a story was told about General Robert E. Lee, a believer. After a communion service he was asked how he could kneel by a black man and take communion. He answered, "My friend, all ground is level at the foot of the cross." When we are at the foot of the cross the

only way to look is up to Jesus.

God does personally call us (v. 26). Each of us is special to Him. Our fulfillment comes in the Lord. This call to each one of us is not received by birth. It is not a call that we receive based on our status in life. Not many of us are noble, wise or mighty. His call is to rely not on our power but on the power of the cross for today and the rest of our lives. We are confident of a future in heaven as well because of the cross and the resurrection of Christ

God uses the weakness of things to bring shame to the strong things. God works in ways that do not make sense to the world. This is a reminder to us that we are not to boast before God.

We can come to God because of what Christ has done for us on the cross. It is by God's doing that we are in Christ. Through His power we can remain in Christ. God has shown us the way by making Christ the wisdom from God. As a result, if we are to boast, we are to boast in Christ.

The question then is, "Do I want God's wisdom?" If I do, it is provided for me by placing my faith in Christ and allowing the cross to be central in my life as I deny myself, confess my sin, and follow Christ. May the cross of Christ be central in your life today and each passing day as you choose to live for Christ.


The cross

Three drops of water

t was at a time when I was serving a church near Canton, South Dakota. Being new to the area, I sought out a barber shop. As the barber was clipping away, I told him I was serving a church nearby and I was a Lutheran pastor. At this he exclaimed, "Boy, oh boy, just wait 'till you meet up with Swanson and he will take you to task about infant baptism."

Well, I did meet up with Swanson, who had been raised in the Lutheran tradition and had totally rejected the thought of any benefit in infant baptism. He really poured it on sneeringly, "Three drops of water, what good does that do?" He blatantly spoke of his great and wonderful experiences in his church, of healings and tremendous prophecies. This was at a time when those of his persuasion in Texas were frantically digging caves because of the

soon nuclear destruction that was prophesied. He raved about his blessings derived in his new faith and threw in the additional "three drops of water." Then I said very cheerfully to him, "Now I've got you." He asked, "What do you mean?" I questioned, "The blessings of which you speak, how can you say with certainty that those blessings are not the result of, or related to, the 'three drops of water"?" He was speechless.

I too had the three drops of water. I went through confirmation, but alas, nothing was confirmed in me. Actually I hated Luther because I had to memorize the catechism while my friends were playing baseball not far off. I heard the sounds, "get him at third," "throw it home" and the other exciting banter of the game.

In retrospect, I am persuaded that the Lord had His hand upon

me. I came to love Luther. The Lord watched over me until the fullness of a new birth was realized or experienced in me.

Appearing before the seminary faculty of the Augustana Lutheran Church, I related the experience of how I had been accosted by one who had the audacity to ask if I was saved. Anger welled up in my heart at the question, and I almost floored him. Through that experience, the Lord became real to me, however, and I was born again.

This was most interesting to the learned professors, and subsequently there was the loaded question: "Now Mr. Persson, you speak of being baptized and the following spiritual experience, what we would like to know: up until the time of your spiritual experience, were you saved or lost?" I responded, "I will answer your question in this way: I did not have the Holy Spirit whereby I could say that Jesus was Lord" (I Corinthians 12:3).


I do thank the Lord for baptisimal grace, for all those born again in baptism, and I also rejoice in those having a subsequent affirmation of a new birth after baptism. Three drops of water are indeed sufficient, for it is not the amount of water that does such great things.

May I raise the question: does our church yet accept the words of Wislof: "Everyone who was baptized in infancy must personally meet Christ and must then have the experience of choosing to live in covenant relationship with God who accepted him in baptism."

Baptism will be of no benefit to him who chooses life away from God and shuts His grace out.

crushed because of a lack of acceptance.

Congregations in mission

Last November, the youth group of Our Saviour's in Stanley, North Dakota received an Aid Association for Lutherans Youth Serve Grant for \$500. The money was used to purchase material and items to put together "Health Kits and Layettes" for the Brazil mission field.

