WELLSPRING OF LIFE

Bible verse has popped up on my radar a few times recently. It's from II Corinthians 9:8, "And God is able to make all grace abound to you, so that having all sufficiency in all things at all times, you may abound in every good work." Paul leaves no room for doubt here. God's provision and grace is enough for us. It's sufficient and abundant, and it's for us in all situations at all times.

Later in the chapter, Paul calls this gift "inexpressible." Other versions describe it as "unspeakable," "indescribable," or "too wonderful for words." Truly, the message of the gospel abundantly fills the deepest need of humanity, to be reconciled with God and made his heir, and that is an extravagant gift.

That reality shapes how we live now. The immediate context of II Corinthians 9 is financial giving. We are generous in our giving to others because all we have belongs to God anyway, and he's been so good to us. But it goes further than that. Our forgiveness is quick and unconditional, because God has so freely forgiven us (at great cost to his Son). Our patience is slow to end, because God is so patient with me, "slow to anger and abounding in steadfast love" (Exodus 34:6). We are at peace, even in turbulent times, because God's provision and grace extend there too. And we love deeply, as he has so loved us.

This is my prayer for the AFLC. I pray that we would drink deeply from the wellspring of life, Jesus Christ, where we find forgiveness of sins and eternal life. I pray that our lives would be marked by freedom, freedom to love and serve one another with the extravagant and sacrificial love with which we have been loved.

In these next pages, you will read updates on all of our ministries. These ministries love you, and they exist to serve you. As you read, consider ways that you and your congregation can partner with them, not because of any requirement or obligation, but simply because we are all loved by God and united in mission to bring the good news of salvation and eternal life to all who will hear. May our lives together be marked by the joy, peace, and love that come with the freedom that Christ has won for us.

Church Planting

The Lord has been at work preparing the way for a new church plant in the growing Fargo/Moorhead area. Several years ago, members of St. Paul's Free Lutheran Church, Fargo, began praying and exploring this possibility, forming an advisory team to research effective strategies. In response, St. Paul's called Pastor Brandon and Ashley Marschner to serve as planting leaders. Over the past year, Brandon's time has been dedicated to prayer and preparation. This time has deepened relationships, shaped vision, and laid a foundation for this church plant. On September 10, the Marschners hosted their first informational gathering, with encouraging interest. The coming months will focus on outreach, Bible study, and building a healthy culture. Prayer, financial support, and partnership are needed as this new gathering grows into a lasting congregation.

The Home Missions department will be taking 17 people to the Acts 29 Conference in Dallas, Texas, at the end of October. Acts 29 offers church leaders decades of experience-proven training, guidance, and tools for planting churches designed to grow and thrive. We pray that this will be a great opportunity for the planters to grow, learn, and be encouraged in their ministries.

• Renewal

AFLC Home Missions' Fall Regional Conference, with the theme "Mission Clarity: Renewing Congregations for the Mission of God," is set for Saturday, Nov. 8. This one-day conference will be hosted by Emmaus Free Lutheran Church, in Bloomington, Minn. The congregation is an active part of the mission of our God. Not only is it a sacred space where God nourishes and feeds his people, but it is also a place that is sent on his mission. God has given us the privilege of being recipients and partners in his mission. However, it's easy to disconnect the theology of mission with the everyday practice, which fosters unhealthy ministry and hinders renewal in our hearts and congregations. We pray that this conference will be an encouraging and productive time for all attending. For those who aren't able to attend, recordings of the sessions and workshops will be posted on the Home Missions website later in November.

Alaska

In September, Pastor Bob Lee, longtime KAKN station manager in Naknek, Alaska, retired. He and his wife, Margaret, have since relocated to the lower 48. For the past 15 years, Pastor Lee has faithfully served as "The Voice of Bristol Bay," while also serving in a pastoral role at Hilltop Christian Fellowship. Margaret served as a teacher in Naknek. We are deeply grateful for the many years of service and love the Lees have poured into the people of Alaska, and we pray that the Lord continues to bless and use them in this

new chapter. We are also thankful for Maggie Johnson, who is stepping into the role of KAKN station manager. We look forward with excitement to how God will use her gifts in this vital ministry. Please join us in praying for KAKN, the Alaska Mission, and the ongoing gospel impact in the lives of those they serve in Alaska.

