

ecently I have become more and more aggravated by the way our culture has stolen certain words from the English vocabulary. Words like ecstasy, gay and intimacy. The word intimacy bothers me the most. The newest version of Webster's Dictionary lists the third definition of intimacy as "an intimate act, esp. sexual intercourse." Now I know this is not the primary meaning in the dictionary, however, I would venture to say that it is "America's" primary definition. The primary definition in the dictionary is "close familiarity or friendship; closeness: the intimacy between a husband and wife." It breaks my heart to see this word twisted in America's language and in America's Christians. Because of the brokenness of today's family and the incredible influx of sexual content in the media, intimacy has been confused with sex and a pure understanding of what intimacy really is has been almost erased from society.

Being raised in an abusive home, this reality became a huge setback for me in my walk with the Lord. I very much confused the two and twisted them together as Satan intended me to do, much like he does with thousands of Christians around the world. I remember very vividly the day God began to change this distortion and unwind what Satan had twisted in my life. Often, same sex attraction and promiscuity is a key symptom or behavioral manifestation of an incorrect view or awareness of what God made intimacy to really mean. God has sought this closeness with His people from the very beginning of mankind.

In Genesis chapter 2 we see God's intention all along and in chapter 3 in verse 8 right after Adam and Eve fell, the Lord was walking in the garden in the cool of the day so He could be near His creation. In Genesis chapter 18 we see the Lord with Abraham giving him the news of the promised son to him and Sarah personally. When God gave the law to Moses in Exodus 19:5, He called the children of Israel His "Treasured Possession" and later in the consecration of the priests in Exodus 29:45, God made His heart known to His people once again stating, "I will dwell among the people of Israel and will be their God." In the Gospel of John, the first chapter, we see God's heart again as "The Word (Jesus) becomes flesh and dwelt among us (John 1:14)." Then showing the greatest display of love the world has ever known, Jesus took our place upon the cross.

Jesus sent the "Advocate" or "Helper", the Holy Spirit after He rose from the dead again, displaying God's heart and desire to commune with His creation. But now instead of dwelling among us He dwells in us. Paul was very aware of this and often warned Christians, in this case the Corinthians, of the great gift that we dare not defile. "What agreement has the temple of God with idols? For we are the temple of the living God; as God said, (2 Corinthians 6:16)." Paul also states this in the first letter to the Corinthians in chapter 3:16 "Do you not know that you are God's temple and that God's Spirit dwells in you?

All the time God was desiring intimacy with His creation, His "treasured possession;" the true meaning of intimacy, "a close familiarity or friendship; closeness." God, as King, has been betrothed to a bride, His bride. He wants to know and spend time with this bride to woo her and love her and to care for and nurture His bride as only God can. We are that bride and one day there will be no distortions of this intimacy as it states in Revelation 21:3&4, "And I heard a loud voice from the throne saying, "Behold, the dwelling place of God is with man. He will dwell with them, and they will be his people, and God himself will be with them as their God. He will wipe away every tear from their eyes, and death shall be no more, neither shall there be mourning nor crying nor pain anymore, for the former things have passed away."

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hen you think about the ministry that the Lord has called you to, what are the first words that pop into your head?

Here are some of my answers:

- Jesus
- Gospel
- Teens
- Truth
- Church

As I reflect on God's call to love Him and to love people, a word that I find myself pondering lately is "sincerity". In the NASB, it occurs nine times. The uses of "sincerity" appear to have two major categories: (1) alongside of truth and (2) alongside of the heart.

Sincerity and truth brings a combination that addresses balance. It is that tension of "speaking the truth in love" (Eph. 4:15). We are warned from the extremes of both a mushy affection void of content and a powerful doctrine void of compassion. The character of God demonstrates to us the linked together truth and sincerity.

Sincerity and heart drives us to a depth of love. It captures the nature of God's love. It is not love, simply for the sake of love. It is not a cold transaction. It is a reckless, abandoned compassion – love springing from the bottom of the heart's fountain. Sincerity of heart is God's kind of love.

Out of the nine uses for "sincerity" in the NASB, four of them are in the letters to the Corinthians. I think I have lost count of the times that modern American culture has been compared to the issues facing the Corinthians. If, in the jaded culture the Corinthian believers found themselves, they needed to be reminded regularly of sincerity in their walk with Christ, then is it possible we face the same dilemma?

Instead of "Urgent Care", which places an emphasis on the immediate nature of it, we may need "Care Urgent". We may require a focus on the nature of the love being extended and being received. What if my soul was so nurtured by the compassion of Christ in the Word that my life poured out His care?

How would it impact the teens that I want to see fully follow Jesus?

How would it impact me?

"But just as you abound in everything, in faith and utterance and knowledge and in all earnestness and in the love we inspired in you, see that you abound in this gracious work also. I am not speaking this as a command, but as proving through the earnestness of others the sincerity of your love also." ~ II Corinthians 8:7-8  $\clubsuit$