It was an enjoyable experience for every one involved as each sensed the joy in helping others and serving the Lord in this way. We may not always be able to go, but we can pray and give to the work of the Lord.

If you have an AAL branch in your congregation, perhaps there is still opportunity to work on a mission project.

Emmaus Lutheran in Bloomington, Minnesota is desiring to be a part of the task of reaching the lost. The congregation has formed two Missions Task Groups, a local missions group and one on world missions.

According to Emmaus' Decem-

ber 1995, newsletter, they define missions as, "Any endeavor outside our local congregation to fulfill the Great Commission of Christ by proclaiming the gospel of Christ, making disciples, and relating to the total needs of mankind, spiritual and physical. The effort is divided between: 1) world missions — targeting cross cultural missionaries and ministries outside the metro area; 2) local missions — ministries and Christian workers within the

seven-county metro area."

Group members are encouraged to attend monthly meetings of the task group and volunteer for projects that need attention. They promote missions by sharing needs of missionaries with others and recruit new members. Above all, they make a special prayer commitment to missionaries and ministries. The groups also make recommendations to the church council on mission support.

Brazilian street children's ministry no longer active

The Brazil AFLC congregation in Vitoria is no longer directly involved in the street children's ministry. At the height of this ministry, two homes were providing care for some 22 children. The state government provided funds for the purchase of some homes and rent money for others. These homes were then turned over to other organizations, including many church organizations to administer. With a recent change in state government and the major loss of subsidy from the government for housing, rent and food, many of these homes have had to close, including one of the homes formerly run by the Brazil

AFLC congregation in the Vitoria area. The second home, which had been purchased with government funds, has now been turned over to another Christian organization which has greater experience in this type of ministry and was farther along in the legal process of registering the work and ministry with the government.

We are thankful to those who have provided periodic support for these street children's homes in Brazil. Our Miriam Infant Home at Campo Mourão continues in its ministry of providing for young needy children in that area. All future gifts received for children's home ministries in

Brazil will now be credited to this ministry.

Rev. Jim and Lorene Winters, Calgary, Alberta, were scheduled to have departed in February, for Campo Mourão, Brazil, where they will serve as short-term missionaries.

The Jonathan Abel family will return to Brazil in March to begin their second term. They will initially work out of Campo Mourão while surveying future outreach into the state of Mato Grosso Do Ful, northwest of Campo Mourão. The capital city of that state is Campo Grande.

OUR PRESIDENT WRITES

The 1995 Budget Report: lessons to be learned

any readers of *The Lutheran Ambassador* have already seen the final report of AFLC budget receipts for the last fiscal year. I invite you to look at them again, and to see if the Lord might be showing us that there are lessons to be learned.

The combined budget totals for 1995 were \$1,147,831.32. This means that 77% of our goals were reached, compared to 82% for last year. Considering each separate ministry, however, World Missions and the Church Extension Fund exceeded their goals (101% and 141% respectively), and farthest from their goals were the Bible School (56%) and Capital Investments (53%). The General Fund finished the year at 81%, Home Missions at 73%, Parish Education at 68%, and the Seminary at 66%.

Although total budget receipts for the year were about thirty thousand dollars lower than for 1994, it must be noted that two special World Missions appeal letters resulted in non-budgetary gifts of over forty thousand dollars during the final quarter of 1995. Also, World Missions received over one hundred thousand dollars in additional non-budgetary contributions designated for new missionary support. This is a good reminder to all of our ministries that the people of the AFLC do respond when they are informed of the needs.

"And my God will meet all your needs according to His glorious riches in Christ Jesus" (Philippians 4:19).

It is good for all of us to be reminded, too, that the Lord provides what we need, but not necessarily what we want. This is true for church associations, as well as for individual Christians. He calls us to learn His lessons from what He withholds and what He bestows. Stewardship is always a spiritual issue, and the AFLC must look at goals and gifts in this light if we are to walk in His will.

