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From the moment I walked in the door of Ebenezer Lutheran Church, I knew this was going to be unlike any youth group I had ever seen. It was complete pandemonium. A very diverse group of 35 students from the heart of south Minneapolis had taken over the church basement and was making its presence known to the entire neighborhood. All night long they were running around and shouting across the room; I found myself wondering if these kids could ever be interested in hearing the Gospel. It sure didn't look like it.

Nevertheless, as the semester continued, it became clear that there was something going on below the surface that I couldn't see through the darkness of my judgmental eyes. Something was happening in the hearts of these students. Even though they appeared to have no interest in what we were telling them about Jesus and salvation, they kept coming back. Something was drawing them to church every week, and I could not figure out what it was.

In Matthew 11:1-5, John the Baptist sent word to Jesus asking, "Are You the Expected One, or shall we look for someone else? (v.2)" I found myself asking the same question: "Jesus, this isn't what I was expecting. Are You working in this youth group, or should I look somewhere else?" Jesus' response to John's disciples blew me away; Jesus simply stated His resumé: "The blind received sight and the lame walk, the lepers are cleansed and the deaf hear, the dead are raised up, and the poor have the Gospel preached to them. (v.5)" That was not the Messiah the Jews were expecting! Why would their promised

Savior care about the blind, lame, deaf, and dead? He should be working with those who are powerful and influential, right? Wrong. The Jews had an inaccurate view of who Jesus was, just like I had an inaccurate view of what youth group was supposed to be.

Seeing the kids at Ebenezer through the light of Jesus' teachings suddenly changed my entire perspective of the church. Of course He was working in that youth group, just not in the ways I was expecting. We have this "cookie cutter" idea of the perfect church and the perfect youth group, but often these ideas don't resemble Jesus' teachings. He came to heal the blind, lame, deaf, and dead, and that starts with His church. We must ask Him to take away the preconceptions that blind us, the insecurities that cripple us, the prejudices that deafen us, and the judgmental attitudes that kill us. Only then can we minister like He did.

We must learn to overcome the lies of the world with the truth of the Light of the world — Jesus Christ. Our job is not to stay in our comfort zone and preach the Word only to those we deem worthy or receptive. Let us learn to see all those we come into contact with through the eyes of Jesus so we can follow the command He gave in Matthew 5:16 "Let your light shine before men in such a way that they may see your good works, and glorify your Father who is in heaven."

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hat is it about the mall that makes my clothes feel old? How come I loved my cell phone until the iPhone came out? Why did I think I was rich until I started watching more TV? The world we live in is busy trying to influence and persuade us to love what it loves. It charms us with possessions. It beckons us with lust. It manipulates us with greed. And it's subtle. And it stands in opposition to God's truth. Like a strong ocean wave, if I'm not actively working to stand against it, I'm probably getting swept up by it.

In Matthew, Jesus seems to understand that we're susceptible to having our reality twisted. Listen to his words to the disciples, and to us, in chapter 6 "Do not store up for yourselves treasures on earth, where moth and rust destroy, and where thieves break in and steal. But store up for yourselves treasures in heaven, where moth and rust do not destroy, and where

thieves do not break in and steal. For where your treasure is, there your heart will be also."

How wonderful to have a Savior who lived in our world. Jesus knows how easy it is for those who live on the earth to chase after earthly things. The world is constantly telling us we can find delight and happiness in more stuff. But, Jesus lifts our hungry eyes higher, to joy and delight which are eternal. He continues, "So do not worry, saying, 'What shall we eat?' or 'What shall we drink?' or 'What shall we wear?' For the pagans run after all these things, and your heavenly Father knows that you need them. But seek first his kingdom and his righteousness, and all these things will be given to you as well."

Jesus changes the game. Even though we know that the world we live in is clamoring for the most fashionable clothes, the fanciest gadgets, more and more money, fame and prestige, Jesus again lifts our vision to something higher. He offers us His Kingdom and His righteousness; things which will never pass away. And He promises that all the others things, like clothes and food and worldly needs, will fall into place.

I feel like every day my world and my values are in conflict. I want to be content with what I own, yet the world is constantly making me feel like I need something new. I want to watch programs that honor God, but it seems like the cool ones always have lots of violence and swearing. And if you're like me, you've already realized that there are several places where you've exchanged what God says for what the world says.

But, God has given us a plumb line for a crooked world. His Word stands as the only dependable and unchanging source of truth in a world of confusion and deception. How can you know when your view of reality has been twisted? How can you keep from being fooled by the world's "wisdom?" Surround yourself with God's Word.



make it my slave so that after I have preached to others, I myself will not be disqualified for the prize."

Paul is saying to receive the prize of eternal life, a crown that will last forever, we need to train, run with purpose to win, and be true to our convictions. Here are three tools to help you as you pursue a faith that directly impacts your actions.

ૠ TRAIN

The first step is to get spiritually in shape. No one goes into a performance or race intending to do well if they haven't properly practiced. Like anything else in life, our faith also requires proper training. We don't just wake up in the morning ready to do the right thing. We read the Bible, pray, meet with other believers for edification and encouragement, and grow in our relationship with Christ. We put doing the right thing into practice so that we excel at it. Training is intentional and faith prompted action comes out intentionally making positive choices.

≫ HAVE PURPOSE

The second step is knowing where we are going and why we do what we do. In 1 Corinthians 6:12, Paul says, "Everything is permissible for me' – but not everything is

beneficial. Everything is permissible for me' – 'but I will not be mastered by anything." Being saved by grace does not give us "carte blanche" (the power to act at one's own discretion) to do whatever we want. Instead God's Word, not our own opinion, is the standard by which we evaluate all things. Discerning what we should and should not do, is not about legalism, but about having an attitude of the heart where we desire to live life God's way.

≫ ACT

The third step is actually doing it. Who prepares for something but then never bothers to actually do it? We can get stuck forever preparing, but never putting anything to practice. We can spend so much time preparing that we forget we have a race to run. This is what it's all been leading up to. There's only one thing left to do. Act.

Train, have goals and a finish line in view. Get out there and run that race.

in Jesus, as this year's theme from Psalm 1:1-3 states. Here is a brief rundown of what you can expect at FLY: first, we can guarantee you'll hear solid Bible teaching.

Our energetic morning Bible study teachers, Pastor Jim Johnson (Jr. High), and Pastor Todd Erickson (Sr. High), have been preparing some excellent lessons based on our theme Scripture. You will find diverse elective sessions that will encourage and challenge you in your spiritual life. Some topics offered in the past include girl-boy relationships, missions, personal devotions, and why to consider attending Bible School - especially if you are from North Dakota. The evenings will involve a special service with a dynamic speaker (or two) each night who is excited about the Lord

And of course, there is free time at FLY. Some of the more popular options include climbing Eagle Cliffe, playing miniature golf (some people become very devoted to this activity, playing at least 30 rounds in the week), basketball, volleyball, soccer, ultimate Frisbee, sleeping (wait – why are you sleeping, you waited two years to come to FLY!), a talent show, and whatever adventure your youth worker decides to lead you on.