Awakening a love for GOD'S KINGDOM





he Women's Missionary Federation (WMF) has as its goal "to awaken and deepen interest in and love for the Kingdom of God at home and abroad and to unite the women of the AFLC into deeper fellowship and service through the projects of the WMF."

One of the ways we accomplish this is through prayer and financial support of specific AFLC ministries. Each fall, members of the national WMF Board meet with the directors/deans of those ministries during the AFLC all-boards conference. Based on the needs/requests shared, we determine to promote a project for each ministry. We share the details of the projects with local WMFs across the country so they can share in praying for and giving to those projects during the following year. We also share project details and articles highlighting each of the ministries in our WMF E-News mailings that are emailed directly to women throughout our AFLC. Our 2026 projects are listed below.



- Free Lutheran Bible College: Assists in updating the furnishings in the men's dorms. In October we had a chance to meet with the student body to tell them about the WMF and its ministry and leave them with one of our Bible studies and a food treat!
- Seminary: Provides each seminarian with \$100 every semester to buy needed books for their studies and yearly subscriptions to *The Lutheran Ambassador*. There is a special giving opportunity at the seminary housing to repair the playground area.
- Parish Education and Publications: Funds will go toward reformatting and reprinting the elementary Sunday school curriculum and online bookstore redesign.

Missions

- World Missions: Gifts are to be directed to missionary support at World Mission's discretion. We also have ongoing funds available to support short-term missionary assistants. A special opportunity for giving is a project at the mission house in Osceola, Wis., to replace gutters.
 - Home Missions: Funds will go towards church planting conferences.

The WMF General Fund aids us in planning for:

- WMF Day held June 10, 2026, in Fargo, N.D., with speakers and music.
- The 2026 Bible study, titled *I Believe*, is written by Joyce Erickson.

Pre-orders are being taken for January delivery. Production of upcoming WMF Bible studies from start to finish can take up to three years. Writers are working on future studies now.

Our new officers elected at our 2025 WMF Day meeting are Jenna Lee as our new first vice president. Jenna will oversee our district WMF contacts plus the Nominating Committee. Joanne Herset is our new recording secretary, keeping us and our history correct.

Our prayer is that women from our churches would be in Bible study and developing a heart for missions. Would you pray with us over our projects and join us in meeting our financial goals for this year?

The Life EVERLASTING

he phrase "I would be dead if ..." can end a multitude of ways. This is true of remote Alaskan villages, where many people would be dead if it were not for missionary airplanes. There's more than one way to interpret this, too. I would be physically dead if it were not for the FLAPS planes and SEND North planes getting me to a hospital quickly. In the summer of 2019, I had a serious infection that led to sepsis. My organs were starting to shut down in the ER in Anchorage.

Many others in Alaska would be spiritually emaciated or even dead if no one flew to them to share and show them Jesus.

Through the countless people who have financially and prayerfully supported FLAPS, the Alaska Mission has been able to go to these villages with the truth and power of Christ. Bringing spiritual life to those who are dead. Giving encouragement to those who are spiritually emaciated. In an area where suicide is three times the national average, drug usage is high, and trauma is even higher, it doesn't take much to entertain the lies that bring destruction.

We are incredibly blessed that God has provided for us to not only get to the villages but also enter them. Through vacation Bible school, we're able to provide biblical truth through teaching and providing children with their own Bibles. Throughout the years we've gathered prayer warriors for them as they've either gotten to join the VBS team or heard the stories. I loved going back to the villages and hearing the kids say, "Remember when ...?" They always recall something positive and fun. It's as if they are saying they remember the time they saw Jesus through a VBS team.

This past summer, nine people got to do just that: Susanna Benito, Katelyn Gresli, Dylan McQuery, Chris and Kristen McGuire, Jennifer and John Shrock, and Claire and Ethan Flude. Some served for two weeks, some for a month, and some for the whole duration of the VBS season. Life was given this summer! The gospel was proclaimed and lived out with the children. Even the occasional young adult or parent participated. There was laughter, hiking, crafts, games, and more to remind the kids of the truth of Jesus' light as the winter brings coldness and darkness. I would be remiss if I did not also mention the life that was given to the VBS team members, too. They were challenged through health issues, getting out of their comfort zones, or issues with flying, but always came out better and closer to God.