We thank the Lord for all His goodness to us, remembering that His greatest gifts are always the spiritual ones. Believers have grown in the grace and knowledge of Christ our Lord. Lost souls have passed from death to life, entering into the peace and joy of personal salvation. Dear friends, please remember, too, that the greatest gift that you can give to the AFLC is not to write out a check, but to pray regularly for all of our ministries, calling upon the heavenly Father to richly prosper His work among us.

Lent in the church calendar

Lent focuses on Jesus' suffering and death for us. Easter is the high point of the church year, celebrating the Resurrection. After this, we remember Pentecost, the day the Holy Spirit fell on the New Testament church. Then we begin the Trinity season, the second half of the church year, from about seven weeks after Easter to late November.

Scripture texts given for each Sunday focus on two main areas. During the first half of the church year, Advent through Pentecost, they focus on the major events in the life of Christ. During the Trinity season, the focus is on growth, applying the lessons from the life of Christ to the life of the Christian.

Personal testimony

Before going to the seminary I worked for a large printing corporation in the Mechanical Maintenance Department. The Thursday morning sessions included a time of discussion of vision for the AFLC. Rev. Lee stated, "We are called to the task of building free and living congregations. ... We exist as an AFLC to help congregations to fulfill their vision for reaching their comunities."

The time of discussion also included a presentation by Rev.

Rev. Lynn Wilson, Roslyn, South Dakota, was the featured speaker at an AFLC regional Mid-Winter Bible Conference at Calvary Lutheran in Fosston, Minnesota, during February 23-24. The conference focused on the theme, Back to Basics of Sharing Your Faith.

Rev. David Molstre, Camarillo, California, has resigned from the Coordinating Committee and his name has been removed from the AFLC Clergy Roster.

Rev. Mike Klenner, Freeman, South Dakota, has resigned as pastor of the Salem and Immanuel Parish where he has served since 1989, and has accepted the call from Hope Lutheran in Ishpeming, Michigan. He expects to begin his new ministry later in the spring.

NEWS OF INTEREST

San Francisco, CA — Two Lutheran congregations that ignored their denomination's policy and ordained practicing homosexual ministers have been expelled. The First United Lutheran Church and St. Francis Lutheran Church, both of San Francisco, were expelled from the Evangelical Lutheran Church in America, which allows ordination of homosexuals only if they vow to abstain from homosexual activity. The churches were suspended in 1990 and given until December 31, 1995 to rescind the ordinations; they refused.

Bethlehem, Israel — Palestinian authorities allowed the showing of the now famous Jesus film on Palestinian national television during the holidays, a report said. The film, which highlights the life, death and resurrection of Christ, was broadcast by the network December 22. Jesus has been translated into numerous languages and helped evangelicals to win thousands to Christ.

Cambodia, Phnom Penh — The Christian and Missionary Alliance reports that many new churches are being started in Cambodia. In a three-month period, 13 new congregations were established by the denomination. Cambodia has a long history of religious persecution. Thousands of Christians and Buddhists were killed when the Khmer Rouge sought to eradicate all religion. Since 1979, there has been less open persecution, but Christian gatherings were made illegal in 1983.

Port Moresby, Papua New Guinea — Wycliffe Bible Translators passed a milestone recently when they completed their 400th translation of the New Testament and presented it to a native group in Papua New Guinea. The Barai natives, a group of people who live in southeast Papua New Guinea near the Owen Stanley Mountain Range, were the recipients of the new translations, according to the German news service Idea.

Morris Are, a native of the Barai people, said, "If we read the Bible in English, our people do not understand the texts. However, if we read to them in their mother tongue, the message speaks to their hearts."

Wycliffe Bible translators, named for 14th century English theologian and Bible translator John Wycliffe, have translated portions of the Bible into more than 2,000 languages. Currently, more than 6,700 languages are known to be spoken throughout the world. Wycliffe estimates that another 1,000 translations are needed before the Bible will be in a language readable by every nation.

