

PARENTS

As a parent of five children in the ages of 10 to 18, I find myself thinking through conversations with other parents differently than when I first got into youth ministry. Back then, I would early ask if the parents knew about the next event or the fundraiser coming up. Now I prioritize finding ways to really **"bear one another's burdens and so fulfill the law of Christ"** (*Galatians 6:2*).

I want to demonstrate to parents of teens that I am concerned about their own relationship with Jesus. I am growing to find ways to **inquire** about the pace and rhythm of their family and what that means for nurturing faith in Christ for **the whole family**.

We need to be youth leaders that are **actively concerned** about the parents of teens. We can ask, listen, and care for parents in the parallel ways that the Lord has given us a passion to be alongside of teenagers.

PASTOR

Here at Elim I work closely with our head Pastor, Mark just as much a part of the overall make up of our Molstre, when it comes to youth ministry. What that church congregation looks like for us at Elim is that Pastor Mark and I meet on a weekly basis. Keeping in close communication with him can be encouraging to you as a leader, provides more prayer support, and allows him to know what is going on and learn more about the teens involved in the ministry. CONGREGATION

Relationships are vital in ministry. As I consider my nine years at Amery Free Lutheran I see four ingredients that have been present in every relationship I have built — regardless of age. The first ingredient in building a relationship is **purpose**. I needed to be purposeful in seeking people out, not waiting for them to find me. Adults can assume youth leaders are not interested in them, but when I pursued them, they responded warmly. Next, I needed to **ask questions**. Simply questions about them, their family, hobbies, likes, dislikes, spiritual background, etc... But what happened after that was vital, **I listened, truly listened** to what they had to say; asking followup questions and even following up later based on things they had shared. Finally, **I shared openly** with them. Not only about what was going on in youth ministry, or how they can pray or support me or the ministry; but openly shared about my life, my past, present, and future joys, struggles, and dreams. The more I was opened up, they more they responded in kind. As I consistently pursued members in my congregations, the stronger the relationships that were built, even with those who did not have any connection to the Youth Ministry. And, simply the Ministry and the lives of the youth grew as well.