Everything that has happened during the last few summer seasons would not have been possible without the body of Christ. If it weren't for the people who support FLAPS, I would be dead, and so would many of the kids I love. With every ounce of my being, thank you! You truly have made a difference.



Expanding programs



Knowing that the Word of God is transformative and foundational to life and ministry, we recognized that a subset of our student body could benefit from a deeper dive into the riches of that Word beyond our typical two-year program. Many of our students are interested in congregational involvement that would be served by a deeper study in the curriculum we offer. This is especially true in areas such as youth work, missions, and church planting, as well as preparation for seminary. Knowing that God has gifted our school with a staff and faculty capable of mining the riches of his Word and equipping students with the tools to learn, study, and apply it to ministry, we pursued the goal of adding the BA program to our offerings.

This expanded program includes higher-level course offerings and internships in partnership with other AFLC ministries. For young men sensing a call to pastoral ministry, the program provides a framework that prepares them for success in our seminary. Students gain a robust understanding of the Word, bolstered by classes in biblical Greek, logic, philosophy, and church history. It's clear that this program is preparing young servants to positively impact service within our congregations.

Programs like this take time, planning, and support. We are so grateful for the congregations and individuals who support FLBCS! Without your prayers and financial generosity, this program would not be possible.

A busy campus, full of life

e're off to a great start at the Free Lutheran Seminary! We have 22 seminarians in the program—24 if we count a couple of special cases—and our campus is full of life with 22 children running around, most of them under the age of 10. This year we welcomed six new seminarians, while others are off on internship, putting their training into

Our program is built around 90 credits of study, normally spread over three years, followed by a year-long internship. It's designed to prepare men for pastoral ministry, grounding them deeply in God's Word. Like our Bible College, we place a strong emphasis on both Old and New Testament studies, helping students grow into faithful ministers of the Word.

One exciting change to our program is the addition of a master's thesis requirement. Instead of just completing an internship project, students now research and present a substantial topic when they return from internship—an important step in sharpening their ability to serve and teach.

Life at the seminary is about more than academics. Our instructors commit to praying for and caring for each student, and the fellowship among the men is a blessing. They pray together, encourage one another, and share in the joys and challenges of everyday life.

When graduation comes, our seminarians step into congregations or mission fields debt-free, confident in God's calling, and equipped to serve His people. It's an exciting, busy, and joyful time here at the seminary—and we're grateful for what God is doing here.

The Impact of Your Partnership

Every year, generous friends of FLBCS make this mission possible by bridging the gap between the actual cost of education and what students pay.

This year's student body includes 112 undergraduate and 24 seminary students. For every dollar billed to students, donors give another 50 cents through the annual fund. These gifts reduce the cost of educating, mentoring, housing, and feeding each student by almost 40 percent. The annual fund covers all ministry expenses not paid through tuition, room, board, and fees. Last year, we celebrated a milestone when the fund reached 109 percent of its \$1.3M goal.

Our next step?

This year's goal is \$1.5M, running from August 2025 through July 2026, to sustain and grow the ministry of FLBCS.



Making the best USE OF OUR TIME



"Walk in wisdom toward outsiders, making the best use of the time. Let your speech always be gracious, seasoned with salt, so that you may know how you ought to answer each person" (Colossians 4:5–6).

aul's closing exhortation in Colossians is as urgent today as it was in the first century. Here Paul directs believers outward, toward those who do not yet know Christ. He calls for a way of life that reflects God's wisdom and a way of speaking that reflects God's grace. Central to this charge is his use of the Greek word *kairos* for "time." Unlike the more common word *chronos*, *kairos* points to God-given opportunities—moments full of potential for the gospel. Paul urges us to make the best use of such occasions, recognizing that they are empowered by God's Holy Spirit and are rare opportunities to join him in his work.