Minneapolis, MN — Evangelist Billy Graham will perform a miracle of sorts this April, when he'll preach in every country of

the world on a single day. A television program, featuring Graham, will be broadcast in 42 languages in more than 160 countries via satellite April 14.

Church leaders from throughout the world helped organize the "Global Television Series" in cooperation with the Billy Graham Evangelistic Association (BGEA).

BGEA estimates that more than 2.5 billion people will have access to the program.

Knoxville, TN — An interracial church in Knoxville, Tennessee, was destroyed by arson January 8. Authorities discovered racist graffiti spray-painted on the back door of the church, and local news reports say at least 18 homemade Molotov cocktails fueled by kerosene were used in the attack. The fire destroyed the two-story Inner City Church and caused serious damage in an adjoining structure that housed a radio station and nursery. Last year four predominantly black churches in west Tennessee were attacked by arson, but those fires were set differently and no racist graffiti was found.

Football great Reggie White, defensive end for the Green Bay Packers and associate pastor of the church, has expressed concern that police are not taking the crime seriously enough. Asked what would motivate somebody to attack a church, White said, "It's spiritual. These people are demonic - filled with demonic hatred." Church officials say they will rebuild, and Packers fans in Green Bay have started a fund to help the church recover from the attack. The church was insured. "God is not through with the Inner City Church," said Pastor Jerry Upton. "I got news for the devil. The best is yet to come. We will rebuild."

Life on the Other Side

am a pastor. I am generally the one who does the serving. Recently, however, I have been on the receiving instead of the giving end. Others have been serving me and my family as we have been mourning the death of my sister. It is a little different being on the other side.

"I'm so glad I'm a part of the family of God." I sing those words with a little more heartfelt sincerity now. The family of God has been very good to my family. They have cared for us and cried with us; prayed for us and served us; encouraged us and been a needed source of strength. They have mourned with those who are mourning (Romans 12:15). They have carried our burdens and so fulfilled the law of Christ (Galatians 6:2).

My vision of the beauty of a congregation, what it is and what it can be, and the blessing of being a part of one has deepened. It is so needed. It is so good to be a part of the family of God.

Jesus said, "It is more blessed to give than to receive" (Acts 20:35, NIV). Some times and in some ways it seems almost easier as well. Receiving is humbling. It means admitting need. It means facing the reality of our own limitations.

When going through a trial such as my family has, limitations and needs become quite apparent.

They are always present, however, whether it be a time of joy or sorrow. We are continually in need of being served by others and, most of all, by Christ.

On the night before the cross Jesus went from disciple to disciple, washing their feet. When He came to Peter He met resistance. "'No', said Peter, 'you shall never wash my feet" (John 13:8, NIV). Peter was uncomfortable with the idea of being served in such a manner by Jesus. The Lord said, "Unless I wash you, you have no part with me" (John 13:8, NIV). Peter had to humble himself and admit his need. He had to receive Jesus' service.

Jesus went to the cross to serve us. He paid the penalty for our sins. He purchased our salvation. He offers cleansing and forgiveness. It is a gift without equal. It is a gift we need but cannot earn. Receiving it is humbling, but also healing. It is an admission of limitations, and the discovery of freedom.

Jesus said He came not "to be served, but to serve, and to give his life as a ransom for many" (Mark 10:45, NIV). The Lord of the universe came to this earth because He wants to serve sinners like you and me. What an incredible and wonderful truth!

We are called to be servants, but before we can serve others we have to let the Lord serve us. Let Him amaze you by the way He wants to serve you today.

Praising the Rescuer

The television show "Rescue 911" tells stories of people getting into difficult situations, but then being brought to safety. Each segment usually concludes with the one who was in danger being reunited with the one who rescued them. Much thanks is given, but not to the equipment that was used to save them. The one who was rescued is thankful for the equipment, but they give their thanks to their rescuer, the one who used the equipment.