We live in a cultural moment where biblical truth has been questioned, dismissed, and even ridiculed. Yet beneath the skepticism we are seeing that there is also a deep hunger for what is real. Many in our country are weary of half-truths, polarization, and shallow answers. Increasingly, there is an openness to honest conversations about Jesus and Christianity, provided those conversations are marked by authenticity, humility, and compassion. This is precisely what Paul describes—speech that is gracious and seasoned with salt, engaging others in a way that awakens a thirst for Christ.


This is why the ministry of AFLC Evangelism and Discipleship exists. Our mission is to encourage, equip, and assist our AFLC congregations in making and equipping disciples who then make and equip more disciples. In a time of both challenge and opportunity, we want to help churches and individuals walk wisely, speak graciously, and make the most of the moment God has given us. We do that three ways.

- In-Person Ministries: Events like Rekindle the Fire and Disciple Equipping Workshops encourage and equip believers for faithful witness and practical disciplemaking. We also are available to present evangelistic meetings as well as assist congregations in preparing for and carrying out effective special meetings.



ntroducing our newest publication, a devotional booklet for teens, was a highlight of the Free Lutheran Youth (FLY) Convention for us this past summer. *Alive in Christ: 31 Days in the Word* was put together through the efforts of AFLC Parish Education, AFLC Youth Ministries, and 31 men and women writers from across the AFLC. Thanks to a generous donor, more than 800 youth and youth leaders who attended FLY were gifted a copy of the new devotional. Perfect for personal study of God's Word or in a small group or youth group setting, *Alive in Christ* is a tool to help the Word of Christ dwell richly in teens. "So faith comes from hearing, and hearing through the word of Christ" (Romans 10:17).

Ben Mobley, 15, a member of Solid Rock Free Lutheran, Anoka, Minn., shares what he likes about the new devotional: "I have found the devotional to be great because all the writers are different people from the AFLC. Personally knowing some of the writers is cool, and I love hearing them share the gospel in their own way." Emma McKenzie, Hope Lutheran, Minneapolis, is also enjoying the new devotional and explains, "I like that it encourages me to spend more time in the Word."

Here are some practical ways to use or share *Alive in Christ*:

- Read it for personal or family devotions.
- Discuss it in a small group, youth group, or discipleship group.
- Give the booklet to friends and family.
- Mail the devotional to students away at college to encourage them in Christ.
- Provide copies for members of a sports team, drama club, or music group you have connections with in a high school or college in your community. Show hospitality by inviting them into your home and sharing a brief devotional time.

Additional copies of *Alive in Christ* can be purchased from Ambassador Publications for \$5 each.

Your generous gifts also enabled us to publish Volume VI in the AFLC Heritage Series, *From Freedom to Life: A History of the Association of Free Lutheran Congregations*, in 2024. An exciting extension of this project is the production of an audiobook read by the author, Rev. Robert L. Lee. We are about halfway through the recording sessions and hope to release the audiobook later in 2026. Watch for more details on our website and social media.

Inspired, equipped, and excited TO SHARE CHRIST

"Instead, you must worship Christ as Lord of your life. And if someone asks about your hope as a believer, always be ready to explain it" (I Peter 3:15).

witzerland is a land of breathtaking mountains, beautiful lakes, and centuries of rich history. It is also a place where a small, family-centered church is laying the groundwork for a new generation of faith. At the El-Shadai Evangelical Lutheran Church in Geneva, the congregation may be small, but that doesn't stop their devotion or faithfulness.

It has been nearly 10 years since the AFLC church in Switzerland began. Augusto Fiuri, lay pastor of El-Shadai, grew up in an AFLC—Brazil congregation. Motivated by the need to better support his family, Augusto moved to Geneva, found a job, and soon moved his family there too. Augusto found a Portuguese-speaking church, and through many circumstances he was asked to lead and pastor the congregation. Even though he explained he was a "Free Lutheran," the congregation still wanted him to lead them because they "saw his life and family, and they wanted to be what he was," he said.

Augusto began to serve the congregation while still working full time. In 2016, the Annual Conference approved a cooperative church planting effort with AFLC–Brazil. (To read more about how Switzerland began, go to the AFLC World Missions website under fields of work.)