In Hebrews 12:2 we are called to "fix our eyes on Jesus, the author and perfecter of our faith." He is our Rescuer. He is the One who responded to our desperate need and saved us. He is the One worthy of all praise and honor.

In a similar fashion to the rescuers on television, Jesus uses "equipment" or means in bringing us to safety. The chief means is the Bible, the Word of God. Through that means God convicts us of our sin and shows us our need of forgiveness. He also declares what has been done for us by Christ, who died for our sins and rose again so that we can have life abundant and eternal.

God also uses what we call the means of grace:

baptism and communion. He works through these means to bring us into the kingdom and strengthen us in our walk with Him, showering His undeserved goodness upon us.

As we are each unique individuals, so God works in each of us in unique ways. He uses a wide range of equipment to bring the chief means, His Word, into our lives.

For some God used the equipment of a Sunday school. For others it was a neighborhood Bible study. For some it was a one-to-one sharing of the Word. For others it was a large stadium evangelistic crusade. For some it was a Bible camp. For others it was a Lenten service. For some it was a walk down the aisle at a special meeting. For others it was a private time of Bible reading and prayer.

God works in lives in a variety of ways. We must not hold up our experience as the norm nor look down on those in whom God worked in a different way.

SOMETHING TO SHARE

Communicating Christ to children

Jesus said, "Let the little children come to me, and do not hinder them, for the kingdom of God belongs to such as these."

- Mark 10:14

ne of the most beloved hymns sung in Sunday school is "Jesus Loves the Little Children." Jesus took time for the little ones. With Christ's Word working through us, we can effectively communicate the gospel and meet the challenge of relating to children.

We need to communicate the meaning of the law (to point out the dreadfulness of sin) and the gospel (to show them that Christ Jesus took our sins upon Himself at the cross) so that a child may understand.

When leading a child to Christ, I often use the phrase, "invite Jesus into your heart as your best Friend." One can also ask the child if he wants to someday go to heaven, and then explain that it is sin that keeps us from entering heaven. Children can understand that Jesus took all our wrong doings on Himself so that we do not have to be punished forever. He wants to bring us to heaven. The Bible is the source book of evangelizing anyone, including children.

The home is the first place to begin child evangelism. Parents are to teach their children constantly (Deuteronomy 6:5-7). If a

child has been baptized, we rejoice that God has begun a wonderful work of grace in that child. Even when a baptism has occurred, it is important that a child has assurance of salvation by grace through faith in Christ Jesus. Encourage your children and grandchildren. Talk freely about salvation and pray for and with them.

Sunday school and Vacation Bible School is often overlooked as a place to evangelize children. Every lesson is an opportunity to communicate Christ to children. In our congregation, the "Ambassador Club" on Wednesdays includes a flannelgraph story and the way of salvation is explained. Follow-up is so important after a child has been led to Christ.

Pastors and other church leaders have opportunities to reach children through home visits. Situations may arise where a family is unchurched, but desires their children to be baptized. What an open door to explain the way of salvation to the family. When the child is an infant, in explaining their responsibility to bring up the child in a Christcentered home, parents oftentimes become the recipients of the gospel message!

Children's sermons are another opportunity. Sin and forgiveness can be illustrated through object lessons.

Evangelizing children need not

be limited to church. When our children have friends in our home for an overnighter or a birthday celebration it is a wonderful time to spread the light of Jesus Christ. Getting involved in your children's extra-curricular activities provides another avenue to touch lives. Some people host a birthday party for Jesus around Christmas.

Children today face more dangers than ever before. Homes abound that are abusive, broken, dysfunctional and filled with broken dreams. Many grow up with a diet of ultra-violent and sexually explicit video games, MTV, etc. They need the cleansing and life-changing message of Jesus. Besides the words we speak, we need to love the children and see them as Christ sees them — precious souls.

Evangelism is the work of God through His written Word. We dare not pat ourselves on the back. We are simply God's instruments communicating His truth. May we rejoice with the angels whenever salvation comes to a little one.