This last summer, Kyle Gorman and Isaiah Floan were sent to Geneva to serve as Missionary Assistants at the church. Through their observations, the church is like a big family, and the primary ministry focus is inward. All the members of the congregation attend every event, from Sunday sermons to community dinners and Bible studies.

"Attending church events is a normal part of life, and everyone always shows up, and I love that," said Kyle. Because of this, the congregation builds a deep, family-like community.

During Kyle and Isaiah's time there, Augusto asked them to primarily focus on encouraging the youth and young adults there to take more responsibility. While the youth participate in all the events and activities, Augusto is sensing a lack of fire in them. Augusto is praying that the young people of his church, and of Europe, would find their identity in Christ and nothing else. Additionally, he desires to see the youth there develop a passion for evangelism. That is a real spiritual need: a heart to evangelize.

In a secularized Europe, the biggest struggle is not competing faiths but indifference to the need for a Savior. In Geneva, Pastor Augusto prays that his congregation, specifically the younger generation, will be inspired, equipped, and excited to share the gospel with their community and to the spiritually hungry land of Switzerland. Augusto remains thankful for the ministry's growth under his care and continues to look and pray for the Lord to raise up a new full-time pastor to help lead the church in Geneva.

Continue to pray for the church in Geneva, that the members would be bold in their faith and that God would open the hearts of those in their community.

Special projects to encourage MINISTRY EFFORTS IN UGANDA

aul told the Corinthians, "I will not be a burden to you, because what I want is not your possessions but you ... I will very gladly spend for you everything I have and expend myself as well" (II Corinthians 12:14–15). This pledge comes at the tail end of two letters that report the intense relational challenges that have occurred between the missionary and the foreigners among whom he had lived. Most recently, they had been rejecting him, preferring to be led by "super-apostles" (v. 11). With all his admonishments, pleas, and proofs of his sincerity, it would be such love, in the end, that won the hearts of the Corinthians.

The ministry moves on in Uganda with much less conflict than it did in Corinth! Nevertheless, I and my Ugandan teammates can still relate to a degree of 1) strain between ourselves and the ones whom Satan contends to steal from us, 2) intense expenditure of self, and 3) the feeling of pockets that are continually being emptied for the sake of ministry.

Paul had admitted to the Corinthians, "I robbed other churches by receiving support from them so as to serve you. And when I was with you and needed something ... the brothers who came from Macedonia supplied what I needed. I have kept myself from being a burden to you in any way and will continue to do so" (11:8–9).

I thank the AFLC for being my brothers from Macedonia. Not only do you support my presence in Uganda, but also the projects that we have accomplished there up until now. (These are listed under our World Missions website under the name "Special"

Projects.") Here are some we hope to accomplish in 2026:

- Water Harvest: Water, water everywhere, and not a drop to drink ... unless you put a tank beneath your church's roof. Ambassador Institute realized this trick alongside the Journey Missions team of Jared Trost and his family when they came for a water mission in Uganda. Now tanks sit beneath church gutters and provide better water access to their villages. We hope to distribute our next round of tanks in the coming year.
- Scholarships: Some of our Ambassador Institute graduates are teenagers. (Six in the picture.) Alongside their discipleship in AI, perhaps we could also support their regular schooling. While fees can range, it can be up to around \$45 to send a Ugandan teen for a term of secondary school. In 2026, we would like to support the education of five AI students and/or family members in each of our 13 zones.
- **Teacher Workshops:** We love to gather our Ambassador Institute graduates for vital encouragement. These offer Christian fellowship, spiritual edification, training, incentive to open new classes, and contact with leaders and other AI zones.
- **Resources for AI Teachers:** This fund will provide printed Bibles, audio Bibles, and teacher guidebooks for AI graduates to help teach new disciples. Both English and local language translations are needed.

Our four CORE PRINCIPLES

ourney Missions, a ministry of AFLC World Missions, offers short-term, immersive mission trips that help participants step out of their comfort zones and engage in evangelism, discipleship, and community development. The ministry seeks to expand God's kingdom by partnering with AFLC missionaries and national church leaders. Short-term trips lasting one to three weeks, along with the Missionary Assistant Program (stays longer than two months), typically send participants to countries in Africa, Asia, South America, and Europe. The goal is to meet both the spiritual and physical needs of the communities served.

The typical trip includes four core principles:

Training and Preparation: Before starting their ministry trip, participants go through spiritual and practical training. This includes learning about the culture, language, and religious background of the destination, along with mission principles and strategies. It's also a time for personal reflection, team building, and prayer.

Hands-On Ministry: Once on the field, participants engage in various forms of ministry. Each trip is designed to provide participants with the opportunity to experience both the challenges and rewards of global mission work. This may involve:

- Evangelism and discipleship: Sharing the gospel with local people and helping them grow in faith through Bible studies, teaching, and personal relationships.
- Community outreach: Providing practical support such as construction work, help with local schools, or children's homes.
- Church support: Assisting local congregations, pastors, and church leaders with building and outreach efforts.

Cultural Immersion: A key part of Journey Missions is immersing oneself in a new culture to gain a deeper understanding of the challenges, joys, and realities faced by people in these countries. This could include learning the language, trying new foods, and participating in local customs and worship practices.

Spiritual Growth: Journey Missions is about spiritual transformation for participants as much as it is about serving others. The program encourages personal growth, broadens participants' understanding of the global church, and fosters a heart for missions.

For many, these trips become pivotal moments in their spiritual lives. Whether they return with a stronger sense of purpose, a passion for missions, or a calling to long-term service, the trips often leave a lasting impact.

Furthermore, communities and local churches benefit from practical help that supports long-term development, and spiritual outreach plants seeds for lasting change.

Journey Missions aims to give congregation members opportunities to engage with global needs. For those unable to participate in the field, Journey Missions encourages partnership through prayer, donations, and sharing the mission's needs with others.



aul stresses the importance of giving in chapters 8 and 9 of his second letter to the Corinthians. He emphasizes giving with correct intentions. He exhorts the Corinthians to not give grudgingly or because of pressure from others. He challenges them to give cheerfully and according to the desires and purposes of their hearts.

I often get excited about working in ministry. I have crazy ideas and can dream up all sorts of events and plans. I typically get too wrapped up in the *what*, *when*, and *where*, and then my husband gently asks, "*How* will it be paid for?" A ministry can only run successfully when it is funded. Did you know charitable financial donations declined worldwide by \$65 billion dollars since 2021? This sobering fact is multifaceted, but there are many reasons for those involved in AFLC Youth Ministries to be joyful.

Our financial supporters have a passion for our ministry of bringing the gospel message to youth. We serve to equip our local congregations with mutual support to ensure the gospel is delivered in a manner our youth can digest and internalize. We exist only because of your dedicated and joyful financial support.

Even better news, Youth Ministries has opportunities for all age groups to give!

Gen Alpha (born 2010–2025) has no relationship with paper money and coins. They are digital natives and need to be taught the value of money. They need to see their parents and trusted adults actively contributing financially. Our congregation encourages a Sunday school offering during our worship service. The money donated by children is also donated each month to a ministry they choose.

Gen Z (born 1997–2012) is most likely to give in ways other than financially. They see generosity not in dollars and cents, but in good deeds and actions. Youth within the AFLC should be encouraged to tithe. Understanding tithing at this age sets them on a course to continue supporting their favorite ministry and their local congregation in the future.

Millennials (Gen Y, born 1981–1996) give financially but typically in online-only formats. They are increasingly motivated by spontaneous giving. Youth Ministries has online options for giving. Look for QR codes and our website (aflc.org/youth/giving).

Gen X (born 1965–1980) give financially in various ways and often support favorite causes in a sustainable format. This generation may also still write a check! As this generation approaches retirement, they have a unique opportunity to visit with a financial planner to learn how to use retirement income in a taxably advantageous way. Gen Xers and Boomers (born 1946–1964) can also visit with the AFLC's Development Department to find special projects and other giving opportunities available within Youth Ministries. If you happen to be older than 73, you can also take your required minimum distribution as a qualified charitable distribution.

We are so thankful for all the financial support within Youth Ministries and the AFLC. God loves a cheerful giver, and so does Youth Ministries.

opinions on success or failure in life. Recently, I was asked how we track the number of people saved, baptized, or delivered while they are at the ARC.
